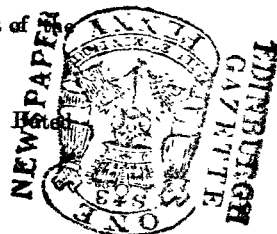

THE following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by William David, Earl of Mansfield, K.T., Her Majesty's Commissioner, to the Right Honourable Thomas Henry Sutton Sotheron Estcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to the Queen, which Address Her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

*May it please your Majesty,*

We, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, convened in this General Assembly, have received with profound respect and gratitude the gracious letter which your Majesty has been pleased to address to us, expressive of the lively interest always evinced by your Majesty in the welfare of the Church of Scotland, and of the satisfaction with which your Majesty contemplated the approach of our present meeting.

His Excellency the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following extracts of letters from the Adjutant-General of the Army, No. 385, of the 22d February 1859, and from Brigadier-General Sir R. Napier, K.C.B., with inclosure, reporting the attack on the Fort of Naharghur by a detachment under the command of Captain F. W. Lambton, Her Majesty's 71st Highlanders.

His Excellency in Council desires to record his high commendation of the intrepidity exhibited in this operation, and his sense of the conspicuous bravery of all concerned in the attack.

Extract of a Letter from the Adjutant-General of the Army to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department, No. 385, of the 22d February 1859.

In transmitting, for the consideration of the Right Honourable the Viceroy and Governor-General in Council, copies of the documents noted in the margin,\* having reference to the attack of the Fort of Naharghur by a detachment under the command of Captain F. W. Lambton, Her Majesty's 71st Highlanders, I am directed by the Commander-in-Chief to state that, in his Excellency's opinion, the conduct of the party of the 71st Regiment cannot be sufficiently praised, as will be seen from the following extract from a private letter addressed by Brigadier-General Sir R. Napier to the Chief of the Staff.

"The news of the affair with Lambton's Detachment brought me down here, as I reported to you.

"It is certainly marvellous to see the works attacked by that small detachment.

"The indomitable pluck of Englishmen is the secret of all their success.

"The small party, far from support, unacquainted with the strength of the garrison and with the country, did not hesitate to attack a place of considerable strength, and had they had a good petard they would have taken it.

"The best shots in India, I believe, they went to work systematically and cleared the parapets; through a chink in the strong gate they fired and cleared the gateway, and drove from two guns planted to command the entrance, the gunners, who were ready to fire on them. They had previously assaulted and taken the two outer gates.

"The place belongs to Kotah. The guns were all burst, and the fort considerably dismantled.

"The Kotah Vakeel has come here, and professes that the Killadar will be hanged when captured.

"The camp followers had got into the town, which was entirely deserted, in spite of guards and sentries posted by Major Chetwode; but, on my arrival here, by putting additional guards, and severely punishing offenders, I put a stop to it, and the town is filling again."

Extract of a Letter from Brigadier-General Sir R. Napier, K.C.B., Commanding Gwalior Division, to Major-General Sir W. R. Mansfield, K.C.B., Chief of the Staff, dated Camp, Naharghur, 31st January 1859, No. 54.

In continuation of my letter, dated 21st instant, I have the honour to report, for the information of the Right Honourable the Commander-in-Chief, that I arrived at Naharghur on the 23d instant, and found the Fort in possession of Major Chetwode's detachment, which had been sent from Goonah to Captain Lambton's assistance.

The garrison abandoned the Fort on the 21st, having maintained a fire of round shot upon Captain Lambton's detachment as long as it continued within range. I beg to transmit Captain Lambton's report.

The Fort is very strong, and had eleven guns, and a garrison of 200 men.

Captain Lambton's party consisted of sixty men of the 71st Regiment. They forced the gate of the Town and the outer gate of the Fort, and only failed in storming the Fort itself from the absolute want of means, except a few pounds of powder, to burst open the strong iron-bound gates of the inner gate-way. In this they nearly succeeded.

The conduct of Captain Lambton and his party evinced the utmost gallantry, and cannot fail to excite the most lively admiration in any person who views the formidable character of the work they attacked, although the origin of the conflict is to be regretted.

It has produced a very great improvement on the bearing of the people in the country, who send supplies into Camp readily, where they were before hardly procurable.

P.S.—The guns in the Fort were destroyed by General Michel's order, and the defences have been partially dismantled.

No. 2.

