AT the Court at Balmoral the 24th day of September 1855,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the sixteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following, that is to say:—

“ To The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

“ Whereas the General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of ‘ The Public Health Act, 1848,’ did, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the Inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the parish of Wellingborough, in the county of Northampton, the same being a place having a known and defined boundary, (the number of the said petitioners greatly exceeding thirty in the whole,) directed William Ranger, a Superintending Inspector appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act, to visit the said parish, and to make inquiry, and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the state of the burial-grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such parish for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said parish, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, and other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act :

“ And the said Superintending Inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act :

“ And copies of the said Report, accompanied by a notice stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said Re-

port, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, were duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed, and the statements which have been received by the said Board have been duly deposited as required by that Act :

“ And it having appeared to the said Board desirable further to inquire into the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of the said Act, the said Board caused the said William Ranger to visit the parts within the boundaries proposed to be adopted for the purposes of the said Act :

“ And whereas the said Superintending Inspector, after having given such notice as is required by the said Act, did hear all persons desirous of being heard before him on the subject of the said Report, and of the boundaries desirable to be adopted for the purposes of the said Act; and did make further inquiry, and report according to the directions of the said Board :

“ And whereas copies of such further Report, accompanied by a notice stating that, within the time directed by the said Act, written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said Report, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as required by the said Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed, and no such statements have been received by the said Board :

“ And whereas, after such further Report, it appears to the said Board to be expedient that the said Public Health Act, except as hereinafter mentioned, should be applied to the parish of Wellingborough; that is to say, within the same boundaries as those within, and with respect to which the said inquiry and further inquiry have been made :

“ And it appears by the said Reports that there is no local Act of Parliament in force within the said parish for paving, lighting (otherwise than for the profit of proprietors or shareholders), cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving such parish, or any part thereof, or in anywise relating to the purposes of the said Public Health Act :



"Now therefore, the General Board of Health does hereby, in pursuance of the said Public Health Act, 1848, humbly report to your Majesty that it appears to be expedient that—

"1. 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of the said Act, printed by your Majesty's printers, should be applied to and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said parish of Wellingborough, in the county of Northampton, and that such area, places, and parts of places should be and constitute a district for the purpose of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

"2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act, 1848, should consist of nine persons, and that the entire number should be elected for the whole of the said district.

"3. The first election of the said Local Board should take place on the eleventh day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

"4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health should go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed should fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third should go out of office on the day next following.

"5. Every person, at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, should be resident, as in the said 'Public Health Act, 1848,' is required, and be rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than twenty pounds.

"6. At the first election of the said Local Board, Mark Sharman, of Wellingborough, should perform the duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting the said first election; and in case the said Mark Sharman, from illness, or other sufficient cause, should be unable to discharge such duties, or should be absent, or should refuse to act, then Joseph Keep, of Wellingborough, should perform such of the said duties as then remain to be performed.

"7. The fourteen days' notice of qualification, required by 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, should be given to the said Mark Sharman, at his residence Sheep Street, within the district aforesaid; or in case he should refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to the said Joseph Keep, at his residence, likewise within the aforesaid district of Wellingborough.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said Report into consideration, is pleased to approve thereof, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby, under and in pursuance of the "Public Health Act, 1848," order and direct that—

1. From and after the date of this Order, "The Public Health Act 1848," and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of the said Act, printed by Her Majesty's printers, shall be applied to and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said parish of Wellingborough, in the county of Northampton, and that such area, places, and parts of places, shall be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said "Public Health Act, 1848," shall consist of nine persons, and that the entire number shall be elected for the whole of the said district.

3. The first election of the said Local Board shall take place on the eleventh day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health shall go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed shall fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that such one-third shall go out of office on the day next following.

*Stralsund, 13th August, 1855.*

NOTICE TO MARINERS

*Concerning the alterations made in the Lighthouse upon the Island Greifswalder Oie.*

INSTEAD of the present lighthouse upon the Island Greifswalder Oie, situated in the Baltic between Swinemünde and the Island Rügen, under 54° 14' 45" north latitude, and 13° 55' 27" east longitude, of Greenwich, a new lighthouse will come into operation on the 1st October 1855, and will continue to burn throughout the whole year every day from sunset to sunrise.

The new lighthouse, which rises upon the north-eastern point of the island about 150 feet Rhenish above the level of the sea, is provided with a revolving horizontal light, and will be visible in clear weather from the decks of ordinary vessels at a distance of from 4 to 4½ German miles.

To distinguish this light from the fixed ones at Orcona and Swinemünde it will be formed into a revolving-light (blick-feuer): but as there are already revolving-lights (blick-feuern) at Darsfort and Gerschicht, the Greifswalder will be so arranged that it will change colour every ¼ of a minute from natural white to dark red, and lastly again to dark. The masonry of the tower is of plain bricks, and will serve also during the day as a landmark.
