

Board of Trade, Whitehall, June 11, 1857.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Madrid, transmitting a translation of a Royal Order, a copy of which is subjoined, respecting errors in Ships' Manifests.

"If on comparing the manifest with the certificate given by the Consul, it should appear exact, it shall be so expressed, the Accountant affixing the date and putting his signature. If a difference should appear, the Collector shall exact from the captain or master, or in his absence, from the ship's owner, or from the legally recognized consignee, the amount of the duty on the goods contained in each bale, which being found on board, is in excess of the manifest, and a surcharge equal in amount to these duties to be distributed between the Treasury and the officers who make the discovery; but if the difference should consist in a lesser amount being found on board than are manifested, there shall be exacted from the captain, or in his default from the owner or consignees, the duties corresponding to the goods expressed in the Consular certificate, and a surcharge of double these duties to be divided between the Treasury and the officers making the discovery.

"This regulation shall be always applied when the goods which the bales contain, or ought to contain, are of lawful commerce, but with the exception of luggage when not subject to duty and of the goods belonging to the crew of the vessel, the value of which does not exceed 1000 reals (£10), for each individual.

"Whenever, in cargoes of coal or any other merchandize in bulk, the bill of lading, the declaration of the consignee, and the result of the search, should agree, but a difference in excess or default should appear in the manifest, a fine shall be exacted from the captain equivalent to the difference between the merchandize expressed in

the manifest and those which would correspond to the quantity declared in the Consular certificate.

"If the goods in which a difference results be prohibited, the same penalties shall be enforced as are established for errors between what is expressed in the manifest and what results from the the search.
