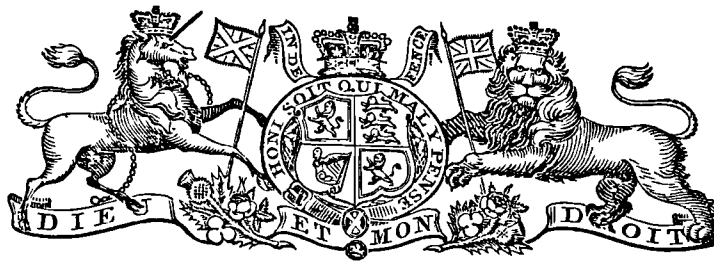

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifty-seventh year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend training, and to regulate "quotas of the Militia," it is, amongst other things enacted, "That it shall be lawful for His Majesty, "by any Order or Orders in Council, to suspend the "calling out of the Militia of the United Kingdom, "or any part of the United Kingdom, or of any "county, riding, shire, stewartry, city, town, or place, "for the purpose of being trained and exercised in "any year, and to order and direct that no training "or exercising of the Militia of the United Kingdom, or of any part of the United Kingdom, or of any "any county or counties, riding or ridings, shire or "shires, stewartry or stewartries, city or cities, town "or towns, or place or places, specified in any such "Order or Orders in Council, shall take place in "any year, anything contained in any Act or Acts "of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding."

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to suspend the calling out of the Militia of certain parts of the United Kingdom hereinafter mentioned, for the purpose of being trained and exercised, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby suspend the calling out of the regiments of Militia specified in the schedule annexed to this Order for the purpose of being trained and exercised in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, which schedule is hereby directed to be taken as part of this Order; and it is further ordered that this Order, and the said schedule, be published in the London Gazette.

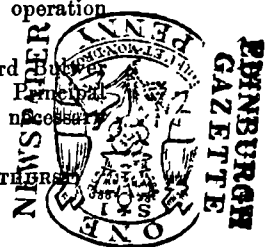
WHEREAS by the "West Indian Encumbered Estates Act, 1854," provision was made to facilitate the sale and transfer of Encumbered Estates in the several West India Colonies named in a schedule to the said Act, (among which is the colony of Tobago,) and it was enacted that Her Majesty might, from time to time, by Order in Council, direct the said Act to come into operation in any of the said Colonies, but that no such Order in Council should be made in respect of any Colony until the legislature thereof should have presented an Address to Her Majesty, praying Her Majesty to issue such Order, and should also have made provisions to the satisfaction of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, for payment of the salaries of the Local Commissioners in the said Act mentioned, and of all such assistant secretaries, clerks, messengers, and officers, as might be appointed under the said Act, in such Colony, and of such other expences of carrying the said Act into execution as were therein directed to be provided for by the said legislature.

And whereas the legislature of Tobago, by an Address dated the 22d December 1857, has prayed Her Majesty to issue such Order as aforesaid, and by an Act passed on the 13th January 1858, entitled "An Act for carrying into execution in Tobago the West Indian Encumbered Estates Act, 1854," has made provision for the payment of such salaries and other expences as aforesaid, to the satisfaction of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

It is therefore hereby ordered, by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said "West Indian Encumbered Estates Act, 1854," shall, from the date of this Order in Council, come into operation in the Colony of Tobago.

And the Right Honourable Sir Edward Lytton, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

INDIA BOARD, August 2, 1858.

THE following General Order has been this day received at the East India House :—

GENERAL ORDER BY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA.

No. 1855.—Foreign Department.

Allahabad, June 24, 1858.

THE Right Honourable the Governor-General has the highest gratification in announcing that the town and fort of Gwalior were recovered by Major-General Sir H. Rose, on the 19th instant, after a general action, in which the rebels, who had usurped the authority of Maha Rajah Scindia, were totally defeated.

On the 20th June the Maha Rajah Scindia, attended by the Governor-General's Agent for Central India and Sir Hugh Rose, and escorted by British troops, was restored to the palace of his ancestors, and was welcomed by his subjects with every mark of loyalty and attachment.

