CATTLE PLAGUE.

Burgh of Moffat, in the County of Dumfries.

In pursuance of the powers conferred by an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23d day of November 1865, I, James Proudfoot, Esq., of Craigeburn, Senior Magistrate of Police of the burgh of Moffat, the local authority for said burgh under said Order, declare:

1. That it is expedient, from the 25th day of December 1865 to the 1st day of March 1866, to prevent the removal of cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within my jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

2. And that it is expedient, for the period fore-said, that cows (excepting those of inhabitants of the burgh returning from their grazing grounds), heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs,

goats, and swine, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within my jurisdiction.

NOTICE.

Burgh of Lochmaben.

By virtue of the powers conferred by an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23d day of November last, notice is hereby given that I, William Graham, Provost of the burgh of Lochmaben, the local authority for said burgh, hereby declare that it is expedient, from the 21st day of December current until the 1st day of March 1866, to prevent the removal of animals of the following description, viz.: cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within my jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and that it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal, or description thereof, into any such market or fair, or to any place within my jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animal so brought or sent.

And further, notice is hereby given that I, William Graham, hereby declare that it is expedient, from the said 21st day of December current till the 1st day of March next, that animals of the following description, viz.: cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within my jurisdiction, and it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal, or description thereof, from any place in Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction into any place within my jurisdiction. It being hereby specially declared that this Order shall not in any way affect the pork market, which will be held as usual.



Persons contravening any of such Orders are liable in a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of Postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office."

And whereas it is expedient to alter the rates of British postage now payable upon the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said recited Acts and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. All letters exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to Gibraltar, Malta, or Egypt, or posted in Gibraltar, Malta, or Egypt, addressed to the United Kingdom, and all letters exceeding half an ounce in weight transmitted by the post between Malta, Gibraltar, or Egypt, and any British Colony or Foreign country through the United Kingdom, shall, in lieu of being charged with the postage payable thereon in respect of the transmission thereof respectively between the United Kingdom and Malta, Gibraltar, or Egypt, by British packet-boat, via Southampton, or by private ship direct, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained in or referred to by any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or otherwise, now in force relating to any such letters, be charged with the postage payable thereon under such Warrant or Warrants respectively, or otherwise, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained and set forth in the 3d clause of this present Warrant.

2. All letters exceeding half an ounce in weight posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to any of the colonies or places mentioned and set forth in the schedule hereunder written, and all letters exceeding half an ounce in weight, addressed to any such colonies or places, transmitted by the post to any of such colonies or places from any British colony or Foreign country through the United Kingdom, shall, in lieu of being charged with the postage payable thereon in respect of the transmission thereof respectively from the United Kingdom to the several colonies or places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule, by the respective routes and in the manner in such schedule also mentioned, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained in or referred to by any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or otherwise, now in force, relating to any such letters, be charged with the postage payable thereon under such Warrant or Warrants respectively or otherwise, according to the following scale of weight and number of rates following, that is to say:—

3. On every such letter exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two rates of postage;

And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce and not exceeding one ounce and one-half of another ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, three rates of postage;

And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce and one-half of another ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, four rates of postage;

And for every additional half of an ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of two ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, one additional rate of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of an ounce in weight shall be charged as an additional half of an ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Warrant, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under any such Warrant or Warrants, or otherwise, as hereinbefore mentioned, if not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight.

4. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning, in all respects, as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, for the regulation of the duties of postage.

5. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby altered, or any of the orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, conditions, or restrictions in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

6. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 70.)—FRANCE—NORTH COAST.

Light Vessel near the Plateau des Minquiers.

THE Minister of Public Works in France has given notice, that on and after the 25th day of December 1865, lights will be exhibited from a light vessel recently placed near the south-west extremity of the Plateau des Minquiers, about midway between St Malo and the Island of Jersey.

