THE following Papers have been received at the East India House:—

No. 1.

Extract Military Letter from Bengal, No. 307; dated December 3, 1857.

The accompanying correspondence noted in the margin reports the operations of Colonel Wilson, commanding at Cawnpore, against a division of the Delhi fugitives, mustering three thousand men, and eight guns, whom he attacked at Sheorajpore, twenty-two miles from Cawnpore, and completely routed them.

Colonel N. Wilson, Commanding at Cawnpore, to Major-General Mansfield, Chief of the Staff, Calcutta.

Sir, October 21, 1857.

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that intelligence reached me during the day of the 17th instant that the first division of the Delhi fugitives, mustering 3,000, with eight guns, had reached Sheorajpore, a village situated in almost an open country, twenty-two miles from this.

2. That active communication was being carried on with this force by the Nawa, who was endeavouring to subvert their intention of crossing into Oudh, by high offers of pay and rewards, if they would support him at Bittow, a strong position, capable of easy defence, where a large amount of his valuables are reported to be secreted.

I deemed it inadvisable that so large a body

I deemed it inadvisable that so large a body should get into a position of strength so close as to menace Cawnpore, and equally so, that they should pass unmolested into Oudh. I therefore determined to attack, and if possible, surprise them; with which view I marched from here at one o'clock A.M. on the 18th instant, with the force detailed in the margin,* reached the first rebel picket of

cavalry, four miles from their encampment, at 2 o'clock P.M. This picket was surprised, and partially destroyed, by my small cavalry advanced guard, but the remainder conveyed the first intelligence of our approach to the enemy, half an hour before we came in front of them. They turned out to be posted in two parties, one under large trees in front of the village, and bridge over a deep nullah, and the other in a garden behind the village.

Upon our approaching within 1,000 yards they opened their guns upon us, followed, as we lessened our distance, by musketry. Our advancing skirmishers upon the flanks gradually crept up; those upon the left, which were ably handled by Captain Wolseley, Her Majesty's 90th Light Infantry, approaching the enemy's right front, doubtless made their Enfield Rifles tell upon the rebel gunners, for they began to remove their guns. I then followed up with the whole force, passing the bridge, and driving the rebels out of the village, beyond which I again reformed, continuing the pursuit.

By this time the flight had turned into a complete route, and they fled so precipitately that, though a number of ordnance stores, &c., fell into our hands, the guns which were horsed escaped, owing to our want of cavalry.

The few police horse with me followed the rebels up for some miles, but they went off so fast that the Sowars were only able to destroy a few straggling sepoys. The loss on the part of the rebels was considerable; that of my force three killed and six wounded.

Having bivouacked for the night in the garden occupied by the rebels, I moved at daybreak on the 19th to the ferry abreast of Sheorajpore, distant four miles, hoping to come up with any of the rebels who might attempt to effect the passage of the river, and to destroy any boats found there.

During the night, however, some of the boats were removed to the opposite bank, and one or two shifted up river, by a small party of fugiti which was said had occupied the jungle, into who guns could not penetrate, and not thinking it products to detach, I determined to return to Bitton On arrival abreast the village of Kurruch other situated half the way to Bittoor in a jungle of the state o

quarter of a mile from the road, and almost entirely owned by mutineer sepoys, many of whom had only a few days previously returned from Delhi. I halted the column, and detached a company to destroy any rebel sepoys who might be found there. Some escaped upon the approach of this party, but those overtaken were shot down, and the houses of all that were pointed out by Captain Bruce destroyed.

Two or three regular cavalry horses being taken, the force then rested at Bittoor for the night, returning to Cawnpore yesterday morning at 8 o'clock.

Herewith I inclose returns of killed and wounded, also returns of advance stores captured from the rebels in the village of Sheorajpore.

