Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office *before twelve o'clock* on the *Friday previous* to the Levee, or upon any earlier day between the hours of *eleven and four*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above Regulations.

This day the Right Honourable Edward Horsman was, by Her Majesty's command, sworn of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

Her Majesty in Council was this day pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Matthew Talbot Baines, President of the Poor Law Board, to be a Member of the Committee of Council on Education.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 28th day of February 1855;

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the ninth and tenth years of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend an Act for regulating the sale of waste land belonging to the Crown in the Australian Colonies, and to make further provision for the management thereof," it was enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty by Order in Council, amongst other things, to establish Regulations respecting the more effectually making demises or licences of such waste land, and respecting the reservation on such demises or licences of rents.

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 9th day of March 1847, provisions were made respecting the mode of tendering and receiving tenders for leases of runs, thereafter called pastoral leases, and respecting the amount of rent to be paid for such runs during the currency and after the renewal of such leases.

And whereas it may be expedient that the provisions of the said Order in Council should be altered in the above respects :

It is hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that it shall be lawful for the Governor of Victoria to cause a provision to be inserted in, or endorsed on any pastoral lease, declaring what rate of rent (not being less than £10 per annum,) shall be payable by the holder or holders of such lease during the currency and after any renewal thereof, and how such rent shall be calculated or assessed, and such rent shall be in lieu of the rent payable under the said Order in Council ; and all the provisions of the said Order in Council respecting the payment and recovery of the said last-mentioned rent, and respecting the forfeiture of any lease for non-payment thereof, shall apply to the rent declared by such provision so inserted in any lease as aforesaid.

Provided always, that no such provisions shall be inserted in, or endorsed upon any lease which shall have been executed or promised before this Order in Council shall take effect, without the consent in writing of the person or persons holding or entitled to such lease.

And it is further ordered that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of his Executive Council, notwithstanding anything contained in the said Order in Council, to make such Regulations as to him shall seem fit respecting the mode of tendering and receiving tenders for pastoral leases, provided that no such Regulations shall take effect till they shall have been published in the Government Gazette.

And it is further ordered, that in the construction of this Order in Council, the term Governor

shall mean the Officer for the time being lawfully administering the Government of the Colony.

And it is further ordered, that this Order in Council shall take effect from a day to be fixed by Proclamation of the Governor.

And the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the Act for limiting the time of service in the Army," it is enacted "that for three years after the passing of this Act any person may be enlisted to serve Her Majesty, or in the forces of the East India Company, as a soldier, for any such term, not exceeding ten years in the Infantry, or twelve years in the Cavalry, Artillery, or other Ordnance Corps, as may be authorized by Her Majesty in Council in this behalf."

Now therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that any person may be enlisted to serve as a soldier in Her Majesty's forces, or in the forces of the East India Company, for the term of two years, to be reckoned as is directed and provided in and by the Act of the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, ch. 37, for limiting the term of service in the Army, and for such further term, not exceeding one year, as Her Majesty may by Order in Council direct.

And the Right Honourable Lord Panmure, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Right Honourable the Commissioners for the Affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories of any Foreign Power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to a subject of such Power, when within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being Sardinian subjects,) who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories belonging to His Majesty the King of Sardinia :

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves (and not being British subjects), who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to subjects of the King of Sardinia, within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships: Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, or the territories of the East India Company, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the Affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

*Light-house at Tucker's Beach, Little Egg Harbour, N. J.*

ON or about the first day of June next (1855), a fixed white light, varied by flashes, of the fourth order of the system of Fresnel, will be substituted

for the present fixed red light at Tucker's Beach Light-house near the entrance to Little Egg Harbour, N. J.

The light will be exhibited at an elevation of 50 feet above the level of the sea; will illuminate the entire sea horizon and the approaches to Little Egg Harbour, and should be seen, under ordinary states of the atmosphere, from a height of 15 feet above the water, at a distance of  $12\frac{1}{2}$  nautical, or  $14\frac{1}{2}$  statute miles.

The tower is white.

The approximate position is—

Latitude,  $39^{\circ} 30' 17''$  N.

Longitude,  $74^{\circ} 16' 48''$  W.

Due public notice will be given of the day upon which the change will be made.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

*Light-house in N. W. Passage, Key West, Florida.*

THIS Light-house, recently erected, is situated on the Western Bank, forming the N. W. channel, in 6 feet ordinary low water.

Its position may be approximately laid down by the following magnetic bearings and distances.

Sand Key Light-house S.  $11^{\circ} 02'$  east,  
dist. 10 nautical miles.

Key West Light-house S.  $57^{\circ}$  east,  
dist. 6.83 nautical miles.

N. W. Bar Buoy N.  $20^{\circ} 46'$  east,  
dist. 1.31 nautical miles.

The structure is founded on piles. The keeper's dwelling is 23 feet above the water, and it is surmounted by the lantern.

The foundation is painted of dark colour; the dwelling and lantern white.

The illuminating apparatus is a Fresnel, 5th Order, illuminating  $270^{\circ}$  of the horizon, and shewing a fixed white light.

The focal plane is 40 feet above the sea level; the light should therefore be seen, in clear weather, from the deck of a vessel 10 feet above the water, at a distance of  $11\frac{1}{2}$  nautical miles, or about 10 miles beyond the Bar.

The light will be exhibited for the first time on the 5th March prox., and will continue to be exhibited from sunset to sunrise on each succeeding night, till further notice.

#### *Sailing Directions.*

To enter the channel by day, bring the Light-house to bear S. by W.  $\frac{3}{4}$  W. (mag.), or in range with the buoy on the Bar, and the western end of Mullet Key; then run till the Bar is crossed and buoy No. 2 is made, when haul up S.E.  $\frac{3}{4}$  E. (mag.), for buoy No. 1.

To enter by night, bring the light to bear S. by W.  $\frac{3}{4}$  W. (mag.), and run on that course till Key West Light bears S.E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. (mag.), when haul up for it, and when in 3 fathoms anchor for the night.

This light is designed to notify mariners of their approach to the Bar, and to guide them over it by day and night, but it is not intended, nor can it be used, as a guide in the passage from the Bar to Key West. Dependence for this purpose must be had in the day time on the channel buoys and ranges on shore, and at night on the bearings of Key West and Sand Key lights; to ascertain the relative position of which mariners

are recommended to provide themselves with the chart of this harbour published by the Coast Survey.