The lights will be two *fixed* white lights; one on the mainmast 39 feet, the other on the mizenmast 26 feet above the level of the sea. The lights, under favourable circumstances, will be seen at a distance of 10 miles, but the strength of the tide may sometimes prevent them from being hoisted to the heights stated; they will, however, in clear weather, always be visible at a distance of 8 miles.

The vessel is painted black, with a skeleton ball of the same colour at each masthead, and lies in lat. 48° 53' 38" N., long. 2° 17' 29" West of Greenwich. A bell will be sounded during fogs.

VACCINATION ACT.

PARISH OF HARRIS, INVERNESS.

NOTICE is Hereby Given, That in terms of the 12th Clause of the Vaccination (Scotland) Act, 1863,—26 and 27 Vict., cap. 108,—and upon application by The PAROCHIAL BOARD of HARRIS, in the County of Inverness, the Board of Supervision have framed Modifications of the 8th and 9th Clauses of the said Act, as

hereinafter expressed, to supersede the provisions in these Clauses so far as regards the said Parish of Harris, and that the said Modifications have been approved of by the Lord Advocate, in conformity with the Act:—

“In the 8th Clause of the said Act, where the word ‘Six’ occurs, the word ‘Twelve’ to be substituted for it.

“In the 9th Clause of the said Act, wherever the word ‘Two’ occurs, the word ‘Four’ to be substituted for it.”

Accordingly, the 8th and 9th Clauses of the Vaccination (Scotland) Act, 1863, will stand as follows, so far as regards the Parish of Harris:—

“8. The Father of every Child born in Scotland after the First Day of January in the Year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the event of the Death, Illness, or Inability of the Father, then the Mother, or in the event of the Death, Illness, Absence, or Inability of the Father and Mother, then the Person who shall have the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child shall, within Twelve Months after the Birth of such Child, cause such Child to be vaccinated by a Medical Practitioner, and upon and immediately after the successful Vaccination of such Child the Medical Practitioner who shall have performed the Operation shall deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or to the Person who shall have the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the Schedule (A) hereto annexed, that such Child has been successfully vaccinated; and such Certificate shall, within Three Days after the Date thereof, be transmitted to and lodged with the Registrar for the District by the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid, and such Certificate, if registered, shall, without further Proof, be admissible as Evidence of the successful Vaccination of such Child in any Information or Complaint which shall be brought against the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid, for Non-compliance with the Provisions of this Act.

“9. If any Medical Practitioner shall be of opinion that any Child is not in a fit and proper State to be successfully vaccinated, he shall thereupon and immediately deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or the Person having the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the Schedule (B) hereto annexed, that the Child is in an unfit State for successful Vaccination, and such Certificate shall remain in Force for Four Months from its Delivery as aforesaid; and the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid shall, unless they shall within each succeeding Period of Four Months have obtained from a Medical Practitioner a Renewal of such Certificate, within Four Months next after the Delivery of the said Certificate as aforesaid, and if the said Child be not vaccinated at the Termination of such Period of Four Months, then during each succeeding Period of Four Months until such Child has been successfully vaccinated, cause such Child to be examined by a Medical Practitioner, and if he deem such Child to be then in a fit and proper State for Vaccination, he shall forthwith vaccinate him accordingly, and if the Operation be successful shall deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the said Schedule (A), that such Child has been successfully vaccinated; but if the Medical Practitioner be of opinion that the Child is still in an unfit State for successful Vaccination, then he shall again deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the said Schedule (B), that the Child is still in an unfit State for successful Vaccination; and the Medical Practitioner, so long as such Child remains in an unfit State for Vaccination and unvaccinated, shall at the Expiration of every succeeding Period of Four Months deliver, if required, to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a fresh Certificate under his Hand, according to the said Form; and the Production of such Certificate shall be a sufficient Defence against any Complaint which shall be brought against the Father or Mother, or Person aforesaid, for Non-compliance with the Provisions of this Act.”

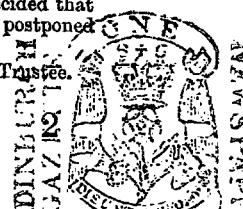
