The Queen has been pleased to grant unto George Kirwan Carr, Esquire, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Sussex Royal Artillery Regiment of Militia, only surviving son and heir of the late Right Reverend Robert James Carr, D.D., Lord Bishop of Worcester, deceased, Her Majesty's royal licence and authority that he and his issue may take and henceforth use the surname of Lloyd, in addition to and after that of Carr, and that he and they may bear the arms of Lloyd quarterly, in the first quarter, with his and their own family arms, in compliance with a proviso in a certain deed of settlement of his paternal aunt, Dame Elizabeth-Ann Lloyd, of Lancing, in the county of Sussex, widow, and relict of the late Sir James Martin

Lloyd, of the same place, Baronet, deceased, and to manifest his grateful and affectionate respect for the said Dame Elizabeth-Ann Lloyd; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said licence and permission to be void and of none effect.

And also to command that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

**NOTICE TO MARINERS.**

THE MINISTER OF MARINE

Gives notice to Mariners and others:—

1st. That the iron pyramidal sea-bouy outside of the Slykgat of Goederede, is missing, probably occasioned by floating ice, and that as speedily as possible, in lieu thereof, a black globular buoy, of the largest size, with the word Goederede, in white painted letters round the top, will be stationed at the same place;

2d. That the shallow, at the north-eastern point of the Bank Scheelock, in the Goederede Sea Gat, having been found to extend further to the northward, has rendered it necessary to remove about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cable lengths towards the north, the white buoy, No. 6, on the Northern Pampus, as also the inner white Ton, No. 7, by which means the first mentioned will now lie in 38, and the second in 43 palms, at ordinary low water.

To avoid this shallow at night, Mariners are provisionally warned when crossing the Northern Pampus, now not to keep the Light of Goederede *entirely red* but rather *white*, on the western side.
