LOST POLISH LAND DEBENTURES.

FOREIGN OFFICE, November 28, 1863.

EARL RUSSELL, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received a Despatch from Colonel Stanton, Her Majesty's Consul-General at Warsaw, of which the following is a copy:—

Warsaw, November 4, 1863.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the honour to forward to your Lordship a duplicate copy of the list of Lost Debentures and Coupons of the Polish Mortgage Society or Landed Bank, which have been officially published by that establishment, calling upon all parties who happen to be in possession of the Debentures bearing the same numbers, or of the Coupons, to come forward within twelve months from the 22d of October, and to make good their claim within three years in the Civil Courts, or five years in the Criminal Courts of this country, as the case may be, failing which, duplicate copies of the said Debentures, with their Coupons, will be delivered to the parties claiming to be the rightful owners of such Debentures or Coupons.

A portion of these are the Debentures of the Treasury of this Kingdom, which were appropriated by the National Government in June last.

The lights will be three *fixed green* lights, placed *horizontally*, one light will be on that part of the Cofferdam which projects most towards the entrance of the harbour, and the others at the distance of 50 yards on either side of it.

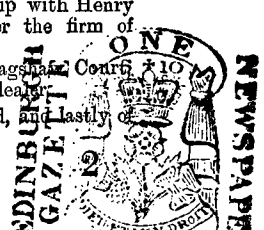
