FOREIGN OFFICE, October 1, 1863.

HER Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Madrid has forwarded to Earl Russell the following substance of a Royal Decree, dated December 17, 1862, so far as it relates to the formalities required to be observed by Foreigners entering Spain:—

Substance of Royal Decree of December 17, 1862.

FOREIGNERS coming into Spain shall not be compelled to show a passport; but they must present a "Cédula de Vecindad," (i. e. a Certificate of domicile or residence,) or, where such is the case, a Certificate that they are in service, (cartilla de servicio,) or any other document which will prove their identity, the place whence, and the purpose for which they come.

The Authorities are at liberty to demand the presentation of this document as often as they think necessary.

Any Foreigner will also be permitted to enter Spain on merely presenting himself to the Authorities, even though he may not possess any document, but in this case he must prove his identity by means of a declaration, to be witnessed by the signatures of two residents in the town in which he presents himself, who must state that they know him, and that his declaration is true. He must also express at the same time whence, and for what purpose he comes to Spain.

The compulsory visa on passports of persons entering Spain is abolished.

"AN ACT TO REGULATE AND AMEND THE LAW
RESPECTING
THE SALMON FISHERIES OF SCOTLAND."

2d. That the point below which the Proprietors of Fisheries shall be Lower Proprietors, and above which the Proprietors of Fisheries shall be Upper Proprietors, shall be one quarter of a mile above the Suspension Bridge, on the Public Road from Bannavie to Fort-William, the distance to be measured along the course of the River.