Captain F. W. Lambton, Commanding Detachment Her Majesty's 71st Highland Light Infantry, to Captain H. O. Mayne, Political Assistant in Gwalior.

Sir, Dated Naharghur.

I HAVE the honour to inform you, that when the detachment under my command, strength as

per margin,\* arrived here yesterday afternoon, I sent to the town for provisions; they were refused, and the Kotwal threatened to shoot the first European that came into the town. An armed party, under command of a subaltern, was sent into the town to seize them. They found the gates closed and matchlocks were fired at them. The remainder of the detachments then proceeded to reinforce the first party, the gates were forced in, and the outer part of the Fort taken with slight resistance. The inner part, however, we were unable to take, owing to the great height of the walls, and there being only one gate, which is strongly plated with iron.

We therefore retired, and attempted again to take it this morning. We were unable to blow it open, owing to the scarcity and coarseness of the powder. The enemy during this time kept up a brisk fire with matchlocks and big guns. I understand that there are two hundred men, and nine or ten guns of different sizes in the Fort. The enemy were frequently summoned to surrender but refused. I await further instructions.

Major G. Chetwode, Commanding at Naharghur, to Captain H. O. Mayne, Political Assistant in Gwalior.

Camp, Naharghur,

January 23, 1859, 2 A.M.

SIR, Your note of yesterday's date has this moment arrived. The Town and Fort of Naharghur have been in our possession since the morning of the 21st, and I am now engaged in blowing up the defences and bursting the guns. I have written to stop the only force that I knew was advancing to join us, namely, some Lancers, Royal Horse Artillery guns, and Native Infantry, that were detached from General Michel's Force, as provisions are so difficult to procure here. As far as I can learn, the garrison of the place only consisted of some 200 men, who have dispersed in the jungle. Maun Sing was not here.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates of Her Majesty's Army, whose claims to the same have been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them in India, as recorded against their several names; viz.—

Regiment or Corps.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
2d Battalion Military Train	Private Michael Murphy, (Farrier)  Date of Act of Bravery, 15th April 1858.	For daring gallantry on the 15th April 1858, when engaged in the pursuit of Kooer Singh's Army from Azimghur, in having rescued Lieutenant Hamilton, Adjutant of the 3d Sikh Cavalry, who was wounded, dismounted, and surrounded by the enemy. Farrier Murphy cut down several men, and although himself severely wounded he never left Lieutenant Hamilton's side until support arrived.
42d Regiment .....	Lance-Corporal Alexander Thompson  Date of Act of Bravery, 15th April 1858.	For daring gallantry on the 15th April 1858, when at the attack of the Fort of Rubya, in having volunteered to assist Captain Groves, Commanding the 4th Punjaub Rifles, in bringing in the body of Lieutenant Willoughby, of that Corps, from the top of the glacis, in a most exposed situation, under a heavy fire.
42d Regiment .....	Quartermaster-Serjeant John Simpson  Date of Act of Bravery, 15th April 1858.	For conspicuous bravery at the attack on the Fort of Rubya, on the 15th April 1858, in having volunteered to go to an exposed point, within forty yards of the parapet of the Fort, under a heavy fire, and brought in, first Lieutenant Douglas, and afterwards a Private soldier, both of whom were dangerously wounded.
42d Regiment .....	Private James Davis  Date of Act of Bravery, 15th April 1858.	For conspicuous gallantry at the attack on the Fort of Rubya, when, with an advanced party, to point out the gate of the Fort to the Engineer Officer, Private Davis offered to carry the body of Lieutenant Bramley, who was killed at this point, to the Regiment. He performed this duty of danger and affection under the very walls of the Fort.

## MEMORANDUM.

Private Edward Spence, 42d Regiment, would have been recommended to Her Majesty for the decoration of the Victoria Cross had he survived. He and Lance-Corporal Thompson of that Regiment volunteered, at the attack of the Fort of Rubya, on the 15th April 1858, to assist Captain Groves, commanding the 4th Punjaub Rifles, in bringing in the body of Lieutenant Willoughby from the top of the glacis. Private Spence dauntlessly placed himself in an exposed position, so as to cover the party bearing away the body. He died on the 17th of the same month, from the effects of the wound which he received on the occasion.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the twelfth of May one thousand eight

hundred and fifty-nine, in the words following,  
viz.—

“Whereas we have had under our consideration the present condition of the Chaplains of your Majesty's Navy, with the view of ameliorating their position, and placing them more on an equality with the Chaplains of your Majesty's Army, in regard to their relative ranks, and rates of pay and half-pay, pensions to their widows,  
&c.