I take this opportunity of recommending to the notice of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, Major Barnston, Her Majesty's 90th Light 90th Light Infantry, who led on his men with much steadiness and gallantry. To Captain Bruce, 5th Punjaub Cavalry, and Captain Impey, Executive Engineer (who volunteered his services,) I am very much indebted for their valuable assistance. Barrackpore, November 16, 1857. I HAVE the honour to forward, for the information of the Commander-in-Chief, and for the purpose of being submitted to the Government of India, the annexed copy of a despatch from Colonel Forster, C.B., commanding Shekhawattee battalion, dated the 13th current, reporting a successful field operation recently accomplished in the Maunbhoom district by a wing of that regiment under his personal command.

2. It affords me much satisfaction to be the channel of making known to his Excellency and to Government the good and soldier-like conduct of all ranks on this occasion, and at the same time to bring prominently to favourable notice the zeal and intelligence of Colonel Forster, who is an officer of great Indian experience, and of acknowledged ability. The Officer Commanding the Shekhawattee Bat-talion, to the Assistant Adjutant-General Presidency Division.

Camp, Poorolea, November 13, 1857. I HAVE much pleasure in reporting for the information of the Major-General commanding the Presidency Division, that the wing of the Shekbawattee Battalion under my command having successfully accomplished all that was required of them by Government in Maunbhoom, the Commissioner of Burdwan (now present in camp) will report the same for the satisfaction of his Lordship in Council, and of his Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal.

Mr E. Lushington informs me that our services will now not be needed here, and in the event of my not receiving immediate further orders for any other duty, I shall, with the concurrence and advice of the officiating Commissioner, retrace my steps towards Midnapore viâ Bancoorah, as soon as our services are finally dispensed with at

Poorolea.

The great scarcity of atta and other food for the troops obtainable at Poorolea, renders a move advisable, the supplies from Calcutta not having as yet reached us.

I am to make over the Chief of Packete (Neelmoney Sing), who is a prisoner under my charge at present, to the civil and political officer

(Captain Davies).

The native officers and sepoys, I am proud and happy to add, have most zealously and cheerfully undergone the fatigue and privations, for they were on half rations of atta for many days, and for some days without any, and have given proofs, by their alacrity in surrounding the Chief's camp, and his four hundred followers, and taking him a prisoner, and subsequently proceeding against the formidable stronghold at Kasheepore, which surrendered to the troops, capturing four pieces of artillery, a large number of arms and munitions of war, together with treasure, all which had been buried and hid under rubbish and earth, of their earnest loyalty.

The fort I have delivered over to Mr Lushington, the officiating Commissioner, and it is safely

occupied by the police of this district.

I must now hope that these favourable results

accomplished in a complete and decisive manner, without the aid of artillery and Europeans, (which assistance was deemed advisable by the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal to make, but which his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief could not at present grant,) upon which his Honour, the Lieutenant-Governor, was pleased to leave the conduct of the future hostile proceedings in this district entirely to my discretion and judgment, these measures will, by their complete and successful results, I trust, obtain for me your approbation and that of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, as well as of his Lordship the Governor-General in Council, for the moral effect thus produced has been of value in causing the entire districts of Singhbhoom and Maunbhoom to settle down into perfect quietness.

The Officer Commanding the Shekhawattee Battalion to Lieutenant-Colonel A. Sanders, Deputy Quartermaster-General of the Army.

Sir, Camp, Rogonathpore, November 9, 1857. I no myself the honour to report, for the satisfaction of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, having been called upon to coerce the Chief of Packete, and to gain possession of his stronghold at Kasheepore (if I deemed the force at my disposal sufficient for that object,) I lost no time in marching at once towards Rogonathpore on the morning of the 6th instant, and having accomplished the distance of thirty miles, on the following day I had the honour to join Mr E. Lushington, officiating Commissioner of Burdwan at Rogonathpore, with whom I was desired to consult before adopting any ulterior proceedings.

The Chief Neelmoney Sing I found encamped a

The Chief Neelmoney Sing I found encamped a short distance close to the neighbouring hills, with about 400 followers, and had finally refused to come in and deliver himself up, or to answer for his late contumacious conduct to the Commissioner,

openly defying British authority.

There remained but one obvious line for me to pursue, and having obtained the concurrence of the officiating Commissioner, I moved up my troops with the view to compel him to obedience.

