CEREMONIAL OF THE PROCLAMATION OF PEACE,
TUESDAY, 29TH APRIL 1856.

IN pursuance of directions issued by the Earl Marshal, in obedience to a Royal Warrant to him directed, the Officers of Arms, Serjeants-at-Arms in their Collars, with their Maces, the Serjeant Trumpeter with Mace and Collar, the Trumpets, Drum-Major and Drums, and the Marshals' Men, assembled this day, at half-past Eleven o'Clock in the Forenoon, in the Stable-Yard, St James's; and the Officers of Arms, being habited in their Tabards, and having mounted their horses, proceeded to the Palace Gate, in front of which Sir Charles George Young, Garter Principal King of Arms, on foot, read the Proclamation of Peace, whereupon a Procession was formed, which proceeded to Charing-Cross in the following order :—

At Charing Cross, Norroy King of Arms read the Proclamation, looking towards Whitehall; after which the Procession moved on to Temple Bar, the Gates of which being shut, Rouge Croix, junior Pursuivant of Arms, going out of the rank, between two Trumpeters, preceded by two of the Life Guards, rode up to the Gates, and after the Trumpets had sounded thrice, knocked thereat. Being asked by the City Marshal from within "Who comes there?" he replied, "the Officers of Arms demand entrance into the City to publish Her Majesty's Proclamation of Peace." The Gates being opened, he was admitted, and the Gates were immediately closed. The City Marshal, preceded by his Officers, conducted him to the Lord Mayor (who, in his carriage, and accompanied by the Aldermen, Sheriffs, and other Officers, attended within the Gates), to whom he presented Her Majesty's Warrant, which his Lordship having read, returned, and gave directions to the City Marshal to open the Gates, who, attending the Pursuivant back, said on leaving him, "Sir, the Gates are opened." The Trumpets and Life Guards being in waiting, conducted him to his place in the Procession, which then moved on into the City (the High Bailiff and other Officers of Westminster filing off, and retiring at Temple Bar); and at the end of Chancery Lane, Lancaster Herald read the Proclamation for the third time.

Then the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, joined the Procession, immediately after the Officers of Arms, and it moved on to the end of Wood Street, Cheapside, where the Cross formerly stood; the Proclamation having been there read by York Herald, the Procession was continued to the Royal Exchange, where the Proclamation was read for the last time by Windsor Herald.

The Trumpets sounded thrice previously to, and immediately after, each reading. The streets through which the Procession passed were thronged with spectators, who received each Proclamation with loud and repeated acclamations. The Park and Tower Guns were fired upon the occasion.

WAR-DEPARTMENT, May 3, 1856.

LORD PANMURE has received a Despatch, of which the following is a copy, addressed to his Lordship by General Sir William Codrington, K.C.B. :—

Sevastopol, April 19, 1856.

MY LORD,

On the 12th instant General Lüders sent an answer to my letter as to the entrance of our vessels into the harbour. It was to the effect that he had received orders to place no impediment in the way of vessels of any description entering the harbour of Sevastopol. I accordingly informed Admiral Fremantle; and on the 14th instant he proceeded to the harbour, with his flag on board Her Majesty's ship *Banshee*, and, passing through the lines of wreck, anchored inside the quay of Fort Paul. Having met the Admiral in the dockyard, we went up the harbour in a small steamboat, and passing also along the north side, landed at Fort Constantine, receiving all civility and attention on the part of the Russian officers.

General Lüders had invited Marshal Pelissier, General La Marmora, and myself, to meet him at the Traktir Bridge, at twelve o'clock, on the 13th instant, in order that we might accompany him to a breakfast on the Mackenzie Heights. The meeting accordingly took place. General Lüders, with a large staff of Russian officers, was received in the French lines by a Guard of Honour, and with a salute of Artillery, after which, followed by many officers of the Allied and Russian Armies, we crossed the river and the plain of the Tchernaya, and ascended the heights of Mackenzie, at the road by which our Army came to Balaklava on the flank march from the Belbeck, in September 1854.

