The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from the British Member of the European Commission of the Danube, modifying, as follows, Articles 1 and 3 of the Provisional Tariff of the 25th July 1860, for the

navigation of that river, notice respecting which was inserted in the London Gazette of the 14th August 1860.

ART. 1.—At the end of the 1st Article of the Provisional Tariff adopted by the European Commission on the 25th July 1860, the following paragraph is added :—

“Sailing vessels measuring above 30 tons, which load their cargoes in the Port of Soulina, without ascending the river beyond that port, will pay only the following tolls :—

The above table of tolls is applicable exclusively to vessels which do not re-ascend the river.

ART. 2.—The second paragraph of Article 3 of the Tariff is to be replaced by the following paragraph :—

“The amount of the fixed toll per ton, which these vessels shall pay, shall be determined by the above tables accordingly or not as they may have re-ascended the river above the Port of Soulina, and after the deduction of 40 per cent., which is guaranteed to them by the present Article.”

ART. 3.—The preceding provisional regulations shall have the same force and value as the other provisions of the Tariff of the 25th July 1860, of which they shall in future form an integral portion. They will come into operation immediately after their publication in the Port of Soulina.