The moment this Chief saw us approach, and when within musket-shot, his heart appeared to fail him, and he quickly proceeded in his palankeen

to meet and surrender himself to me.

Having got possession of his person, I brought him up to camp, and duly gave him up to the officiating Commissioner, who subsequently requested me to keep him under a guard in camp,

where he still remains a prisoner.

Yesterday, the 8th instant, I proceeded with the disposable portion of the wing of the Shekhawattee battalion to the Chief's stronghold at Kasheepore, which I found to be a much more formidable defensive post than was represented to me; it has strong high walls, twenty-five feet high, with loopholes, an outer ditch, and (recently erected) outer defences; these had been made with fresh earthworks. There were four guns within the fort, two of them English (iron 6-pounders), and two smaller native 3-pounders, with a number of wall pieces; the former I have spiked. This fort was finally made over to the civil authorities when we evacuated it, and Mr Lushington has placed a police guard for the present.

Great quantities of powder, matchlocks, swords, ment 12th Respears, and other warlike stores were found con- Light Cavalry.

cealed under rubbish; the powder I destroyed, although, from the quantities of sulphur, saltpetre, and other ingredients discovered hid, there is no reason to doubt that a manufactory for ammunition of all descriptions had been established within this dangerous hold thus timely secured by us.

I now trust that these successful operations, promptly achieved without bloodshed or aid of artillery, will prove acceptable both to his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, as well as to his

Lordship in Council.

I cannot express too highly the zealous, willing, and ardent manner in which the whole of the native officers and men of this force conducted themselves in these operations, supported as we were by the active and energetic decision of the officiating Commissioner of Burdwan, together with no less earnest endeavours of Captain Davies, officiating Assistant Commissioner of Maunbhoom, to back my humble efforts in effecting the decisive termination of this successful operation. I cannot omit the cheerful and varied assistance of Mr Assistant-Surgeon H. R. Daniell, whose aid I found of the highest value, in the absence of any other officer with this wing.

GENERAL ORDERS OF THE GOVERNOR OF BOMBAY.

Bombay Castle, January 8, 1858. No. 40 of 1858.

THE Right Honourable the Governor in Council has received a detailed report, drawn up by Captain Simpson, of the 2d Light Cavalry, the officer in command, and submitted to Government by his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, of the gallant defence made by the troops* in the fortified enclosure at Neemuch, against the attack of a large body of rebels, estimated at 4,000 men, from the district of Mundisore.

In this defence, the details of which have been already published to the army by his Excellency

the Commander-in-Chief, the conduct of every officer and of every soldier present was alike remarkable for courage, cool and collected, in the hours of action, and sustained with unflinching durance during thirteen days and nights of incessant watching and exhausting and laborious duty. The thanks of Government are especially due to Captain Simpson, who commanded on this trying and difficult occasion, and to all those who so honourably served under his orders.

THE Right Honourable the Governor in Council has very great satisfaction in publishing, for the information of the Army, the following report made to his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief by Brigadier Stuart, commanding the Malwa Field Force (now 1st Brigade Nerbudda Field Force), of his successful operations against the insurgents assembled near Mundisore, during four days, from the 21st to the 24th November last.

Brigadier Stuart, Commanding Malwa Field Force, to the Adjutant-General of the Army, Bombay.

Sir, Camp, Mundisore, 30th November 1857. WITH reference to my telegrams of the 25th and 26th instant, I have now the honour to forward the reports, and to communicate, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, full particulars of the successful operations in which the Malwa Field Force, and the Field Force Hyderabad Contingent, under cemmand of Major Orr, were engaged on the 21st, 22d, 23d, and 24th instant, against the rebel enemy in the

vicinity of Mundisore.

