PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the 17th & 18th years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for Amending the Laws relating to the Militia, and 'raising a Volunteer Militia Force in Scotland,' it was provided that the period of training and exercise of all or any part of the Militia in Scotland should not exceed twenty-one days in any year, save as was thereinafter provided: And whereas it was by the said Act enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, when, with the advice of Her Privy Council, she may see fit so to do, to extend or reduce the period of training and exercise of all or any part of the Militia, so that the whole period of training and exercise in any year should not exceed fifty-six days, nor be less than three

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to extend the period of training and exercise of the Militia in Scotland in the present year, 1860:

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to Order, and it is hereby Ordered, that the period of training and exercise of all the Regiments and Corps of the Militia in Scotland be extended for and during the present year 1860, so that the whole period of training and exercise of the said Regiments and Corps in the said year 1860 shall not in any case exceed fiftysix days, nor be less than three days; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and be transmitted to the respective Lieutenants of the Counties and Places in Scotland, in order that they should proceed upon the same, in pursuance of the directions of the said Act of Parliament.

And the Right Honourable Sidney Herbert, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
