THE following Address of Congratulation to the Queen, on the occasion of the Marriage of Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal with His Royal Highness Prince Frederick William of Prussia, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Home Department for presentation, has accordingly been presented by him to Her Majesty, who has been pleased to receive the same very graciously:—

To The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Yeovil, in the county of Somerset, humbly beg leave to approach your Majesty's Throne with our hearty congratulations on the auspicious Marriage of Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal with His Royal Highness Prince Frederick William of Prussia.

(No. 19.) NORTH ATLANTIC.—STRAIT OF BELLE-ISLE.

Fixed Light on Belle-Isle, Labrador.

The Commissioners of Public Works in Canada have given notice, that on the 15th of March 1858, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on the extreme south-west point of Belle-Isle, Labrador, and continued from sunset to sunrise from that date to the last day of each year.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, placed at an elevation of 470 feet above the level of the sea at high water, and should be visible from the deck of a vessel in clear weather at a distance of 28 miles all round the horizon.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or refracting, of the first order.

The light tower is a circular building of stone, faced externally with fire brick of a light colour. It is 62 feet in height, and stands in lat. $51^{\circ} 53' 00''$ N. ; long. $55^{\circ} 23' 00''$ West of Greenwich.

Fixed Light on Point Amour, Forteau Bay.

Also, that on the 1st of April 1858, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on Point Amour, the south-east point of Forteau Bay, Labrador coast, Strait of Belle-Isle, and the light will be continued all night, from the 15th of April to the last day of each succeeding year.

This light will be a *fixed white* light, elevated 155 feet above high water, and should be seen from the deck of a vessel in clear weather at a distance of 18 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric, or by lenses, of the second order.

The lighthouse is a circular tower of stone, with an external facing of fire brick of a light colour, and 109 feet in height. It stands in lat. $51^{\circ} 27' 30''$ N. ; long. $56^{\circ} 50' 30''$ West of Greenwich.

The light will be *fixed, white*, and placed at an elevation of 136 feet above the level of high

water. It should be visible from the deck of a ship, in clear weather, at the distance of 17 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric, or by lenses, of the first order.

The light tower is a circular structure of stone, faced externally with fire brick of a light colour. Its height is 112 feet, and it stands in lat. $48^{\circ} 51' 37''$ N., long. $64^{\circ} 12' 00''$ West of Greenwich.

Fixed Light on West Point, Anticosti.

Also, that on the 15th of March 1858, a light will be exhibited from the light tower recently erected on West point, the western extremity of the Island of Anticosti, in the entrance of the north-west arm of the Gulf of St Lawrence.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, placed at an elevation of 112 feet above high water, and should be seen from the deck of a vessel in clear weather from a distance of 15 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric, of the second order.

The light tower is circular, and built of stone, with an outward facing of fire brick of a light colour. It is 109 feet in height, and its position is in lat. $49^{\circ} 52' 30''$ N., long. $64^{\circ} 32' 00''$ West of Greenwich.

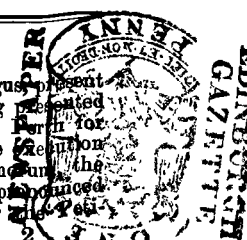
