The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Proclamation which has been published at Stockholm, and forwarded by Her Majesty's Minister in that City, relative to recent alterations in the Lighthouse of Holmögadd.

PROCLAMATION.

The Royal Administration of Marine announces, for the knowledge and guidance of Mariners, that since the lighthouse at Holmögadd has been rebuilt and arranged for the reception of an apparatus à réverbères, 14 pieces of strongly silvered réverbères have been set up in the same, and so

placed as to illumine the whole horizon, with the exception of that part which looks to Holmöland, between N. 25° and 55° E., from the same height as the old coal light, that is, 72 feet above the surface of the water.

With regard to the situation of the dangerous shallow which stretches out half a geographical mile from the south point of Holmögadd and ends in a shallow piece of flat rock, 5 feet deep, called Gaddsmyteen, S.S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. from the Lighthouse, the light has been strengthened in that direction, and therefore gives out the most intense lustre on that side. The light, in its present improved state, began on the 9th of August, and is to continue thenceforth to be lighted similarly to the other Crown Lighthouses.

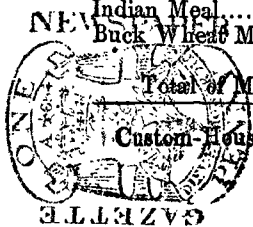
