ORDERS for the Court's going into Mourning on Thursday next, the 25th instant, for Her late Majesty the Dowager Queen of Sardinia, and for Her late Majesty the Queen of Sardinia, Consort of the reigning King; viz:—

The Ladies to wear black Silk, fringed or plain Linen, white Gloves, Necklaces and Ear-rings,

black or white Shoes, Fans and Tippets.

The Gentlemen to wear Black, full trimmed, fringed or plain Linen, black Swords and Buckles.

The Court to change the Mourning on Thurs-

day the 8th February next; viz:—
The Ladies to wear black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuffs, with black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black Coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuff Waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Thursday the 15th February next, the Court to go out of Mourning.

Horse-Guards, 19th January 1855. Field-Marshal Lord Raglan has been requested to forward lists of the individuals who may have been killed in action, or who may have died whilst on service in the Crimea, or in consequence of wounds.