About 6,000 infantry and one battery of Artillery, the division of General Vassilitzky, were paraded and marched past; a short distance, further on the heights, a large and ornamented marquee had been pitched, in which we were the guests of General Lüders, and nothing could exceed the courtesy and attention of all the officers of the Russian Army.

On the 15th General Lüders came, with many Russian officers, to Marshal Pelissier's to breakfast, and to be present at some races; it is needless to say that their reception was as cordial and the attention as kind as that shown to us in the Russian camp. The afternoon was passed at the course in the neighbourhood of the Monastery of St George, where the races and a Carrousel of the Chasseurs d'Afrique finished the day.

On the 17th, Marshal Pelissier reviewed the French Army on the range of heights near the Monastery of St George.

From all sides, from Kamiesch at some distance on the west, from the Feduchine, and the inner heights on the plain of Balaklava, and from the nearer camps below us, we saw the French columns, with their artillery, pass over the undulating ground below, to the concentration upon their position on the heights.

At eleven o'clock we met General Lüders at the Col-de-Balaklava, and riding up the steep hill above it, we passed along the line of columns, extending, in more open order than we generally form, a distance of about two miles and a half. The Army then marched past, 88 battalions, 5 regiments of Cavalry, Siege Artillerymen, Sappers, and 198 guns; the defile of this fine Army lasting till three p.m.

General Lüders then came to luncheon at the English Head-Quarters. The General Officers of

our Army had been invited, and Marshal Pelissier, with many French officers, and General La Marmora, with Sardinian officers, were good enough to meet General Lüders at this house. Your lordship is aware that the Sardinian Army is partly embarked, and the remainder getting ready to leave the Crimea.

The English Army was formed at a short distance in front of these Head-Quarters; the Siege Train and the Sappers on the right of the Infantry; 49 battalions in contiguous quarter distance columns of regiments; two troops of Horse Artillery, and five batteries, on the right of the line, six batteries and two heavy batteries on the left of the line,—in all 86 guns. Two regiments of the Land Transport Corps were complete and in good order in rear.

General Lüders rode down the line, accompanied by a large assembly of Russian, French, and Sardinian officers, and the troops also marched past him. I have the satisfaction of assuring your Lordship of the steady, the good, the healthy appearance of the Army; of its very apparent efficiency in every branch; of the order, quietness, and regularity with which every regiment passed by; and it was a subject of pride to us all to feel that such was the appearance of the Army of England in the Crimea.

General Lüders returned to Batschi Serai, having expressed himself much gratified at the attention shewn him by the Allies.

ADMIRALTY, May 1, 1856.

Her Majesty having been graciously pleased to signify Her intention of granting the "Sevastopol" Clasp to the officers and crews of Her Majesty's ships employed in co-operation with the land forces in the reduction of Sevastopol, as well as a Clasp, bearing on it the word "Azoff," to the officers and crews of Her Majesty's vessels employed in the Sea of Azoff, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hereby give notice of the same.

The period for which the "Sevastopol" Clasp is to be awarded for services as aforesaid, dates from the 1st of October 1854 to the 9th of September 1855.

The "Azoff" Clasp will be awarded to the officers and crews of such ships as served in the Sea of Azoff between the 25th of May 1855 and the 9th of September 1855, as well as to the officers and men who were employed in the boats of line-of-battle ships which took part in the operations against Taganrog, or elsewhere within the Sea of Azoff.

In cases in which officers or men have been engaged in any expedition or operation in the Sea of Azoff after the 9th of September 1855, the period for which the "Azoff" Clasp is to be awarded will be extended to the 22d of November 1855, and the service for which the same is claimed must in such cases be duly certified.

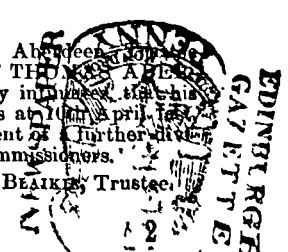