“And whereas we are of opinion that it would be for the advantage of your Majesty's Service

that the following Regulations should be adopted for the Chaplains of the Royal Navy :—

“ 1st. That there shall be Four Classes of Chaplains to rank as follows :—

Fourth Class, under ten years' service, to rank with Lieutenants ;

Third Class, under fifteen years' service, to rank with Commanders ;

Second Class, under twenty years' service, to rank with Captains under three years' standing ;

First Class, above twenty years' service, to rank with Captains above three years' standing ;

and that the Senior Chaplain of Greenwich Hospital shall be recognized as Head of the Naval Chaplains, bear the title of Chaplain of the Fleet, and rank with a Rear-Admiral.

“ 2d. That the Full-pay shall be :

Chaplains under ten years' service, ten shillings per diem.

Chaplains under fifteen years' service, twelve shillings per diem.

Chaplains under twenty years' service, fourteen shillings per diem.

Chaplains above twenty years' service, sixteen shillings per diem.

“ 3d. That the Half-pay shall be :

Chaplains under five years' service, five shillings per diem.

Chaplains above five years' service, six shillings per diem.

Chaplains above ten years' service, seven shillings and sixpence per diem.

Chaplains above fifteen years' service, ten shillings per diem.

Chaplains above twenty years' service, twelve shillings per diem.

“ 4th. That the Pensions to the Widows of Naval Chaplains shall be as follows, provided the Chaplain shall have served one year after his marriage :—

Chaplains under ten years' service on full-pay, fifty pounds per annum.

Chaplains under twenty years' service on full-pay, seventy pounds per annum.

Chaplains above twenty years' service on full-pay, ninety pounds per annum.

“ 5th. That no alteration shall be made in the present rates of additional pay and half-pay allowed to Chaplains of the Royal Navy when holding the office of Naval Instructor.

“ 6th. That no Naval Chaplain who may avail himself of the Regulations shall be allowed to retire under twenty-five years' service, excepting on the ground of permanent unfitness from ill health,—but that such Chaplains now on the list who may prefer to remain on their present rate of full-pay, and under the existing Regulations with regard to half-pay and retirement, shall be allowed to do so.

“ And we beg leave to represent to your Majesty that the Lords of your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in the proposed arrangement.”

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed ; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the twelfth of May one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the words following ; viz :—

“ Whereas we have had under our consideration the necessity of assimilating, as far as possible, the Relative Ranks and Rates of Pay and Half-pay of the Medical Officers of your Majesty's Navy and Army.

“ And whereas we are of opinion that it would be for the advantage of your Majesty's Service that the following Regulations should be adopted for the Medical Officers of the Royal Navy ; viz :—

“ 1st. That there shall be Four Grades of Medical Officers ; viz :—

1. Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets.
2. Deputy-Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets.
3. Surgeon, who, after twenty years' service on full-pay, ten of which in the rank of Surgeon, shall be styled Staff-Surgeon.
4. Assistant-Surgeon.

“ 2d. That no candidate shall be admitted to the examination for a commission in the Medical Department of the Royal Navy who does not possess such a diploma as would qualify a civilian to practice medicine and surgery ; and no such candidate shall receive a commission as Assistant-Surgeon until he shall have satisfactorily passed an examination in naval surgery and hygiene before a Board of Examiners appointed by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

“ 3d. That no Assistant-Surgeon shall be eligible for promotion to the rank of Surgeon until he shall have passed such examination as the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may require, and shall have served on full-pay, with the commission of Assistant-Surgeon for five years, of which two, at least, shall have been passed on board one of your Majesty's sea-going ships.

“ 4th. That no Surgeon shall be eligible for promotion to the rank of Deputy-Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets until he shall have served ten years in your Majesty's Navy on full-pay, of which three, at least, must have been passed in one of your Majesty's ships on some one or more Foreign stations, with the rank of Surgeon.

“ 5th. That no Deputy-Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets shall be eligible for promotion to the rank of Inspector-General until he shall have served five years at home, or three years abroad, in the rank of Deputy-Inspector-General.

“ That in cases of emergency, however, or when the good of your Majesty's Service may render such alteration desirable, it shall be competent for the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to shorten the several periods of service above-mentioned, in such manner as they shall deem fit and expedient.