It was on the 1st June that the rebels, aided by the treachery of some of Maha Rajah Scindia's troops, seized the capital of His Highness's kingdom, and hoped to establish a new Government, under a Pretender, in His Highness's territory. Eighteen days had not elapsed before they were compelled to evacuate the fort and town of Gwalior, and to relinquish the authority which they had endeavoured to usurp.

The promptitude and success with which the strength of the British Government has been put forth for the restoration of its faithful ally to the capital of his territory, and the continued presence of British troops at Gwalior to support His Highness in the re-establishment of his administration, will afford to all a convincing proof that the British Government has the will and the power to befriend those who, like Maha Rajah Scindia, do not shrink from their obligation, or hesitate to avow their loyalty.

The Right Honourable the Governor-General, in order to mark his appreciation of the Maha Rajah Scindia's friendship, and his gratification at the re-establishment of His Highness's authority in his ancestral dominions, is pleased to direct that a royal salute shall be fired at every principal station in India.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that *the Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read ;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Fund and the surplus of Ways and Means to the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty eight, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this session of Parliament.

An Act to amend the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her present Majesty, to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the copyright of designs for ornamenting articles of manufacture.

An Act to authorize the inclosure of certain lands, in pursuance of a special report of the Inclosure Commissioners of England and Wales.

An Act to continue certain Acts to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious diseases among sheep, cattle, and other animals.

An Act to continue certain Turnpike Acts in Great Britain.

An Act to amend an Act of the last Session, to render more effectual the police in counties and burghs in Scotland.

An Act to substitute in certain cases the Bishop of one diocese for the Bishop of another as a trustee of certain trusts.

An Act to simplify the forms and diminish the expense of completing titles to land in Scotland.

An Act to facilitate the sale and transfer of land in Ireland.

An Act to amend the law concerning the powers of Stipendiary Magistrates and Justices of the Peace, in certain cases.

An Act for the re-arrangement of the districts of the County Courts among the judges thereof.

An Act to amend the Act of the ninth and tenth years of Her present Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and to abolish foot passenger tolls on Chelsea Bridge after payment of the sum of eighty thousand pounds and interest.

An Act to repeal certain enactments requiring returns to be made to one of the Secretaries of State.

An Act to amend the law concerning detached parts of counties.

An Act to impose fees on the branding of barrels, under the Acts concerning the herring fisheries in Scotland.

An Act for confirming a scheme, as amended, of the Charity Commissioners for Cowley's Charity, in the parish of Swineshead, in the County of Lincoln.

An Act to amend and extend the Settled Estates Act of 1856.

An Act to enable the Committees of both Houses of Parliament to administer oaths to witnesses in certain cases.

An Act for enabling the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland to acquire certain lands and houses for the site of a new court or courts, and other offices and buildings required for the public service, in extension of the Four Courts in the city of Dublin ; and for other purposes.

An Act to amend the law relating to cheap trains, and to restrain the exercise of certain powers by Canal Companies being also Railway Companies.

An Act to amend an Act of the last Session, for the regulation of the care and treatment of lunatics, and for the provision, maintenance, and regulation of Lunatic Asylums in Scotland.

An Act to regulate the qualifications of practitioners in Medicine and Surgery.

An Act to amend the Act of the twentieth and twenty-first Victoria, chapter eighty-five.

An Act to declare and define the respective rights of Her Majesty and of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and Duke of Cornwall to the mines and minerals in or under land lying below high-water mark, within and adjacent to the county of Cornwall, and for other purposes.

An Act to incorporate and regulate the Great Southern of India Railway Company, and for other purposes connected therewith.

An Act to alter and improve the boundaries of the Municipal Borough and District of Middlesbrough; to enable the Local Board of Health of the District to enlarge the Market-place, to enable the Corporation to construct landing-places on the north side of the River Tees, and to establish a public passage up and over the said river; to transfer the powers of the Burial Board to the Local Board; and to confer other powers on the Local Board and the Corporation; and for other purposes.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

*Board of Trade, Whitehall,  
August 2, 1858.*

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Dunkirk, stating that owing to the neglect of Shipmasters to comply with the Police Regulations at that Port, issued in August 1857, the authorities have republished an Extract of the same, of which a translation is subjoined.

