ORD PANMURE has this day received two Despatches, and their Enclosures, of which the following are Copies, addressed to his Lordship by General Sir William Codrington, K.C.B.

Sevastopol, April 7, 1856.

My Lord,

THE Stromboli returned this morning with Dr

McIllree from Redout Kalé.

The letter from Prince Beboutoff, at Tiflis, of which a copy is herewith transmitted, shows that General Williams had recovered his health, and had been forwarded to Riazan, near Moscow; and that, consequently, it was not necessary for Dr McIllree to go to Tiflis, nor do the Russians seem to have wished that he should pass their lines. Your Lordship will see that the armistice had been established in Asia.

Dr McIllree accordingly returned, bringing me letters from Abdil Pasha, who was in temporary command of the Turkish Troops during the

absence of Omar Pasha.

The service for which Dr McIllree was selected would probably have exposed him to a difficult if not a dangerous journey at this time of year, across mountain passes, and amongst such a population; his mission would have required circumspection and activity, and I beg to bring his name to your Lordship's notice from his service at Scutari, and his selection by Sir J. Hall for the duty on which he had been ordered.

Monsieur le Commandant-en-Chef,

Le Commandant des troupes Impériales sur le littoral du Gouriel m'a fait parvenir, le 15 de ce mois, la lettre de votre Excellence, à l'adresse de M. le Commandant-en-Chef de l'Armée du Caucase, en date du 16 Mars, N.S., transmise par les Officiers Médecins McIlree et Buckley, que vous avez jugé nécessaire d'envoyer pour soigner la santé du Général Williams.

En l'absence de M. l'Aide-de-Camp Général Mouravieff, j'ai l'honneur d'informer votre Excellence que M. le Général Williams, rétablie de la maladie qu'il a faite ici, et s'étant trouvé en parfait état de poursuivre son voyage pour l'intérieur de la Russie, a quitté Tiflis le 13 de ce mois, se rendant, avec le Capitaine Teesdale, à sa destination.

La présence des susdits officiers de santé devenant désormais inutile, ils sont chargés de remettre à votre Excellence la présente, qui sert aussi à la prévenir que les formalités de l'armistice, stipulé dans la Conférence de P ris, ont été également accomplies entre les arnées belligérantes dans ces contrées.
