DUBLIN CASTLE, January 30, 1857.

This day His Excellency the Grand Master (by Her Majesty's command), held a Chapter of the Most Illustrious Order of St Patrick, at the Castle of Dublin.

The following Knights Companions, in their Mantles, Stars, and Collars, assembled in the Robing Room, viz.:—The Earl of Howth, the Marquess of Headfort, Lord Farnham, Viscount Massereene and Ferrard, and the Marquess of Londonderry, attended by the following Officers of the Order:—His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin, the Chancellor; the Hon. and Very Rev. the Dean of St Patrick's, the Registrar: Lowry V. Townley Balfour, Esq. the Secretary; Colonel Sir George Morris, Usher of the Black Rod; Sir Bernard Burke, Ulster King of Arms, Knight Attendant on the Order; Molyneux Betham, Esq. Cork Herald; and Sheffield Betham, Esq. Dublin Herald.

At Three o'Clock, p.m., the Knights Companions were called over by Ulster, and proceeded to the presence of the Grand Master, who was seated in the Chair of State in the Throne Room, and they, with the usual reverences, took their respective seats at the table, according to their stalls.

His Excellency then commanded Ulster to read Her Majesty's Letter authorizing the Chapter to

be held, which being done, the Earl of Granard was introduced by the Gentleman Usher and Ulster King of Arms, and kneeling, received the honour of Knighthood, and retired.

His Excellency the Grand Master then communicated to the Chapter that Her Majesty had been pleased to nominate Sir George Arthur Hastings, Knight, Earl of Granard, to be a Knight Companion of the Most Illustrious Order, and to command that his Lordship be invested with the Ribbon and Badge.

By command of the Grand Master, the two Junior Knights present proceeded to the door of the Chapter Room, and (Ulster bearing the insignia of the Order before them on a velvet cushion) conducted the Earl of Granard between them to the right of the Chair of State, where His Lordship made and subscribed the declaration appointed by the Statutes; and His Excellency the Grand Master, assisted by the two Senior Knights Companions present, put the Ribbon with the Badge over the Earl's right shoulder, pronouncing the admonition, after which the Earl was congratulated by His Excellency and the Knights present, and took his seat at the table.

The same form of procedure was followed for the investiture of Sir Hugh Viscount Gough, G.C.B.

Ulster, Knight Attendant, then called over the names of the Knights Companions present, who each rose from his seat on the pronouncement of his name, and retired with the usual reverences, whereupon the Chapter broke up.
