THE Right Hon. Lord Keith, K. B. Commander in Chief of his Majesty's fleet in the Mediterranean, having by his proclamation, dated Leghorn roads, 12th March last, declared the cities Marfeilles, Toulon, and Nice, and the whole coast of the Rureva de Ponente, to be in a state of blockade; and the Commanders, as well of his Majesty's ships of war, as of the ships of war belonging to his Majesty's allies, and serving under his Lordship's orders, having been directed to enforce the said blockade, by detaining and proceeding according to law against all such vessels as may be found attempting to infringe the same;—notice is hereby given thereof, in order that all masters and owners of neutral vessels may govern themselves accordingly.

I HAVE the honour to acquaint your Lordship, that his Majesty's ship under my command captured last night the Mars French ship privateer, belonging to Bourdeaux, mounting 20 twelve-pounders and two 36-pound carronades, and manned with 180 men: she had been out on a cruise, had made several captures, and was returning into port. I feel peculiar pleasure in having made this capture, as she was esteemed one of the finest privateers fitted out of Bourdeaux.
