three days; but neither the admissions nor the deaths have been so marked as to attract special attention, though numerous enough to create uneasiness.

Taking the whole force, the admissions to strength during the week have been in the ratio of 10.52 per cent, which is very high, but the deaths to strength are in the ratio of 0.68 per cent., which is more moderate ; but it must be borne in mind that 1,659 of the admissions during the week were from wounds alone.

The Sardinian contingent has suffered much more than the British troops have done since the epidemic first made its appearance at the end of April. Great attention is paid to the cleanliness of the different camps, and on the first appearance of cholera the attention of medical officers was drawn by me, in a circular memorandum dated 30th April, to the great importance of detecting and arresting the premonitory diarrhea which generally precedes the more formidable stage of I have, &c., the disease.
