*Board of Trade, Whitehall,

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargè d'Affaires at Naples, reporting that the Neapolitan Government has issued a Decree, by which, throughout the Neapolitan dominions, British shipping engaged in the indirect trade will be placed upon the footing of national vessels.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Panama, enclosing copy of a new Tonnage Law recently passed by the Government of New Granada, of which the following are extracts:—

Article 3d.—The tonnage dues, port dues, pilotage, and visit fees, shall be the same in all the ports of the Republic, including the free ports of the Isthmus of Panama, Carthagena, Checo, Buenaventura, and Tumaco, and the following sums shall be collected:

- 1st. Every vessel under 100 tons, shall pay 40 cents per Granadian ton for her capacity.
- 2d. Every vessel exceeding 100 tons, shall pay 40 cents for the first 100 tons, and 20 cents for the balance over and above the said 100 tons.
- 3d. Tonnage dues shall only be paid at the first port at which a vessel touches, proceeding from foreign countries; vessels proceeding from one port to another in the Republic shall not pay tonnage dues.

4th. War vessels of the country, or friendly relations and transports assimilated to them, which may touch at the ports of the Republic, shall not pay tonnage dues.

5th. The Executive may exempt from tonnage dues and permit to coast, sail or steam vessels that agree to convey the mails between ports of the Republic, and carry such correspondence gratis as may be entrusted to them. Those that do not agree to this shall pay tonnage dues, cash in hard dollars of the country.

6th. Vessels arriving in ballast, or which in New Granada, shall not pay tonnage neither shall those chartered to bring grants to the Republic, when the number same exceed fifty.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Postmaster-General to remit any of the rates of British postage for the time being payable by law on the transmission of post letters, newspapers, or other printed papers, to such extent as the Lords of the Treasury shall from time to time direct; and power is also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates.

And whereas, further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-Office."

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have, at various times, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers so reserved and given to them as aforesaid, by divers Warrants under their hands made and given, certain regulations, orders, and directions whereby the several persons in such Warrants respectively mentioned and described, being persons employed in the several military, naval, or transport services under Her Majesty respectively mentioned in the said several Warrants, were authorised to send and receive letters transmitted by the post between the several places therein respectively mentioned, by the means and routes therein respectively mentioned and set forth at certain reduced rates of postage therein specified, and also whereby the said several persons were authorised to receive packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, and packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, transmitted by the Post, and sent and addressed to the said several persons respectively, from any place in the United Kingdom to the said

several places in the said several Warrants respectively mentioned, by the means and routes, and at the rates of postage therein respectively mentioned.

And whereas the necessity and occasion for such regulations, orders, directions, and rates of postage having ceased, it is expedient that such Warrants, and such regulations, orders, directions, and rates of postage therein contained, should be altered, repealed, and revoked.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said two before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order and direct that the several Warrants, and parts of a Warrant, mentioned and set forth in the Schedule to this Warrant annexed, shall be, and the same are hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, respectively, and that the several regulations, orders, directions, and rates of postage in such several Warrants and parts of a Warrant, respectively mentioned and set forth, shall wholly cease and determine.

(No. 28.) UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

The Light-house Board of the United States has issued the following notices:—

Red Light at the Narrows, Boston Harbour.

A fixed red light was exhibited on the night of the first of August 1856, (in conformity to previous notice), from the screw pile lighthouse erected on the Spit abreast the Narrows, Boston Harbour.

The house is a hexagonal building, painted a dark brown colour; is elevated on seven iron piles, and surmounted with an iron lantern.

The light is designed as a guide for clearing the Spit, by vessels passing through the main ship channel, and is illuminated by a lens apparatus of the 6th order, elevated 35 feet above high-water mark.

This light in range with Long Island Head Light will take a vessel clear of the Harding's.

From Point Alderton Buoy this light is in range with Long Island Head Light, and they bear W.N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. This course will take a vessel, by the buoy, in 19 feet water at low tide. Large vessels, in entering, should bring Long Island Head Light open to the northward of the Spit Light.

The following magnetic bearings are given from this light:

- False Spit Buoy, E.S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
- Point Alderton Buoy, E.S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
- North Centurion Buoy, S.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S.
- Long Island Head Light, W.N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.
- Mix's Mate Beacon, N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

Fog Bells on Mount Desert and Matinicus Rocks, Coast of Maine.

A fog bell, weighing 1,500 pounds, has been placed on Mount Desert Rock, near the lighthouse. The bell is placed on an open frame structure, painted white and brown, and is about 50 feet above the level of the sea. It is worked by machinery, and strikes about seven times in one minute.

A bell of the same weight has been placed on Matinicus Rock, on a frame precisely like that of the Mount Desert Rock Bell. This bell strikes ten times in one minute.

Both of these bells will be sounded hereafter in thick weather.
