THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the following translation of an official proclamation issued by the Senate of Bremen, respecting the Harbour-dues at the Port of Bremerhaven, and which has been forwarded by Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Hamburg:—

(Translation.)

WHEREAS the tariff of harbour-dues in Bremerhaven, established by the Order of April 2d 1845, having, in a constitutional manner, been subjected to a revival, the Senate hereby brings the subjoined tariff to public notice.

I.—Harbour—Last—(viz. of burthen), and Sluice Charges.

Sec 1.

Dlls. Gts.

For passing in and out of the sluice of any one of the harbours, and for remaining in the same, ships have to pay:—

1. Harbour-charges:—

For the time during which they are moored, if not exceeding two months (60 days).

Ships exceeding 30 lasts in burthen, for each last	0	11

For a time not exceeding one month, the half of the above rates.

For a time exceeding two months, for every additional month, per last	0	1
Timber-rafts, per month	2	0

2. Charges for last of burthen, instead of the harbour-charges.

River-going ships, coming from Weser ports, that is to say, as far as the *Horum-Liel*, on the Jahde, and the *Dorum-Tief*, on the right bank of the Weser, inclusive, or such ships as are bound to those places from one of those ports, for every last of goods landed, or received from land

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If such ships remain longer than one month in the harbour, they must from that time pay additionally the usual harbour-charges, as a charge for moorage.

3. Sluice-charges	2	36
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Sluice-charges are not to be paid by ships which have previously paid the harbour-charges, but only for ships which are moored outside of the harbours ready for sailing, but return into the harbour without sailing; or for ships which leave the harbour in order to be repaired at one of the ship-building yards in or above Bremerhaven, and after being repaired immediately return into one of the harbours, or are removed from one harbour into the other.

4. Charges per last of burthen on the bank of the Geeste.

Besides the above, every last of ship's goods, on the discharging or loading of goods on the right bank of the Geeste, must pay as last charges

The following more particular determinations and exemptions are hereby to be observed :—

1. Exempted from harbour or last charges are :—
 - a. Steam-tugs towing other vessels in or out.
 - b. Lighters and other river-boats which do not carry goods to the shore or from the shore, but which take in goods from sea-going ships, or convey goods to them.
 - c. Mail-steamers employed on transatlantic voyages; these ships have to pay the sluice charges instead.
2. Instead of the harbour-charges a fixed sum may be paid by steamers and other ships sailing regularly.
3. In calculating the harbour and last charges, the last is taken at 4,000 pounds, every fraction of a last is reckoned as a whole last, every part of a month as a whole month, each month as 30 days, and therefore 2 months at 60 days.

II.—Careening Charges.

Ship-masters who make use of any one of the careening places for the examination or repairing of their ships have to pay 4 grotes per last, but for the careening of a ship in no case less than 3 0

III.—Harbour Pilot Charges.

The Harbour Pilot charge for piloting ships in or out is, for ships

If such boat assistance is given in extraordinary cases, viz., at night, during a storm, or the breaking up of the ice, &c., and under unusual difficulties, so that the usual assistance is not sufficient, then, according to the judgment of the Harbour-master, the charge may be increased at a reasonable rate.

V.—Removal of Ships.

For moving or taking ships from one berth to another in the harbour, the harbour pilots are to be paid for the work assigned to them in such cases, viz., for a ship

If a ship, during the time of its remaining in harbour, has been once moved by order of the authorities without such proceeding being desired either by the master or any person authorized by him, then any further removal which is ordered by the authorities alone, must be carried out gratis by the Harbour-pilots.

VI.—Warehousing Charges.

Although the warehousing or depositing of goods on the quay is only permitted when, at the request of the person interested, one of the Harbour-masters has assigned a place for such purpose, still for the first month of warehousing no charges are to be made, neither is a card of permission from the Harbour Office requisite; but after the first month a card of permission must be obtained for any longer period of warehousing, and on receiving the same the charge for every additional month of warehousing per square rod, or less, is 0 6
