*Board of Trade, Whitehall,
December 24, 1855.*

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Jassy, reporting that the Imperial Government of the Sultan has permitted the export of timber and salt from Moldavia, by way of the Danube, subject to the regulations, of which the following is a translation, and which

have been framed with a view to prevent the export of the articles in question to Russia.

ART. I.—Any person, desiring to export timber, will be required in the first instance, to make a declaration in writing at the Custom-House (Périalabie), at Galatz; in which declaration it will be necessary to name the port of destination.

ART. II.—On receipt of this declaration, the Customs will, through the Captain of the Port, proceed to verify

- 1st. The quantity of timber to be exported.
- 2d. Its quality.
- 3d. The name of the vessel employed for the purpose of transport, and that of the Captain.
- 4th. The flag of the vessel; and
- 5th. The value of the timber to be exported.

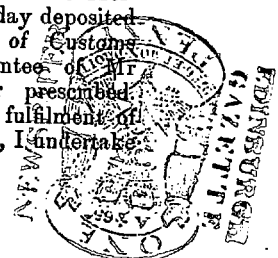
ART. III.—These particulars being obtained by the Captain of the Port, it will be necessary for the exporter to deposit at the Custom-House—

- 1st. A written security from a respectable merchant domicated at Galatz, to the effect that, in default of production at the Custom-House at the expiration of five months, proof that the said timber has been landed at the port indicated as its destination, the person so guaranteeing shall be held liable for the payment to the Custom-House of a sum equivalent to double the value of the timber.

2dly. A written declaration to the following effect:

“ For such quantity and such kind of timber, which, according to my written demand, addressed to the Honourable Board of Customs (Périalabie), bearing date the _____, I have shipped on board the ship _____ under the _____ flag,

Captain, to the port of _____, of such empire or kingdom, &c., &c., I, the undersigned, do hereby engage not to unload the said timber in any port other than the above mentioned, and under no circumstances in any port situate in the territory of Russia. To this effect, for the security of the Moldavian Government, I have this day deposited with the Honourable Board of Customs (Périalabie) the written guarantee of _____, in the manner prescribed. Moreover, in proof of the entire fulfilment of my engagement above mentioned, I undertake



to lay before the Honourable Board of Customs, before the expiration of five months from the present date, a certificate from the Custom-House of the port of destination of such timber, verifying that at such a date the said timber, in quantity and quality as before mentioned, has been truly discharged in the said port, from the said ship

Captain . . . If at the above-named date I do not produce such certificate aforementioned in due form, such failure to produce such certificate shall be held as proof that the said timber has been exported to a prohibited port, and in such case the person who shall have held himself security on my behalf shall be called upon to pay the amount named in the bond.

ART. IV.—Upon the delivery of such a declaration, which must be authenticated by the Board of Customs, the said Board shall deliver to the exporter a certificate in due form, in which shall be repeated the purport of the above-named declaration, after which the vessel shall be at liberty to depart.

As a guarantee against all infraction on the part of any vessel, proceedings will be adopted, as in the case of vessels ascending the Danube to their port of destination.

The above Regulations shall also apply to the exportation of salt.
