NOTICE.

I, The Right Honourable WILLIAM CHAMBERS Lord Provost of the city of Edinburgh, by wirtue of the power and authority conferred on me by the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty sa Most Honourable Privy Council, of date the 28d day of November 1865, hereby declare, in terms of the 16th section of the said Order, that, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient from this date to the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to the Edinburgh Cattle Market, or to any place whatever within the city of Edinburgh, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the condition that they shall be immediately, after such exhibition or sale, slaughtered within my jurisdiction; and, in terms of the 18th section of the said Order, I hereby declare that it is expedient, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, that from this date to the 1st day of March next no animal, of the descriptions above specified, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the city of Edinburgh except under the condition that they be to

exhibited and sold, and immediately slaughtered within my jurisdiction.
