THE following Address of Condolence, on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness The Prince Consort, which has been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been laid before the Queen by Sir George Grey, and has been received very graciously by Her Majesty :-

To The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Deputy Wardens of the Stannaries of Cornwall and Devon, desire to approach your Majesty with profound respect, to express our deep sympathy in the grievous affliction with which your Majesty has been visited, in the death of the Prince

Having had for so many years an official con-nection with the Duchy of Cornwall, and with His Royal Highness as the Lord Warden of the Stannaries, we feel that we should not be duly mindful of the ties which peculiarly bind the Inhabitants of the Duchy of the Crown, and of the warm attachment and loyalty to the Throne which has ever distinguished them, if we did not entreat your Majesty to accept our respectful recognition of the illustrious character of the lamented Prince, and of the magnitude of the loss to the Nation in one who was so earnestly devoted to the promotion of the best interests of the Country, and who not only had at heart, but so perseveringly sought, by precept and example, to advance the moral and social condition of the People.

We do not presume to dwell upon the especial weight of your Majesty's loss and sorrow from this afflicting bereavement, but we pray that the Almighty, to whose decree we bow, may in His mercy trace out for your Majesty the path of consolation and peace.