“ 6th. That the rates of full-pay of the Medical Officers of your Majesty's Navy shall in future be in accordance with the following Schedule :—

" 7th. That every Medical Officer on the Active List, now on half-pay, and those who may be placed on it subsequently to the date of your Majesty's Order in Council authorising this proposal, shall be allowed the half-pay to which his period of service on full-pay shall entitle him, according to the following schedule.

" 8th. That with a view to maintain the efficiency of the Service, all Medical Officers of the ranks of Staff-Surgeon, Surgeon, and Assistant-Surgeon, shall be placed on the Retired List when they shall have attained the age of sixty years; Deputy Inspectors-General shall be placed on such Retired List when they shall have attained the age of sixty-five years; and Inspectors-General when they shall have attained the age of seventy years. Officers thus superannuated shall receive the rates of half-pay mentioned in the preceding schedule.

" 9th. That the relative rank of the Medical Officers of your Majesty's Navy shall be similar to that conferred upon the Medical Officers of the Army, and shall be as follows:—

" An Assistant-Surgeon shall rank as a Lieutenant in the Army, according to the date of his commission, and after six years' service on full-pay, as a Captain in the Army, according to the date of the completion of such service.

" A Surgeon shall rank as Major in the Army, according to the date of his commission; and a Staff-Surgeon as Lieutenant-Colonel, but junior of that rank.

" A Deputy Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets shall rank as Lieutenant-Colonel, according to the date of his commission; and after five years' service on full pay, as Deputy Inspector-General, shall rank as Colonel, according to the date of completion of such service.

" An Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets shall rank as Brigadier-General, according to the

date of his commission; and after three years' service on full-pay, as Inspector-General, shall rank as Major-General, according to the date of completion of such service.

" Provided always, that no Naval Medical Officer, while borne on the books of one of Her Majesty's ships, or employed on establishments on shore, shall be deemed superior in rank to the officer appointed to command such ship or establishment; but such Commanding Officer shall, under all circumstances, be held to be superior in rank and precedence to every officer under his command.

" 10th. That such relative rank shall carry with it all precedence and advantages attaching to the rank with which it corresponds, and shall regulate the choice of quarters, rates of lodging-money, servants, forage, fuel and light, or allowances in their stead, when Medical Officers of the Navy may be employed on shore on joint service with your Majesty's Land Forces; but that Medical Officers serving in the Fleet shall, notwithstanding the relative rank thus conferred upon them, in all such details, and also in all matters relating to the duties of the Fleet, and the discipline and interior economy of your Majesty's ships, be subject, as heretofore, to the authority of any executive officer of the military branch while on duty, under the general Regulations which may from time to time be prescribed by the Lord High Admiral, or the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral; and that Medical Officers shall share prize money according to the

Proclamation or Proclamations which may be in force for the time being, for regulating the distribution of the proceeds of prizes in the Royal Navy.

"11th. That Medical Officers shall be entitled to the same allowances, on account of wounds and injuries received in action, as Combatant Officers holding the same relative ranks.

"12th. That the families of Medical Officers shall in like manner be entitled to the same allowances as granted to the families of Combatant Officers holding the same relative ranks.

"13th. That Medical Officers shall be held entitled to the same honours as other Officers of the Royal Navy of equal relative rank.\*

"14th. That a Medical Officer retiring after a full-pay service of twenty-five years, may, in cases of distinguished service, receive a step of honorary rank, but without increase of half-pay.

"15th. That good service pensions shall be awarded to the most meritorious Medical Officers of the Royal Navy, under such regulations as shall from time to time be determined upon, on the recommendation of the Lord High Admiral, or the Commissioners for executing that office.

"16th. That four of the most meritorious Medical Officers of the Royal Navy shall be named Honorary Physicians, and four—Honorary Surgeons to your Majesty.

"We do therefore most humbly submit that your Majesty will be graciously pleased, by your Order in Council, to grant us the necessary autho-

\* This clause does not extend to the compliments to be paid by Garrison or Regimental Guards, as laid down in pages 29 and 30 of your Majesty's Regulations for the Army, nor to corresponding honours paid on board your Majesty's ships.

rity for carrying the foregoing Regulations into effect; the Lords Commissioners of your Majesty's Treasury having signified their concurrence."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

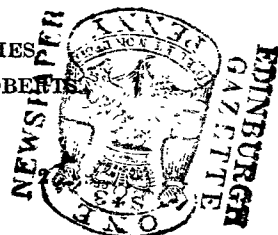
