WESTMINSTER, July 30, 1855.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that the Lords authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to amend the law concerning the certifying and registering of places of religious worship in England.

An Act for legalizing and preserving the restored standards of weights and measures.

An Act for further promoting the establishment of free public libraries and museums in municipal towns, and for extending it to towns governed by Local Improvement Acts, and to parishes.

An Act to authorise the Commissioners of the Treasury to make arrangements concerning certain loans advanced by way of relief to the islands of Antigua, Nevis, and Montserrat.

An Act to extend the period for applying for a sale under the Acts for facilitating the sale and transfer of encumbered estates in Ireland.

An Act to amend the law regarding the burial of poor persons by guardians and overseers of the poor.

An Act to continue an Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her present Majesty for amending the law relative to Private Lunatic Asylums in Ireland.

An Act to reduce certain duties payable on stage carriages, and to amend the laws relating to stamp duties, and to bonds and securities to the Inland Revenue.

An Act to give effect to a convention between Her Majesty and the United States of America.

An Act to continue certain temporary provisions concerning Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction in England.

An Act to enable grand juries of counties in Ireland to present for payment of expences in certain cases.

An Act to ratify conditional agreements entered into by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Works and Public Buildings; and to vest in the said Commissioners certain property situate near the College of Edinburgh, in the City of Edinburgh, together with the General Register House, in the said city, and all lands held therewith; and to enable the said Commissioners to acquire certain property near the Palace of Holyrood.

An Act to incorporate a Company for making a railway from the Bishop-Auckland branch of the North-Eastern Railway, in the township of Elvet, to the township of Brandon and Byshottles, all in the County of Durham, to be called the Dearness Valley Railway, and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Oxford, Worcester, and Wolverhampton Railway Company to alter and improve certain of their works, and to construct additional works, and to authorize arrangements with respect to the Stratford-upon-Avon Canal, and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the Somerset Central Railway Company to construct railways to Wells, and to Burnham, and a pier at Burnham, and to raise additional capital, and for other purposes.

An Act for the making and maintaining of the Severn Valley Railway, and for other purposes.

An Act to facilitate the erection of one or more churches in the parishes of Tormoham and Saint Mary Church, at or near the town of Torquay, in the county of Devon, and for other purposes.

An Act to repeal the Act of the ninth Victoria, chapter thirty-two; to reconstitute and extend the police district therein mentioned, under the name of the Airdrie Rural Police District; and to erect and maintain a hall, court-house, and public offices, for the Airdrie district of Lanarkshire.

An Act to authorise the transfer of the undertaking of the Deptford Gas Light and Coke Company to the Surrey Consumer's Gas Company, and to wind up the affairs of the first named Company, and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the East Kent Railway Company to extend their authorised line of railway by the construction of a railway from Canterbury to Dover, with two branches at Dover, to increase their capital, and for other purposes.

An Act to correct an oversight in "The Hereford Improvement Act, 1854." August 1, 1855.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Naples, stating that vessels arriving from the ports of the Adriatic and Mediterranean Seas with cholera on board, will be refused admission into the ports of the Two Sicilies, and consequently obliged to proceed elsewhere.

Agricultural Department.

By virtue of the authority conceded by the Decree of the 5th of July instant, we hereby, in the name of the King, decree the following:-

ART. I.—Foreign corn shall be admitted into all the seaports and land stations of the Centinent of the Kingdom, free of duty, until the 1st of October next.

§ From the 1st of October to the end of January 1856, Foreign Indian corn shall be admitted

> ART. IL-Foreign rye and barley from Foreign Countries shall be admitted into the ports stated in the 1st Article, from the 1st of July instant to the 31st January 1856, on the payment of a duty of 40 reis per algueire.

> ART. III.—The importation of Foreign wheat and oats is prohibited.

> ART. IV .-- All legislation to the contrary is hereby revoked.

We, Don Fernando, King Regent of the Kingdom of Portugal, Algarves, &c., in the name of the King, do hereby make known to all His Majesty's subjects that the Cortes have decreed, and we approve of, the following Law:

ART. I.—The Government is relieved of the responsibility that may arise from the publication of the Decree of the 20th December 1854, by which the importation of grain, wheat, Indian corn, rye, barley, and oats, was permitted, free of duty, till the end of June last, to enter all the seaports and frontier stations of the continent of the

ART. II. The dispositions of the above-mentioned Decree are confirmed.

ART. III. The Government is authorized to prolong the period to the 31st of January 1856, on the same terms, or by means of a moderate duty if such be found more convenient.

ART. IV. All legislation to the contrary is bereby revoked.

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WAR-DEPARTMENT, August 6, 1855.

ORD PANMURE has this day received a Despatch and its Enclosures, of which the following are Copies, addressed to his Lordship by General Simpson, Commanding Her Majesty's Forces in the East:-

Before Sevastopol,

My Lord,

July 24, 1855.

I HAVE the honour to enclose the Weekly Return from Dr Hall of the state of the sick. Your Lordship will read with satisfaction the improved condition of the health of the Army. I had entertained fears, from the very great heat of the last few days, that cholera would have assumed a more virulent form, but such has fortunately not been the case.

I have nothing to relate of importance respecting the siege. On the night of the 22d the enemy opened a very heavy fire of musketry from the parapets of the Malakoff and adjacent works, but they did not attempt an attack. They opened a similar fire in the course of the night on the left of the French. I have every reason to believe that they were apprehensive of an attack on the part of our Allies, and for this reason opened the fire above described, which did no damage to either the works or soldiers.

The troops in the Baidar Valley have not altered their positions from the date of the last time I had the honour to address you.

Before Sevastopol,

Sir,

July 24, 1855.

In transmitting the enclosed weekly state of sick to the 21st instant, I have much pleasure in being able to inform you that the health of the Army has continued to improve. There has been a trifling decrease in the number of admissions into hospital, and a considerable diminution in the mortality.

The number of casualties admitted from the trenches during the present week has been greater than it was last; but the deaths have been fewer, which shows that the generality of wounds received must have been of a less serious character.