2. On the morning of the 21st November, this force, accompanied by the Field Force Hyderabad Contingent, which, as I have already reported, is co-operating with me under command of Major Orr, arrived within three miles and a half of Mundisore about 9 A.M., and, as I had no good information as to the roads or the country in the immediate vicinity of the town, nor as to the fords of the river Sowna, which it was necessary to cross before reaching the town, I determined upon encamping until a good reconnoissance had been effected. The rebel enemy at Mundisore hearing of our approach had posted picquets entirely covering the country over which we were advancing, and observing our picquets thrown out, they mustered in some force outside the walls of the town, and appeared inclined to attack. I however contented myself with reinforcing the picquets, and leaving the whole charge of the front to Major Robertson, 25th Regiment Native Infantry. The field officer of the day returned to camp about 3 o'clock P.M. I received intimation from him that the enemy were advancing in force, and threatening both our flanks and centre at same time. I accordingly moved out to meet them. They advanced steadily with banners flying, and appeared in great numbers. On approaching our right front however, they were most gallantly charged by Lieutenant Dew, Her Ma-

Orr, commanding 3d Regiment Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent, supported Lieutenant Dew, and the enemy were driven back with great loss; and before our guns, which had quickly moved up, could open upon them, the attack on our centre was repulsed by a few rounds of our artillery, whilst that on the left was successfully met by the field force under Major Orr. The enemy having been thus driven back at all points, were pursued for some distance—in fact, until they nearly reached the walls of the town; and nothing further occurred that day.

3. Having received intelligence from the Governor-General's agent that the portion of the rebel army before Neemuch, amounting to about 5,000, would probably raise the siege of that place, and endeavour to effect a junction with their head-quarters at Mundisore, I determined to frustrate this by intercepting them. Accordingly, early on the morning of the 22d instant, I moved forward my force in order of battle. Our advance was unopposed, and on my left flank reaching the village of Kuljepore, I made a flank movement to the left, as previously determined on, leaving the advance guard to cover it, and to reinforce the rear guard, as we crossed the Bakri ford of the river Sowna, about 1,400 yards to south-west of the town of Mundisore. Thus secured, the movement was safely effected, opposed only by a slight and ineffective fire from a gun on one of the south-west bastions of the town. I then encamped, facing the west of the town, my flanks well protected by the two branches of the river, and my line running at right angles to the right of Sir Thomas Hislop's camp in 1817. Just previous to the camp being marked out, it was reported that cavalry were seen on the left, and Major Orr, taking the 1st Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent under Captain Abbott, and 4th Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent under Captain Murray, saw about 300 horse, supposed to be under Heera Sing, endeavouring to draw them off in a north-westerly direction, but keeping at too great a distance to allow of being attacked. Reinforcements of cavalry were sent for, and whilst the left wing of Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons under Captain Gall, and 3d Cavalry Hyderabad Contin-, gent under Lieutenant Clerk, were moving up, intelligence was brought to Major Orr that Heera, Sing's baggage had just left the village of Goraria, on the Neemuch road. The object of Heera Sing's party to draw our cavalry away from his baggage, thus being apparent, Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons, the 1st Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent, and the 4th Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent, galloped off in pursuit, the 3d Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent remaining as a reserve. They caught up the enemy about two miles south of Peeplia, and, after cutting up about 200 of them, halted at a nulla a mile to the south of that village. On perceiving it strongly occupied by the enemy's infantry, who showed many standards, they then returned to

4. Feeling assured that the infantry seen in Peeplia formed the advance guard of the enemy, I moved at 8 o'clock A.M. on the 23d instant by my left, and crossed the northern branch of the river Sowna. I then halted my column, and collected all my baggage on the reverse flank, then moving on to my proposed camp on the Neemuch and Mundisore road, ready to oppose the enemy either from one or the other direction. On coming on to the ground, the enemy appeared in great force to the north; so, ordering my baggage to be collected on a strong mound, I strongly reinforced my rear guard and proceeded to meet them. After a short advance I formed line to my front, facing northjesty's 14th Light Dragoons, who, with some of his wards, and found the enemy occupying a very men, occupied the ground as a picquet. Captain strong position, with their right in and beyond,

