Electric Telegraph across the Dardanelles.

The Turkish Government has given Notice that new submarine cables have been laid down across the Strait of the Dardanelles, between the castle of Kilid Bahr on the European shore, and the castle of Chanak Kaleh-si, on the Asiatic shore.

All vessels are forbidden to anchor in the vicinity of these castles under penalty of making good all loss or damage that may result therefrom.

The North-east Goodwin Buoy now lies in 12 fathoms at low water springs, with St Lawrence Church, in line with the Royal Hotel at Ramsgate, bearing N.W.; Upper Deal Mill, on with the south end of Deal Hospital, W. by S.; Goodwin light vessel N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., distant 2 miles; Goodwin Knoll buoy N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 2 miles; and East Goodwin buoy S. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., 2 miles.

The Deal Bank Buoy has been moved two cables to the N.N.W., and now lies in 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms at low water springs, with Minster west mill, in line with the flagstaff of the coast-guard station at Sandwich, bearing N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.; St. Peter's Church at Sandwich, just open west of Sandown Lifeboat House, N.N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.; Deal pier, end on, W. by $\frac{1}{2}$ N.N., distant 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ cables; South Brake Buoy E. by N. $\frac{3}{4}$ N., 1 $\frac{2}{10}$ miles; and the South Sand head light vessel S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., 3 $\frac{2}{10}$ miles.

The North Bar Buoy will be painted red and white in vertical stripes instead of black.

The South Fairway, an additional can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes, will be placed in the Ramsgate channel, in 16 feet at low water springs, with the South Brake buoy bearing S. $\frac{3}{4}$ E., distant 2 $\frac{3}{10}$ miles; and the Rattler buoy N. $\frac{3}{4}$ E., 1 $\frac{3}{10}$ miles.

INTIMATION is Hereby Given that JOSEPH JAMISON YOUNG FORRESTER, Esquire, Attorney-at-Law, Heir of Entail in possession of the Entailed Lands and Estate of EASTER CULMORE, otherwise EASTER CUILMUIR, lying in the Parish of Gargunnoch, and County of Stirling, and presently residing in Indiana, Indiana County, Pennsylvania, in the United States of America, has presented a Petition to the Lords of Council and Session (First Division, Junior Lord Ordinary, Mr Drysdale, Clerk), in terms of the Act 11th and 12th Victoria, chap. 36, entitled 'An Act for the Amendment of the Law of Entail in Scotland,' and of the Act 16th and 17th Victoria, chap. 94, entitled 'An Act to extend the benefits of the Act of the 11th and 12th years of Her present Majesty for the Amendment of the Law of Entail in Scotland,' and relative Acts of Sederunt, for authority to the Petitioner to Disentail and acquire in Fee-simple the said Entailed Lands and Estate of Easter Culmore, otherwise Easter Cuilmuir, and others; and praying their Lordships, *inter alia*, to approve of an Instrument of Disentail of the said Lands and Estate and others referred to in the said Petition, to be produced in course of the proceedings to follow thereon, and to grant warrant to, and ordain the Keeper of the Register of Tailzies to record the same in the said Register, in terms of the Statute: Upon which Petition Lord Ormidale, Ordinary officiating on the Bills, pronounced the following Interlocutor:—'15th August 1865.—The Lord Ordinary officiating on the Bills appoints this Petition to be intimated on the Walls and in the Minute-Book for fourteen days; grants warrant for advertising the same once in the Edinburgh Gazette, and in the other Newspapers mentioned in the prayer of the Petition, in terms of the Act of Parliament: further, grants warrant for serving the same, with a copy of this Deliverance thereon, upon the parties mentioned in the prayer thereof; and appoints them to give in Answers thereto, if so advised, within fourteen days from the date of service if within Scotland, and sixty days if furth thereof.'
