NOTIFICATION of the Raising of the Blockade of the German Ports in the Baltic, &c.

IT is hereby notified that Earl Russell, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Minister at Copenhagen (Sir A. Paget), a Telegram, stating that the Blockades of Ports in the Baltic are to be raised during the suspension of arms which has been concluded between Denmark and the German Powers.

The following is a copy of the Telegram above referred to:—

*"Copenhagen, July 19th, 10 P.M.  
R. 20th, 10 A.M.*

"A Military Convention was signed yesterday, at Christianfeld, establishing a suspension of arms, to commence at noon to-morrow, 20th, and cease on 31st, at midnight. All Blockades given up. Armies and Fleets to keep their respective positions. No communication allowed between the territories occupied by respective armies."

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Valparaiso, inclosing a copy of a Decree of the Chilian Government, deferring the calling in of the old 25 cent pieces for a period of six months, and of which the following is a translation:—

SANTIAGO, May 19, 1864.—Having perused the foregoing note, and considering

1. That a great scarcity of silver coin is felt in the market:

2. That it is at present very difficult to replace the silver coin which is exported on account of the high price of silver bullion, which exceeds the maximum price fixed by law for the purchases which the Mint is authorized to make:

3. That, in attention to these circumstances, it is convenient to prorogue the term within which the Fiscal Offices may receive the 25 cent pieces, and which will not present any difficulties to commerce, inasmuch as the said coin does not alter the Decimal system:

I Decree,—Let the term fixed by the 3d Article of the Decree of June 8, of last year, within which the Fiscal Offices may receive the National silver coin of 25 cents, be prolonged for six months.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the following translation of a Decree of the Chilian Government, regulating the prices to be paid at the Mint for Gold and Silver Bullion purchased for the purpose of coining, and which has been forwarded by Her Majesty's Consul at Valparaiso:—

SANTIAGO, May 21, 1864.—Having perused the preceding note from the Superintendent of the Mint, and considering

1. That in order to facilitate the introduction of gold and silver bullion for coining, it is necessary to adopt a scale of prices for the purchase of these metals, which, without going beyond the limits established by the present laws, may be altered according to the state of the market:

2. That, with this object, it is requisite to establish rules to determine the form and terms in which the variations should be made:

I have accorded and decree—

ART. 1. The purchases of gold and silver bullion for the working of the Mint shall be made at the prices which may previously be fixed by a Committee, composed of the Superintendent, Treasurer and Comptroller.

ART. 2. This Committee shall meet as often as the Superintendent may convoke it. The official Comptroller shall keep a Book of Minutes, and these minutes shall be sent in copy to the



Finance, for the approbation of the Government, and for publication in the official periodical.

Art. 3. The maximum of the prices which can be fixed for gold and silver bullion shall be those established by the Laws of July 28, 1860, and August 18, 1843; that is to say, 715 dollars for the quilogram of gold of the lei (quality) of one thousand millesimals, and forty-two dollars nine hundred and twenty-six millesimals for the quilogram of silver of the same quality.

The lowest price for fine gold shall be (700) seven hundred dollars for the quilogram; and, as regards the silver, that shall be adopted which, in the opinion of the Committee, is nearest to the current rate of the market.

Art. 4. The prices which may be established shall not be altered nor modified until at least one month shall have passed from the day in which the alteration or modification accorded is announced in the official periodical.

Art. 5. The Superintendent will take care to obtain the necessary data, in order that the Committee may be aware of the alterations which may take place in the market prices of bullion, of the abundance or scarcity of circulating medium, and of the necessities of the country in this respect.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the Decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officer of Her Majesty's Indian Forces, whose claim to the same has been submitted for Her Majesty's approval for his gallant conduct during the operations at Umbeyla, on the north-western frontier of India, as recorded against his name, viz. :—

