THE following Addresses of Congratulation to the Queen, on the occasion of Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales having given Birth to a Prince, have been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, for Presentation, and have accordingly been presented by him to Her Majesty, who has been pleased to receive the same very graciously:—

To The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

*May it please your Majesty,*

We, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of the Scottish Hospital of the foundation of King Charles the Second, in general Court assembled, desire to convey to your Majesty our sincere and hearty congratulations on the occasion of the birth of His Royal Highness Prince Albert Victor Christian Edward.

That your Majesty may, by the Grace of God, be spared in health and wealth long to reign over a free, happy, and united people, and to witness in the lives of your Royal descendants all the virtues which have distinguished their royal parents, is our humble and devout prayer.

COUNCIL CHAMBER,

DUBLIN CASTLE, April 11, 1864.

This day the Privy Council assembled, when His Grace Richard Chenevix, Lord Archbishop of Dublin; The Right Honourable Maziere Brady, Lord High Chancellor of Ireland; and the Right Honourable Sir George Brown, G.C.B., General Commanding Her Majesty's Forces in Ireland, were sworn Lords Justices of Ireland.

DUBLIN CASTLE, March 31, 1864.

This day His Excellency the Grand Master, by Her Majesty's Command, held a Chapter of the Most Illustrious Order of Saint Patrick.

The following Knights Companions, in their Mantles, Stars, and Collars, assembled in the Robing-Room, viz:—

Sir Bernard Burke, Ulster King of Arms, Knight attendant on the Order;

Sheffield Betham, Esquire, Dublin Herald.

At Three o'Clock P.M., the Knights Companions were called over, and proceeded to the presence of the Grand Master, who was seated in the Chair of State in the Throne Room, and, with the usual reverences, took their respective seats at the table, according to their Stalls. The Roll of Knights was then called over by Ulster King of Arms.

His Excellency commanded Ulster to read Her Majesty's Letter authorizing the Chapter to be held; which having been done,

His Excellency directed Ulster and the Usher of the Black Rod to introduce the Very Reverend the Dean of St Patrick's, to whom the Prelate administered the Declaration; and the Dean, kneeling, was invested by the Grand Master.

The Right Honourable Lord Lurgan was then introduced by the Gentleman Usher and Ulster, and, kneeling, received the honour of Knighthood, and retired.

His Excellency the Grand Master communicated to the Chapter that Her Majesty had been pleased to nominate Sir Charles Brownlow, Knight, Baron Lurgan, to be a Knight Companion of



said Most Illustrious Order, and to command that his Lordship be invested with the Ribbon and Badge.

By command of the Grand Master, the two Junior Knights present proceeded to the door of the Chapter Room, and conducted Lord Lurgan between them to the right of the Chair of State, Ulster bearing the Ensigns of the Order before them on a velvet cushion, whereupon the Declaration appointed by the Statutes was read by the Prelate to Lord Lurgan, who thereupon subscribed the said Declaration, which was placed by the Secretary in the Register of the Order.

His Excellency the Grand Master, assisted by the two Senior Knights Companions present, put the Ribbon with the Badge over his Lordship's right shoulder, pronouncing the Admonition; after which his Lordship was congratulated by His Excellency and the Knights present, and took his seat at the table.

The Chapter being ended, Ulster called over the Names and Titles of the Knights Companions present, who each rose from his seat on the pronouncement of his Name, and retired, whereupon the Chapter broke up.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it is provided that "whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any Foreign Country is willing that salvage shall be awarded by British Courts for services rendered in saving life from any ship belonging to such country, when such ship is beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the provisions of the principal Act and of this Act, with respect to salvage for services rendered in saving life from British ships, shall, in all British Courts, be held to apply to services rendered in saving life from the ships of such Foreign Country, whether such services are rendered within British jurisdiction or not;" and whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that His Majesty the King of Prussia is willing that salvage shall be awarded by British Courts for services rendered in saving life from Prussian ships when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction; and whereas the principal Act referred to in "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," is "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854."

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said "Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the provisions of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," with respect to salvage for services rendered in saving life from British ships, shall, in all British Courts, be held to apply to services rendered in saving life from Prussian ships, whether such services are rendered within British jurisdiction or not.

Fixed Light on Richibucto Head.

THE Government of New Brunswick has given notice, that early in the Spring of 1864 a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of St Lawrence.

The light will be a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the fourth order.

The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. 46° 39' 40" N., long. 64° 42' 30" West of Greenwich.

