The following Address has been presented to the King ; which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously :

TO THE KING.

Most Gracious-Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects the General Convention of the Royal Burghs of Scotland, assembled in their annual meeting, according to the ancient statutes of this realm, embrace with eagerness the earliest opportunity which this our annual meeting has afforded us of approaching your Throne with our unfeigned congratulations on your Majesty's providential escape from the danger to which the attempt of assassination, by a maniac, lately exposed your Royal person.

We rejoice in knowing, and in respectfully conveying to your Majesty the assurance that the great body of those communities which we have the honour to represent, as they concur with us in sentiments of strong attachment to your person, and in steady loyalty to your Government, concur with us also in astonishment and horror at the atrocious attempt, and in heartfelt joy at your Majesty's preservation.

While we offer our thankful acknowledgments to the Almighty for the past protection he hath vouchsafed to your Majesty, we cordially unite with the general voice of your subjects in praying that he may still long preserve your sacred life, which is endeared to us by many illustrious, personal, and princely virtues, and which, in the present situation of public affairs, appears

TO THE CREDITORS OF

DONALD MACKINTOSH, writer in Edinburgh, having been elected trustee on the sequestrated estate of the said Hugh Gray, and his nomination confirmed by the Court of Session, hereby intimates, that upon his application the Sheriff-substitute of Lanarkshire, at Glasgow, has appointed Friday the 1st, and Friday the 15th days of August next, for the public examination of the bankrupt, and those acquainted with his affairs, within the Tolbooth of Glasgow, at one o'clock afternoon; and that a meeting of the creditors of the said Hugh Gray is to be held within the Black Bull Inn, Glasgow, upon Saturday the 16th day of August next, at 12 o'clock noon, for the purpose of intrusting the trustee as to the management and recovery of the said estate. And the said creditors are hereby required to lodge with the trustee their claims and vouchers of debt, with their oaths on the verity thereof, at or previous to said meeting, certifying, that unless they are so lodged between and the 17th day of March next, being ten callendar monthis from the date of the sequestration, the creditors neglecting to do so shall have no share in the first distribution of the bankrupt's estate.
