Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Keith, K. B. Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels in the Mediterranean, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated on board the Minotaur, off Genoa, May 21.

I HAVE the honour of reporting to you, for the informa-tion of their Lordships, that, by private intelligence from Genoa, I understood the French had refolved on boarding our Hotilla in any future attempt to bombard the town, and yefterday, about twelve o'clock, a very large galley, a cutter, three armed fettees, and feveral gun-boats appeared in array off the Molehead, and in the courfe of the afternoon exchanged distant shot with some of the ships as they passed them. At sunset they took a position under the guns of the moles and the city bastions, which were covered with men, manifesting a determined resistance; I nevertheless arranged every thing for a fourth bombardment, as formerly, under the direction of Captain Philip Beaver, of the Aurora, who left the Minotaur at nine P. M. attended by the gun and mortar veffels and the armed boats of the ships. About one o'clock, being arrived at a proper distance for commencing his fire, a brisk cannonade was opened upon the town, which was returned from various points; and Captain Beaver having discovered from the flashes of some guns that they were directed from something nearly level with the water, judiciously concluded that they proceeded from some of the enemy's armed veffels; calling a detachment of the ship's boats to his assistance, he made directly to the spot, and in a most ga lant and spirited manner, under a smart fire of cannon and muscerry from the moles and enemy's armed vessels, attacked, boarded, carried, and brought off their largeft galley La Prima of 50 oars and 257 men, armed, besides musicets, pistols, cutlasses, &cc. with two brass guns of thirty-fix pounds, having about thirty brass swivels in her hold, and commanded by Captain Patrizio Galleano. The hombardment fuffered no material interruption, but was continued till day-light this morning, when the Prima was fully brought off; her extreme length is 159 feet, and her breadth 23 feet 6 inches.

On our part four feamen only have been wounded; one belonging to this ship, in the boat with Captain Beaver; one be-

longing to the Pallas; and the other two to the Haerlam. The enemy's loss is not exactly known, but one man was found

dead on board, and fifteen wounded.

The fatisfaction which I derive from confidering the zeal activity, and gallantry with which this fervice has been per, formed, is greatly augmented by the flattering tellimony bornby Captain Beaver to the good conduct of the officers and sea men who asked with him on this occasion. im on this occanon.

SIR,
A LETTER, of which the inclosed is a copy, received by me from Captain Oliver, of his Majesty's ship the Mermaid, will inform their Lordships how actively that officer has been employed in the important service of cutting off the supplies destined for the enemy's troops in the city of Genoa.

My Lord, Mermaid, Mahon, April 10, 1300.

I HAVE the honour to acquaint your Lordship, that his Majesty's ship under my command has taken and destroyed nine vessels laden, mostly for Genoa, with wine and corn, between the 2d and 6th inst. Six of them were cut out by two of our boots under the direction of Figure 10 or the text. tween the 2d and off init. Six of them were cut out by two of our boats under the direction of Lieutefiant Corbett; they were moored to a fort within the small slands snear Cape Croifetts. I had seen them collecting all day; and soon after sunfet I went in with the ship, under the battery, within the range of grape shot, and anchored with a spring on the cable, and after cannonadius the fort were than an hour. I say the and after cannonading the fort more than an hour, I faw the fix vessels, which Mr Corbett had most ably got under weigh, coming out, when I followed them with the ship: I am happy to say that we have had no person hurt on this service; and a fhot through our cut-water, which is of little confequence, is the only damage we have received.