by a date nulla and lines of date-trees, their battery of six guns on rising ground, with a large mud hut protecting their gunners, and their left stretched along the ridge running east from the village. My line advanced, covered by skirmishers; the enemy's infantry, with banners flying (many of them green), moved down to meet us through the intermediate fields of high jowarree, and their guns opened fire. I immediately halted my line, and replied to the fire with Captains Hungerford and Woolcombe's batteries, at a range of about 900 yards. After a few rounds I again advanced the line, and permitted Captain Hungerford to move his half battery to a position on our right front, from which he could enfillade the enemy. After an advance of about 300 yards our line was again halted, and firing resumed, that from both batteries being very effective. A most gallant charge was then made on the enemy's guns by the escort of Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons attached to under Lieutenant Martin, Captain Hungerford, who found however that the position was still very strongly held by the enemy's infantry, and was compelled to retire, he himself being very severely wounded. Captain Hungerford's half battery was again advanced to within 100 yards, and after a round or two of grape, the guns were at once again charged and captured, the enemy flying in great numbers into the village to their right. The 3d Regiment Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent, under Captain S. Orr, was just at this moment rapidly advanced by our right front, and having been wheeled to the left, it swept down upon them in their retreat, and killed great numbers. line then changed front about the eighth of a circle, right thrown forward, and moved steadily on the village, which evidently held great numbers of the enemy; their skirmishers disputed our advance, but were soon driven back. Having halted within about 300 yards of the village, our artillery opened upon it with shot and shell, after which I directed the infantry to advance and carry it. The men of the 86th and 25th Regiments dashed forward in the most gallant manner, and having entered the village, commenced to drive all before They soon met however with very warm opposition, the enemy having taken possession in great force of many houses, from which a most harassing fire was kept up on our men. Under these circumstances, and as, moreover, I could get no satisfactory accounts of what was passing in my rear, which I knew, from the firing I heard, as also from the pressing applications I had received for reinforcements, had been warmly engaged, I recalled the infantry, and posted strong picquets all round the village, and moved the remainder of the men a short distance off, to where the baggage had been passed up from the rear. I then learnt that during the afternoon, when we were hotly engaged in the front, a strong body of the enemy from Mundisore attacked our rear, and endeavoured to carry off the siege train, baggage, &c.; they were however most gallantly repulsed on every occasion. In one of these attacks I regret to say that Lieutenant Redmayne, Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons, was killed, while most bravely leading his men against the enemy. Notwithstanding the many attempts made by the enemy to press upon and harass our rear, it gives me great satisfaction to be able to state that not a particle of baggage was lost, nor a follower injured. On this occasion Lieutenant Leith, commanding a squadron 14th Light Dragoons, appears to have done good service; as also Lieutenant Fenwick, 25th Regiment Native Infantry, in charge of the baggage. - 5. On the 24th instant I arranged with Captain Hungerford, Commandant of Artillery, that the village of Goraria, in which the rebels had taken refuge, should be well shelled and again assaulted by the infantry. Accordingly, I moved up to it about noon, and found that the enemy were as I had left them the preceding evening, excepting that a few had attempted to escape, nearly all of whom were killed. After a heavy fire of three hours duration, the detachment, Her Majesty's 86th Regiment, under command of Major Keane, and the 25th Regiment, Native Infantry, under Major Robertson, again stormed the village, and carried it, killing great numbers of the enemy, they themselves also suffering severely. At sunset I withdrew the troops, intending to move against the fort of Mundisore the next day. Early, however, on the morning of the 25th instant, intelligence reached me that the enemy had during the night completely evacuated Mundisore, and were scattered in flight throughout the country in various directions, having lost, it is computed, about fifteen hundred of their number during our operations against them. I accordingly removed my camp to Mundisore, and am now engaged in dismantling the fort, destroying the guns, &c., before leaving this neighbourhood.
- 6. By the successful operations of the Malwa Field Force and Field Force Hyderabad Contingent in the vicinity of Mundisore, the Neemuch garrison has been relieved from the assault with which it was threatened; the insurgent rebels have been dispersed from their stronghold, in which for months past they have been daily collecting all those disaffected to our rule, and peace and order will now, it is to be hoped, be re-established in these districts.
- 7. I must now, in conclusion, place on record my grateful acknowledgments to Colonel Durand, Officiating Agent to the Governor-General for Central India, for his cordial assistance to me on all occasions. He was present in the field through-out the operations, and gave me the benefit of his advice, which proved of great service to me. Major Orr, Commanding Field Force Hyderabad Contingent, most ably co-operated with me on all occasions; and to him, and all under his command, I am very much indebted. To Major Boileau, Field Engineer, and his assistants, Lieutenants Prendergast (severely wounded) and Gordon; to Captain Mayne, Intelligence Department; to Captain Coley, Major of Brigade; to Lieutenant Macdonald, Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General; to Lieutenant Thain, Sub-Assistant Commissary General; and to Surgeon Mackenzie, Staff Surgeon, my warmest thanks are due; the assistance rendered me by these officers left me nothing to wish for. A perusal of the report made by Captain Gall, commanding left wing Her Majesty's 14th Light Dragoons, will convey to his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief some idea of the good service performed by all ranks under his command. I most fully concur in Captain Gall's report, and beg to commend to the consideration of his Excellency all the officers and men mentioned by him. Of Captain Gall himself, I must in justice add, that a more able, zealous, and hard-working officer I have never met with, nor one more worthy of distinction. Of Captain Orr, 3d Regiment Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent, and the officers and men under his command, I have already had reason to send the most favourable report to the Resident at Hyderabad. On this last oc-. casion nothing could surpass the bravery shown by Artillery, also distinguished themselves by assist all ranks of this regiment. Captain Orr himself

