Before Sevastopol,

My Lord, May 19, 1855.

I do myself the honour to inclose the List of
Casualties that occurred between the 14th and 17th

For the last two days there has been hardly any firing on either side; large convoys have come into Sevastopol from the northern side, but there has been no movement of importance.

The heat has been very oppressive since Wed-

nesday.

I deeply regret to have to report that I have just received a letter from General Osten Sacken, in answer to an enquiry I addressed to him on the

subject, informing me that Captain Arnold, of the 4th Regiment of Foot, who was wounded and taken prisoner on the night of the 5th, died that same. night.

WHITEHALL, May 17, 1855.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Richard Hall, of Swaffham, in the county of Norfolk, Esquire, late a Captain in the East Norfolk Militia, only son of Richard Hall, of West Derby, in the county palatine of Lancaster, Merchant, by Harriet, his wife, daughter and co-heir of Robert Say, late of Penington Hall, in the parish of Leigh, in the said county palatine of Lancaster, Esquire, all deceased, Her royal licence and authority that he and his issue may, in compliance with a condition contained in the last will and testament of his maternal uncle, Henry Say, of Swaffham, in the county of Norfolk, Clerk, (the brother of the said Robert Say,) deceased, take and henceforth use the surname of Say, in addition to and after that of Hall, and that he and they may bear the arms of Say quarterly, with his and their own family arms; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect.

And also to command that the said royal con-cession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
