Copy of a letter from Vice Admiral Sir Thomas Pasley, Bart. Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels at Plymouth, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated the first inst.

SIR—Inclosed is a letter which I received from Capt. Bartholomew of the Havik, together with a paper, containing a particular account of the vessels mentioned in the said letter.

I am, Sir, &c. THOMAS PASLEY.

SIR, His Majesty's sloop Havik, at sea, Jan. 30, 1800.

I have the pleasure to inform you, yesterday morning Captain Wittman, of the Suffiante, made the signal to chace northward; and soon after discovered a ship, lugger, and cutter steering to the S. E. At two P.M. I recaptured the American ship Strafford, from Baltimore, bound to London, mounting sixteen guns. She was taken by the lugger and cutter above mentioned; her cargo worth from 30 to 40,000l.—At half past two I had the pleasure of seeing the lugger strike to the Suffiante; and I have every reason to believe, from the Suffiante's excellent sailing, that the cutter is now in Captain Wittman's possession.