is, I consider, a first-rate cavalry officer; his daring courage is admired by all, and in every affair in which he is engaged, his personal combats are most prominent features. To Captain Hungerford, Commandant of Artillery Malwa Field Force; and to Captain Woolcombe, Commanding No. 4 Light Field Battery, and the officers and men under their command, my best thanks are due. I do not think artillery practice could have been better; and there can be but little doubt that the successful issue of operations is much to be attributed to their assistance. Of the conduct of Captain Brown, and the officers and men of the B Company Madras Sappers and Miners, I have much pleasure in speaking in the highest terms; whether as sappers or as infantry, they have distinguished themselves on every occasion. They have under-gone an incredible amount of hard labour during our late march with a siege train over a country without roads; nor must I omit to mention that they accompanied the storming parties into the village of Goraria, and proved of the greatest service. My best thanks are also due to Major Keane and the officers and men of the detachment Her Majesty's 86th Regiment; the gallantry of all ranks was most conspicuous, and on both occasions that the village was assaulted, the coolness and daring of the officers and men, at whose head Major Keane placed himself, elicited the praise of My despatch from Dhar will have made his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief aware of the very high opinion I held of Major Robertson, and the officers and men of the 25th Regiment Native During the late operations, nothing Infantry. could have been finer than the behaviour of all in this regiment. Major Robertson distinguished himself on the 21st instant as field officer of the day in the disposition of the picquets, which duty I entirely confided to him, and by the skilful manner in which he met the attack made upon him in force on the afternoon of that day. During the succeeding days Major Robertson rendered me the greatest assistance; the manner in which he led his regiment on two occasions to storm the village of Goraria is beyond praise, and I consider that the admirable conduct of the 25th Regiment Native Infantry fully attests the worth of this officer, who will, I hope, meet with some mark of distinction. In the praise conveyed to Captain Little, 25th Regiment Native Infantry, by his commanding officer, I quite concur; and trust that his Excellency may be able to grant some mark of favour to this deserving officer. In the two attacks on the village of Goraria I could see no difference between the conduct of the men of the 25th Regiment Native Infantry and their comrades of Her Majesty's 86th Regiment; the same daring and gallantry characterised both. Their list of casualties will show how warmly they were engaged; and I trust his Excellency will recognise the merits of this regiment. Before closing this despatch, I beg to report on the admirable conduct of Assistant-Surgeon Butler, 4th Company 2d Battalion Artillery, who, during the engagement on the 23d instant, though suffering severely from sickness, left his dooley, and was engaged in the most active manner during the whole day in assisting to administer comfort to the wounded. The conduct of this officer has been brought to my notice by the Staff Surgeon of the Force, and will, I trust, meet with some rewaard.
