HIS Grace the Duke of Newcastle has this day received a Letter, of which the following is a Copy, enclosing, by direction of the Earl of Clarendon, a Copy of a Telegraphic Despatch from Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe, Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople:—

Foreign Office, October 5, 1854,

SIR, 10½ a. m.

I AM directed by the Earl of Clarendon to transmit to you herewith, for the information of the Duke of Newcastle, a Copy of a Telegraphic Despatch from Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe, dated September 30, 9½ P. M., and purporting to have been forwarded from Bucharest by Her Majesty's Agent and Consul-General, on September 30, 3½ P. M., and containing accounts from the Crimea.

Translation of the Exact Copy of a Telegraphic Despatch received October 5, 10 A. M., and transmitted by the Agent of England in Wallachia, at Bucharest, the 30th of September 1854, 3½ P. M.

Lord Stratford, Constantinople, to Lord Clarendon, Minister of Foreign Affairs, London.

September 30, 1854, at 9½ p. m.

THE Allied Armies established their basis of operations at Bala Clava on the morning of the 28th, and were preparing to march without delay upon Sevastopol. The Agamemnon and other vessels-of-war of the Allies were in the Port of Bala Clava. There were facilities there for disembarking the battery train.

It is stated that Prince Menchikoff was in the field at the head of 20,000 men, expecting reinforcements; that the fortified place of Anapa has been burnt by the Russians; that its garrison was marching to the scene of action; and that a Convoy of Ammunition, escorted by Cossacks, had been taken and destroyed by an English detachment.

The Banshee, bearer of this news, left the Crimea on the evening of the day before yesterday.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-Office.

And whereas, in pursuance and in exercise of certain of the powers given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury in and by the said recited Acts, or one of them, a certain Warrant, under the hands of two of the said Commissioners and dated the 21st day of June 1854, was made, by which printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament are authorised to be sent by the post from the United Kingdom to the colonies of New South Wales, Barbadoes, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick; and printed votes and proceedings of the Colonial Legislatures are authorised to be sent by the post from any of such colonies to the United Kingdom, subject to the several regulations and rates therein contained.

And whereas it is expedient to fix the weight of printed votes and proceedings to be sent by the post between the United Kingdom and New South Wales, under the regulations of the said recited Warrant.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order and direct that no packet of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, if exceeding the weight of three pounds, shall be sent by the post under the provisions of the said recited Warrant, from the United Kingdom to the Colony of New South Wales; and that no packet of printed votes and proceedings of the Colonial Legislatures, if exceeding the weight of three pounds, shall be sent by the post under the provisions of such Warrant, from the Colony of New South Wales to the United Kingdom.

And we further order and direct that if any packet of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament sent, or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post from the United Kingdom to New South Wales, under the provisions of the said recited Warrant, shall exceed the weight of three pounds, and if any packet of printed votes and proceedings of the Colonial Legislatures sent, or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, from New South Wales to the United Kingdom, under the provisions of the said recited Warrant, shall exceed the weight of three pounds, every such packet shall and may be detained and opened at any place in the United Kingdom, and at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or given up to the person to

whom it shall be addressed, or forwarded to the place of its destination; and any such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with the like amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter.

And we further order and direct that letters transmitted by any vessel between any ports in the Bahama Islands, in the West Indies, shall be no longer chargeable with the British sea postage rates to which the same are liable under certain Warrants under the hands of three of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date respectively the 1st day of September 1840, the 31st day of August 1841, and the 11th day of October 1843, or under any other Treasury Warrants, or under any Act of Parliament, and that all such letters shall be hereafter charged and chargeable, for the conveyance between any such ports, with such rates of postage as the Colonial Government of the Bahamas hath ordered and directed, or shall at any time hereafter order and direct.

And we further order and direct that the several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said recited Warrant of the 21st day of June 1854.

And we further order and direct that this Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

Provided lastly, and we hereby declare and direct that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter to alter any of the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other regulations in lieu thereof.
