Late 46th Bengal Native Infantry	Lieutenant-Colonel Samuel James Browne, C.B.	For having, at Seerporah, in an engagement with the Rebel Forces under Khan Allie Khan, on the 31st of August 1858, whilst advancing upon the enemy's position at day-break, pushed on with one orderly Sowar upon a nine-pounder gun that was commanding one of the approaches to the enemy's position, and attacked the gunners, thereby preventing them from re-loading and firing upon the infantry who were advancing to the attack. In doing this a personal conflict ensued, in which Captain, now Lieutenant-Colonel, Samuel James Browne, Commandant of the 2d Punjaub Cavalry, received a severe sword-cut wound on the left knee, and shortly afterwards another sword-cut wound which severed the left arm at the shoulder, not however before Lieutenant-Colonel Browne had succeeded in cutting down one of his assailants. The gun was prevented from being re-loaded, and was eventually captured by the infantry, and the gunner slain.

The Queen, taking into Her royal consideration that upon the decease of James Andrew, Marquess of Dalhousie, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom, and Earl of Dalhousie in that part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, Knight of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle, without issue male, which happened on or about the 19th day of December last, the dignity of Marquess of Dalhousie became extinct, but that the earldom of Dalhousie devolved upon Fox, Baron Panmure, now Earl of Dalhousie, Knight of the Most Ancient and of the Most Noble Order of the Thistle, and Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, as the eldest and only surviving son and heir of William, Baron Panmure deceased, second son of George, Earl of Dalhousie, and that, according to the ordinary rules of honour, the sisters of the said Fox, now Earl of Dalhousie, cannot enjoy that place and precedence which would have been due to them in case their father, the said William, Baron Panmure, had survived his nephew, the said James Andrew, Marquess of Dalhousie, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Earl of Dalhousie, Her Majesty has been pleased to ordain and declare that Mary Hamilton (commonly called the Honourable Mary Hamilton), the widow and relict of James Hamilton of Bangour, in the shire of Linlithgow, Esq., Ramsay Macdonald (commonly called the Honourable Ramsay Macdonald), the wife of Donald Macdonald of Sandside, in the shire of Caithness, Esq., and Christian Maule (commonly called the Honourable Christian Maule), spinster, the only surviving sisters of the said Fox, Earl of Dalhousie, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-eminence, and precedence, as if their late father, William, Baron Panmure, had survived his nephew, the said James Andrew, Marquess of Dalhousie, and had succeeded to the title and dignity of Earl of Dalhousie.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Stockholm, reporting that a new Swedish Customs' Law will come into force on the 1st April next, by which the differences at present existing between bonding and warehousing in Swedish Ports will be abolished, and the warehousing duty of one quarter per cent. ad valorem, now in force, raised to 1 per cent. on the tariff rate, payable both on landing and re-shipment.

Vessels of above twenty-four tons will not be required to produce a Consular Manifest, in lieu of which a Master's Manifest must be delivered.