(Translation.)

PORT OF DUNKIRK.

Police Regulations of the 18th August 1857.

Extract Notice for Continual Guidance of Captains.

*N.B.*—For all that is not inserted in this extract notice, Captains must conform themselves to the general rules, which they will find at the Harbour Master's Office.

Captains frequenting the harbour are urgently requested to keep a copy of this extract notice.

CHAPTER THE 1ST.

ART. II. All vessels coming in or going out must hoist their National flag.

ART. III. All Captains, on their arrival in port, must have their jib booms rigged in, anchors stowed on the forecastle, all sails furled, and their lower yards picked.

ART. VII. Captains must report their arrival at the Harbour Master's Office within 24 hours of their coming in. This report regulates the turn to obtain a quay berth.

CHAPTER THE 3D.

ART. II. No movement can take place in port unless with leave, and according to the Harbour Master's orders.

ART. VI. Harbour Masters have the power of putting on board of vessels sufficient hands, according to what they think necessary, to insure the execution of the movements they order, at the expense of the captains, consignees, or owners of the vessels.

ART. VII. It is forbidden to unfurl sails during the night. During a gale captains or shipkeepers must double their hawsers, &c.

ART. VIII. Captains are obliged every evening to have the quay opposite to their vessels swept, and as far as half the distance which separates them from the next vessels.

ART. IX. All vessels must hoist their National flags on Sundays and Holy days.

CHAPTER THE 4TH.

ARTS. V. and VI. Appointed time for loading and unloading of vessels, Sundays and Holy days included.

(This time counts from the day on which the vessel has been placed in a position to commence her loading or unloading,) viz.—

A vessel of 50 tons measurement and under, 3 days.

A vessel above 50 tons, and not exceeding 75 tons, 4 days.

A vessel above 75 tons and not exceeding 100 tons, 5 days.

A vessel above 100 tons and not exceeding 125 tons, 6 days.

A vessel above 125 tons and not exceeding 150 tons, 7 days.

A vessel above 150 tons and not exceeding 175 tons, 8 days.

A vessel above 175 tons and not exceeding 200 tons, 9 days.

A vessel above 200 tons and not exceeding 250 tons, 10 days.

A vessel above 250 tons and not exceeding 300 tons, 11 days.

A vessel above 300 tons and not exceeding 350 tons, 12 days.

A vessel above 350 tons and not exceeding 400 tons, 13 days.

- A vessel above 400 tons and not exceeding 450 tons, 14 days.  
 A vessel above 450 tons and not exceeding 500 tons, 15 days.  
 A vessel above 500 tons and not exceeding 575 tons, 16 days.  
 A vessel above 575 tons and not exceeding 650 tons, 17 days.  
 A vessel above 650 tons and not exceeding 725 tons, 18 days.  
 A vessel above 725 tons and not exceeding 800 tons, 19 days.  
 A vessel above 800 tons and not exceeding 875 tons, 20 days.  
 A vessel above 875 tons and not exceeding 950 tons, 21 days.

48 hours are allowed beyond the time of unloading, to finish to take away the goods.

24 hours are allowed beyond the time of unloading to vessels which will be in want of taking ballast to stiffen them, after they are discharged.

In case of a force put (*sic. in orig.*) sufficiently verified, which should have prevented the entire loading or unloading within the time allowed, the Harbour Masters will have the power of granting an extension.

ART. VII. All vessels unloading on the quay are obliged to make use of spars, planks, or tarpaulins, for heavy goods or others, specially appointed by the regulations.

#### CHAPTER THE 7TH.

ART. III. It is forbidden to have any fire or light on board, unless in a ship's lantern, also to smoke, unless on deck and during the day-time.

It can only be derogated to those rules by special orders from the Harbour Masters, and by having a watch when fire is allowed.
