The King has been pleased to grant unto William Thomas Sheppard, Esq. (eldest son of Thomas Sheppard of Littlecore, in the county of Bucks, Esq. by Elizabeth his wife, only child of William Cotton, late of Crakemarsh, in the county of Stafford, Doctor of Laws, deceased), his royal licence and authority that he and his iffue may affume and take the furname of Cotton, and also bear the arms of Cotton, in addition to his prefent furname and arms of Sheppard (fuch arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office), purfuant to the last will and testament of his said late maternal grandfather William Cotton: And also to order that this his Majelly's concession and declaration be registered in his College of Arms.
