(No. 10.) MEDITERRANEAN—ADRIATIC.

Harbour Light at Fiume.

THE Vice-President of the Chambers of Commerce and Industry at Fiume has given notice, that on and after the 1st of March 1859, a harbour light would be exhibited all night at the new port of Fiume, at the head of Quarnero Gulf, on the coast of Croatia, in the Adriatic.

The light is a *fixed red light*, placed at an elevation of 28 English feet above the level of the sea, and in ordinary weather should be visible from a distance of 4 or 5 miles.

The light is shown from an iron standard at the extremity of the outer mole-head, and is in about lat. $45^{\circ} 18\frac{3}{4}'$ N., long. $14^{\circ} 25\frac{1}{2}'$ East of Greenwich.

Tertio, That the Classes in the Faculty of Arts with the Exception of the Class of Natural History, and the Classes in the Faculty of Divinity, in the University of *Aberdeen*, shall assemble and be taught in that Portion of the University Buildings hitherto belonging to, and occupied by, *King's College*, with any Additions that may be made thereto; and those in the Faculties of Law and Medicine, and also the Class of Natural History, shall assemble and be taught in that Portion of the University Buildings hitherto belonging to, and occupied by, *Marischal College*, with any Additions that may be made thereto.

Quarto, That the general Library of the University shall be kept at that Portion of the University Buildings hitherto belonging to, and occupied by, *King's College*, but any Library or Libraries to be appropriated to the Faculties of Law and Medicine, shall be placed in Buildings convenient for the Use of these Faculties.