## PARISH OF LOCHS, ROSS.

NOTICE is Hereby Given, That in terms of the 12th Clause of the Vaccination (Scotland) Act, 1863,—26 and 27 Vict., cap. 108,—and upon application by the PAROCHIAL BOARD of LOCHS, in the County of Ross, the Board of Supervision have framed a Modification of the 9th Clause of the said Act, as hereinafter expressed, to supersede the provisions in that Clause so far as regards the said Parish of Lochs, and that the said Modification has been approved of by the Lord Advocate, in conformity with the Act :—

“ In the 9th Clause of the said Act, wherever the word ‘Two’ occurs, the word ‘Three’ to be substituted for it.”

If any Medical Practitioner shall be of opinion that any Child is not in a fit and proper State to be successfully vaccinated, he shall thereupon and immediately deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or the Person having the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the Schedule (B) hereto annexed, that the Child is in an unfit State for successful Vaccination, and such Certificate shall remain in Force for Three Months from its Delivery as aforesaid ; and the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid shall, unless they shall within each succeeding Period of Three Months have obtained from a Medical Practitioner a Renewal of such Certificate, within Three Months next after the Delivery of the said Certificate as aforesaid, and if the said Child be not vaccinated at the Termination of such Period of Three Months, then during each succeeding Period of Three Months until such Child has been successfully vaccinated, cause such Child to be examined by a Medical Practitioner, and if he deem such Child to be then in a fit and proper State for Vaccination, he shall forthwith vaccinate him accordingly, and if the Operation be successful shall deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the said Schedule (A), that such Child has been successfully vaccinated ; but if the Medical Practitioner be of opinion that the Child is still in an unfit State for successful Vaccination, then he shall again deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the said Schedule (B), that the Child is still in an unfit State for successful Vaccination ; and the Medical Practitioner, so long as such Child remains in an unfit State for Vaccination and unvaccinated, shall at the Expiration of every succeeding Period of Three Months deliver, if required, to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a fresh Certificate under his Hand, according to the said Form ; and the Production of such Certificate shall be a sufficient Defence against any Complaint which shall be brought against the Father or Mother, or Person aforesaid, for Non-compliance with the Provisions of this Act.”

The Father of every Child born in Scotland after the First day of January in the Year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the event of the Death, Illness, or Inability of the Father, then the Mother, or in the event of the Death, Illness, Absence, or Inability of the Father and Mother, then the Person who shall have the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, shall, within Twelve Months after the Birth of such Child, cause such Child to be vaccinated by a Medical Practitioner, and upon and immediately after the successful Vaccination of such Child the Medical Practitioner who shall have performed the Operation shall deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or to the Person who shall have the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the Schedule (A) hereto annexed, that such Child has been successfully vaccinated ; and such Certificate shall, within Three Days after the Date thereof, be transmitted to and lodged with the Registrar for the District by the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid, and such Certificate, if registered, shall, without further Proof, be admissible as Evidence of the successful Vaccination of such Child in any Information or Complaint which shall be brought against the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid, for Non-compliance with the Provisions of this Act.

“ 9. If any Medical Practitioner shall be of opinion that any Child is not in a fit and proper State to be successfully vaccinated, he shall thereupon and immediately deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or the Person having the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the Schedule (B) hereto annexed, that the Child is in an unfit State for successful Vaccination, and such Certificate shall remain in force for Six Months from its Delivery as aforesaid ; and the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid shall, unless they shall within each succeeding Period of Six Months have obtained from a Medical Practitioner a Renewal of such Certificate, within Six Months next after the Delivery of the said Certificate as aforesaid, and if the said Child be not vaccinated at the Termination of such Period of Six Months, then during each succeeding Period of Six Months until such Child has been successfully vaccinated, cause such Child to be examined by a Medical Practitioner, and if he deem such Child to be then in a fit and proper State for Vaccination, he shall forthwith vaccinate him accordingly, and if the Operation be successful shall deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the said Schedule (A), that such Child has been successfully vaccinated ; but if the Medical Practitioner be of opinion that the Child is still in an unfit State for successful Vaccination, then he shall again deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the said Schedule (B), that the Child is still in an unfit State for successful Vaccination ; and the Medical Practitioner, so long as such Child remains in an unfit State for Vaccination and unvaccinated, shall at the Expiration of every succeeding Period of Six Months deliver, if required, to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a fresh Certificate under his Hand, according to the said Form ; and the Production of such Certificate shall be a sufficient Defence against any Complaint which shall be brought against the Father or Mother, or Person aforesaid, for Non-compliance with the Provisions of this Act.”
