WESTMINSTER-April 4. HIS day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that the Lords, authorised by virtue of his Majesty's commission for declaring his Royal affent to feveral acts agreed upon by both Houfes, do desire the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal affent to the faid acts, was read accordingly; and the Royal affent given to,

An act for extending from the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred, until the twentyfifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and one, the period of preference granted and continued by feveral acts to bodies corporate and persons for the redemption of land tax, and for enlarging feveral of the pow-

ers contained in the faid acts.

An act for granting bounties on the importation of wheat, wheaten flour, and rice, until the 1st day of October one thousand eight hundred.

Anact for the appointment and regulation of pilots for the conducting of ships and vessels into and out of the port of Kingston upon Hull, and for ascertaining the falvage for anchors, cables, and other faips materials found in the river Humber, and for the better afcertaining the tonnage of ballast lighters employed at the faid port.

An act for opening and making two new streets in

An act for more effectually repairing the road from

Summerrods Bar, near the town of Hexham, in the county of Northumberland, to the town of Alston, in the county of Cumberland.

An act for continuing for 21 years, and from thence to the end of the then next Session of Parliament, the term, and altering and enlarging the powers of two acts paffed in the 33d year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the fecord, and in the 17th year of the reign of his present Majesty, for diverting, altering, widening, repairing, and amending the roads from the town of Halifax, and from Sowerby-bridge, in the county of York, by Todmorden, to Burnley and Littleborough, in the county of Lancaster.

An act for more effectually repairing the road from Glemohelt, through Haltwhiftle, Hexham, and Cor-bridge, to the military road near Shildon-bar, and for making and repairing a branch road from Corbridge aforefaid, to Heddon-on-the-Wall, all in the county of

Northumberland.

An act for more effectually repairing, widening, and improving the road from the village of Magor, to the Bridge Foot in the town of Chepstow, in the county of Monmouth, and feveral other roads in the counties of Monmouth, Gloucester, Hereford, and Brecon, to continue in force for 21 years, and from thence to the then next Seffion of Parliament.

An act for amending, altering, and keeping in repair the road leading from the turnpike-road in Witney, to the turnpike road on Swerford Heath, and also the road leading from the turnpike-road from Woodstock to Birmingham, through Charlbury, to the turnpike-road from Chipping Norton to Burford, all in the county of Oxford.
