At the Court at Buckingham Palace,
May 2, 1856.

A CHAPTER of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle having been summoned for this day, the following Knights Brethren, in their mantles and collars, assembled in the Palace; viz. :—

The Earl of Aberdeen, the Earl of Rosebery, the Duke of Montrose, the Earl of Elgin, the Earl of Eglinton, the Duke of Atholl, and Lord Panmure, attended by the undermentioned Officers of the Order, in their mantles, and wearing their chains and badges; viz. :—Sir John-Stewart Richardson, Bart., Secretary of the Order, and Frederic-Peel Round, Esq. Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod.

At three o'clock the Knights Brethren were called over by the Secretary, when (Her Majesty and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert having passed into the Throne Room,) they proceeded, with the Officers of the Order, into the presence of the Sovereign.

The Queen being seated in the Chair of State, and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert at the table on the right hand of Her Majesty, the Sovereign was pleased to command the other Knights Brethren to take their seats at the table, according to their seniority in the Order, the Officers of the Order standing in their places at the bottom of the table.

The Sovereign was then pleased to signify Her royal pleasure touching the election of a Knight unto the Order; whereupon the Knights Brethren proceeded to the election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Secretary (commencing with the junior Knight), were by him, kneeling, presented to the Sovereign, who was pleased to declare that the Most Noble George-Douglas, Duke of Argyll, had been duly elected a Knight of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle.

Then, by command of the Sovereign, the Duke of Argyll was received at the door of the Chapter-room by the Duke of Atholl and Lord Panmure, the two junior Knights Brethren, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by the Secretary (bearing on a velvet cushion the Ensigns of the Order), and by the Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod.

The Sword of State being thereupon delivered to the Sovereign by His Royal Highness the Prince Albert, the senior Knight, the Duke of Argyll, kneeling near the Queen, was knighted therewith; after which his Grace had the honour to kiss Her Majesty's hand; the Duke rising, the oath was administered to his Grace by the Secretary.

The Duke of Argyll then, again kneeling, and the Secretary, on his knee, presenting to Her Majesty the ribband and jewel of the Order, the Queen was graciously pleased to place the same over the Duke's left shoulder.

His Grace, having again kissed the Sovereign's hand, and after receiving the congratulations of the Knights Brethren, retired.

The Chapter being ended, the Knights Brethren were, by command of Her Majesty, again called over by the Secretary, and, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign with the usual reverences.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consular Agent at Rome, reporting that the following quarantine regulations have been established for the port of Civita Vecchia :—

1. All vessels coming from the Levant, Malta, &c., and all vessels coming from ports admitting to pratique. Vessels coming from the above mentioned ports, five days.

2. Should any sick person or convalescent be on board, 15 days.

3. All goods and merchandize to be landed and disinfected at the Lazaretto.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

PERNAMBUCO HARBOUR.

Board of Trade, May 2, 1856.

A statement having been made by a witness at the investigation held at Liverpool, in the matter of the ship Mermaid, relative to the depth of water on the bar of the Port of Pernambuco, which appeared to Mr Cowper, Her Majesty's Consul there, to be injurious to the interests of the port, as giving an incorrect view of its capabilities for the accommodation of shipping, the following report has been obtained from the Chief Pilot there, and is published for the information of Mariners.

(Translation.)

MOST ILLUSTRIOUS SIR,

In reply to the questions which your Lordship put to me yesterday, it is my duty to inform you—

1st.—That at spring tides the bar of the port of this city has 20 feet of water, and the small bar from 16 to 17, over which vessels drawing from 14 to 15 feet of water can enter, those drawing as much as 17 can do so no higher up than the Poco.

2d.—That as vessels come from the Mosqueira in going out, and have to pass the inner bar near the Light-house, they can do so only drawing from 14 to 15 feet, with a favourable wind.

3d.—Lastly, the great bar, of which I first spoke, being in a line with the Recife, is open to the swell; that within the harbour, which is the greater impediment, is in smooth water.

I may add, although the question was not put to me by your Lordship, that in those anchorages called the Lamerão and Samenheos, vessels of any draft of water can load and unload with facility.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Naples, reporting that the Neapolitan Board of Health has established an absolute quarantine of ten days on all vessels arriving from Malta.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS an Act was passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage."

And whereas another Act was passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office."

And whereas another Act was passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications."

And whereas by the said last-mentioned Act power was given to Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to make and issue such orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions as he should deem to be necessary or expedient for the purpose of regulating the receipt, transmission, and delivery by post of periodical publications under the provisions of that Act.

And whereas George Douglas, Duke of Argyll, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, did, by virtue of the said last-mentioned Act, make and issue certain orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions, bearing date the 24th day of December 1855, which he deemed to be necessary and expedient for the purpose of regulating the receipt, transmission, and delivery by post, of printed newspapers and certain periodical publications under the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, and, amongst other things, of colonial newspapers transmitted by the post.

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for regulating the transmission by the post of the newspapers hereinafter mentioned :

Now, we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury (in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the several before-mentioned Acts,

or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf,) do, by this Warrant under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and consent that the printed colonial newspapers mentioned in the Schedule to this Warrant annexed, shall and may be transmitted by the post between the several places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule to this Warrant annexed, in conformity with, and under and subject to the several orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions made by Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, with the consent aforesaid, bearing date the 24th day of December 1855, so far as the same are applicable thereto, and also to the several further orders and directions hereinafter mentioned and contained, and that the rate of postage for the transmission thereof, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable by law on such newspapers, shall and may be that which is mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule.

And we do further order, direct, and consent, that Her Majesty's Postmaster-General shall and may charge all or any such newspapers sent by the post, otherwise than in conformity with the terms, conditions, and regulations mentioned or referred to in this present Warrant, with such rates or rate of postage, not exceeding in amount such rates or rate as would be chargeable upon the same as letters, or a letter, as to him shall seem fit.

And we do further order and direct that on any newspaper transmitted by the post under the regulations of this Warrant, any Foreign transit rate payable on any such newspaper for passing through any Foreign Country shall be charged and paid thereon, in addition to any British postage.

And we do further order and direct that the term "by the post," used in this Warrant, or in the Schedule hereunto annexed, shall include the conveyance by any British, Foreign, or Colonial packet-boat, and also the conveyance in part by any such packet-boat and in part by private ship, (but not the conveyance entirely by private ship). And that the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant, or in the Schedule hereunto annexed, shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty hereinbefore recited.

And we do further order and direct that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, to alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the further orders and directions of the said Commissioners hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates, orders, and directions, in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

British rate of postage chargeable on colonial newspapers transmitted by the post under the foregoing Treasury Warrant.

Between one British colony and another British colony, by the closed mails, via Marseilles, through the United Kingdom, two pence each.