Bengal Staff Corps	Lieutenant Henry William Pitcher, Adjutant, 4th Punjab Infantry  Date of Acts of Bravery, October 30th and November 16th, 1863	<p>For the daring and gallant manner in which, in the course of the recent operations against the Frontier Tribes, on the 30th October 1863, he led a party of his regiment to re-capture the Crag Picket, after its garrison had been driven in by the enemy; on which occasion sixty of them were killed in desperate hand to hand fighting.</p> <p>From the nature of the approach to the top of the Crag amongst the large rocks, one or two men could only advance at one time; "and while I ascended one path," relates Major Keyes, commanding the 1st Punjab Infantry, "I directed Lieutenant Fosbery, of the late 4th European Regiment, to push up another, at the head of a few men. He led this party with the greatest coolness and intrepidity, and was the first man to gain the top of the Crag, on his side of the attack. Lieutenant Pitcher, equally cool and daring, led a party of men up to the last rock, until he was knocked down and stunned by a large stone thrown from above, within a few yards of him."</p> <p>Lieutenant Pitcher also displayed great gallantry in leading on a party of his regiment to endeavour to recover the Crag Picket, when it again fell into the enemy's hands on the 13th of November, as related in the following extract from Major Keyes' Report of the 16th of that month :—</p> <p>"The duty of leading the first charge devolved upon Lieutenant Pitcher, and I beg to bring to the special notice of the Brigadier-General Commanding the admirable manner in which he performed this important duty. He was by many yards the foremost of his party, and the gallant bearing of this excellent young officer was the admiration of all spectators. It is impossible to say too much, or to overrate his services on this occasion. Lieutenant Pitcher was severely wounded, and was obliged to be carried back."</p>

*Arrangements with respect to Algeria.*

ART. 2.—Prohibitions of export are suppressed, with the exception of those with respect to piracies in the book trade, and munitions of war.

The exportation of arms remains subject to the provisions of the law of the 14th July 1860.

The export duties are fixed as follows :—

Original products of Algeria which, on their importation into France, do not enjoy exemption, shall be admitted either free of duty if such exemption is inscribed in the Franco-English, Franco-Belgian, and Franco-Italian Conventional Tariffs, or on payment of duties which shall not exceed those determined by those Tariffs.

Products of a similar kind imported into Algeria from Foreign countries, shall be subject to the duties inscribed in the General Tariff.

*Régime on entering the French Colonies.*

ART. 3.—The Customs' Duty imposed on Tobacco of foreign origin, imported into the colonies of Martinique, Guadaloupe, and Réunion, is modified as follows :—

*Premiums on Exportation.*

ART. 4.—The drawback actually accorded on the exportation of Sal-Ammoniac is, and remains, suppressed.

ART. 5.—The Customs "Entrepôt" of the city of Honfleur (Calvados) is opened for prohibited merchandise, under the conditions prescribed by the laws of the 9th and 27th February 1862.

ART. 6.—An entrepôt for Salt may be established at the Port of Paimpol (Côtes du Nord) upon the fulfilment of the conditions prescribed by the laws and regulations in force.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage payable by law on the transmission by post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be

contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which might be payable were to be paid, and the power thereby given to alter and fix rates of postage was to extend to any increase, or reduction, or remission of postage.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in them for that purpose vested, in and by the said recited Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, did, by a certain Warrant under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, bearing date the 7th day of May 1864, fix certain rates of British postage on letters transmitted by the post from any place in the United Kingdom, or from any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any Foreign country, through the United Kingdom, to New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania, and New Zealand.

And whereas it is expedient that the said Warrant, and the rates of postage therein mentioned, should be repealed.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in us for that purpose vested, in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided,) order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post from any place in the United Kingdom to New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania, or New Zealand, direct, or through any British colony or Foreign country, there shall be charged and taken a uniform rate of British postage of sixpence.

2. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post from any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any Foreign country, through the United Kingdom to New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania, or New Zealand, whether through any British colony or Foreign country or not, there shall be charged and taken a rate of British postage of sixpence for the conveyance of every such letter from any port in the United Kingdom to New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania, or New Zealand. And for the conveyance of every such letter from the British colony or Foreign country from which the same shall be forwarded to the port in the United Kingdom of the arrival of the packet-boat or vessel (not being a packet-boat) conveying the same, such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in any such British colony or Foreign country, and transmitted direct from such colony or Foreign country to the port in the United Kingdom

of the arrival of the packet-boat or vessel (not being a packet-boat) conveying the same: Provided that in all cases where such additional rate includes both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted therefrom the sum of one penny, in respect of the inland conveyance under this clause of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

3. All such respective letters, so transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, if exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one half of an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two rates of postage;

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage;

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage;

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage;

And for every additional ounce in weight of any letter so transmitted as aforesaid, above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional ounce in weight, above the weight of four ounces, shall be charged as an additional ounce in weight. And each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

4. On every letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, and New Zealand, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.

5. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, or New Zealand, without any postage having been paid thereon, or having thereon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the single rate of postage to which such letter, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight, would be liable under this Warrant, every such letter shall be detained and opened, and shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof.

6. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, or New Zealand, having thereon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which the same would be liable under or by virtue of the provisions of this Warrant, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable on any such letter if not exceeding half an ounce in weight, every such letter shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto, and the postage to which it would have been liable if the postage had been paid when posted, together with the further and additional rate of postage of sixpence.

7. On every letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Tasmania, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.



8. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Tasmania, without any postage having been paid thereon, or having thereon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which the same would be liable under or by virtue of the provisions of this Warrant, every such letter shall be detained and opened, and shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof.

9. In all cases in which any letter, in respect of which any rate of postage is chargeable under or by virtue of the provisions of this Warrant, shall be liable to any Colonial or Foreign postage, such Colonial or Foreign postage shall be charged and paid thereon in addition to the British postage.

10. Nothing in this Warrant contained shall in any wise annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions or privileges granted by or under the said hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, or by or under any other Acts of Parliament relating to the Post-office, or any of the privileges which officers, seamen, and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's service are by law entitled to, of sending and receiving by the post letters subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

11. Nothing in this Warrant contained shall be deemed or construed to extend to any letters posted in or addressed to France, or any Foreign country through France, and transmitted between France or Foreign countries through France and New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania, or New Zealand, all which last-mentioned letters shall be charged and chargeable with the same rates of postage as if this Warrant had not been signed.

12. The term "by the post," used in this Warrant shall, as to the sea conveyance, include the conveyance by British packet-boat and also by private ship. And the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty for the regulation of the duties of postage.

13. The said recited Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 7th day of May 1864, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, and the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage in the said Warrant made, mentioned, and set forth, shall wholly cease and determine: Nevertheless no Treasury Warrant or part of a Treasury Warrant, repealed by the said last-mentioned Treasury Warrant, shall be revived by this Warrant.

14. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, conditions, or restrictions in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

15. This Warrant shall come into operation on the day of the date hereof.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 31.)—BLACK SEA.—KERTCH STRAIT.

Fixed Red Light on Cape Paul.

THE Imperial Ministry of Marine at St Petersburg has given notice, that a light is exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Cape Paul, at the west side of Kertch Strait.

The light is a *fixed* light, showing white when bearing from N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E. to N. by W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W., and red from W. by N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N. to W. by S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. The white light shows over the channel between the reef extending from Cape Takli, on the west side, and Panaghia reef on the east; the *red* light shows over the channel between Tusla bank on the south side, and the Ak-Bournu reef on the north. The light is at an elevation of 73 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the third order.

The tower is round, painted red, and stands in lat. 45° 18' 15" N., long. 36° 29' 42" East of Greenwich.

Soukhoum Point Light.

Also, that Soukhoum Point light (information of which was given in the Notice to Mariners, No. 23, dated the 1st day of June 1864,) is a *revolving* light, showing a white *flash* every *minute*.

The light is 121 feet above the level of the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 17 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the second order.
