PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the eleventh of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; viz. :—

“Whereas your Majesty was graciously pleased, by your Order in Council dated the ninth September one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, to direct that the admission of inmates into Greenwich Hospital should be restricted to such petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and such non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines as may be infirm or helpless. And whereas we are of opinion that it would be expedient to establish more definite regulations with respect to the persons who should be considered eligible to appear before us as candidates for admission into Greenwich Hospital; we beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be pleased by your Order in Council to sanction the establishment of the following regulations. The admission of inmates into Greenwich Hospital to be confined to the undermentioned persons:

“1. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who have been granted pensions either for long service, or for injuries received, or disease contracted in your Majesty's Service, and who may be infirm or helpless.

“2. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who have served, with good characters, for ten years continuously, or with short intervals, and who may be infirm or helpless.

“3. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, whose claims may be special and exceptional, not coming within the above mentioned classes.

“All or any of such inmates to be discharged at the discretion of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.”

Her Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23d November 1865 :—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

NOTICE.

County of Dumfries.

By virtue of the powers conferred by an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 20th day of January 1866, notice is hereby given that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Dumfries, in adjourned Quarter Sessions assembled at Dumfries, on the 31st day of January current, declare that it is expedient, from the 7th day of February next until the 1st day of March next, with a view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague, that all raw or untanned hides and skins, and all horns or hoofs of animals, viz., cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and offal of such animals, and also all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices; and it shall not be lawful for any person, in contravention of this notice, to bring or send any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, or other article aforesaid, from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices into any place within such jurisdiction, but always with and under the exceptions mentioned in said Order of Council. Further, said Justices declare that it is expedient, for the foresaid period, with a view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague, that no sheep or swine from an infected farm, or from any place within one mile from the nearest point of infection, shall be removed from any particular part of the jurisdiction of the Justices to any other part of their jurisdiction, or from place to place generally within their jurisdiction: Further, that, for the foresaid period all raw or untanned hides, and all horns or hoofs of any animals, viz., cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and offal of any such animal, and also all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to promote infection, shall not be removed within the jurisdiction of the said Justices from an infected farm, or from any place within one mile from the nearest point of infection; and it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any sheep or swine, or any hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, or other article as aforesaid, within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, in contravention of this notice, excepting under the conditions mentioned in the foresaid Order of Council.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

At a meeting of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Wigtown, assembled in Special Sessions at Wigtown, on the 3d day of

February current, it was resolved, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers conferred by the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of date 20th January 1866, to give notice, and notice is accordingly hereby given, that it is expedient that all raw and untanned hides and skins, and all horns or hoofs, and the offal and dung of cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, and also hay, straw, fodder, and litter, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the county of Wigtown, within the jurisdiction of the Justices, for the period from this date until the 1st day of March 1866, excepting, as provided by said Order of Privy Council, such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, and it is hereby declared unlawful for any person, in contravention of this notice, to bring or send any hide, skin, horn, hoof, offal, dung, hay, straw, fodder, litter, or other article as aforesaid, during the above period, from any other place in Great Britain, beyond the jurisdiction of said Justices, into any place within their jurisdiction, under a penalty not exceeding £20 for every offence.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

NOTICE.

THE Justices of the Peace for the county of Perth, in Sessions assembled, on 2d February 1866, by virtue of the Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council of dates 23d November, 16th December, and 20th January last, with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle disease, declared, and do hereby declare, that it is expedient that from and after the 6th February current until the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hides and skins, horns, hoofs, or offal, of any cows, heifer, bulls, bullocks, oxen, or calves, or dung, hay, straw, or litter, shall be brought or sent from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the county of Perth: But always excepting such articles of the foresaid description as shall be sent or carried through the said county on railways, or such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported from India, Australia, South Africa, or America.

And farther, that no hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of the animals as before described, and no dung, hay, or straw, shall be removed from place to place generally, within the said county of Perth, nor from the city of Perth (being a separate jurisdiction), excepting always—

1. Hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America.
2. Such of the foresaid articles as are being taken or sent by railway through the said county.
3. Hay and straw, but these last-named articles only under authority of a licence by one or more Justices, and after a declaration made before the Justice to whom he applies, by the person wishing the licence, as to the destination of the said hay or straw, and that there has been no animal labouring under the Cattle Disease on the premises from which the said articles are to be removed; and that

to places within the county the same shall be removed otherwise than by railway.

4. And dung removed from one part of a farm to another part thereof by the usual roads or ways to the fields.

Notice is hereby given of the said declaration and resolution, and that every person offending against the same shall, for every offence, be liable in a penalty of £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Berwick-upon-Tweed.

I, JOSEPH WILLIS RUDDOCK, Esquire, Mayor of the county of the borough and town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, being the local authority, as defined in the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, in this behalf, do hereby, by virtue and in pursuance of the said Orders in Council, declare and give notice that it is expedient, from the day of the date hereof until the 1st day of March next, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except for transmission by rail or for slaughter), nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horns or hoofs of any such animals, or of any sheep, lamb, or goat, such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, not being directly imported from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, shall be brought from any part of Great Britain into any place within my jurisdiction, except under and subject to the following conditions, viz. :—

1st. That all cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, or calves, brought into my jurisdiction, shall be certified as free from the disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague" or "Rinderpest," or any suspicion thereof, by a duly appointed Inspector of the district from which such animals are brought, or a duly appointed Inspector for my jurisdiction; and that such certificate shall be signed by such Inspector; and shall be granted not more than four days prior to the bringing in of such animals, and that the same shall be, on demand, delivered to any police constable for my jurisdiction.

2d. That a certificate from a Magistrate of the county or borough where such cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, or calves have been kept, certifying that such animals have been kept during fourteen days at least before the date of such certificate in the same place from whence it is desired to remove the same, and that the said disorder has not been within the parish, or within two miles of such place, shall be delivered to the Inspector for my jurisdiction, or to any police constable thereof requiring the same.

3d. That every such animal as aforesaid, sent into my jurisdiction for transmission by rail, shall be trucked and forwarded on the same day on which it is so sent.

4th. That every such animal as aforesaid, sent into my jurisdiction for slaughter, shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after its arrival, and shall be driven direct to the slaughter-house, and there kept till killed.

5th. That every raw or untanned hide, skin, horn, or hoof, brought into my jurisdiction, except as aforesaid, shall be certified by a duly appointed Inspector of the district from whence the same has been brought, as having undergone some suf-

ficient process of disinfection, such certificate to be delivered to the Inspector for my jurisdiction, or to any police constable thereof as aforesaid.

Every person offending against the above order shall, for every such offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

Provided always, that nothing in this order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as aforesaid, by railway, through or out of my jurisdiction.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Stirling.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Stirling, in Sessions assembled at Stirling, on the 2d day of February 1866, in exercise and by virtue of the powers conferred upon them as the local authority for the county of Stirling, by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23d November and 16th December last, 1865, and 20th January 1866, and with a view to check the spread of the disorder now prevailing among cattle, commonly designated as the "Cattle Plague," resolved, and do hereby declare, in supplement of and addition to their resolutions of 10th January last, of which notice was lately published—

1st. That it is expedient that, for the period from the publication of this notice until the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horns or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat, (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America,) and no offal of such animals as aforesaid, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction of the Justices, as the local authority for the county of Stirling, all in terms and within the meaning of the first section of the said Order in Council dated 20th January 1866, and subject to the provisions therein contained.

2d. That it is expedient that, for the foresaid period, no sheep, lamb, or goat, and no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horns or hoofs, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat, (excepting such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom as aforesaid,) and no offal of such animals as aforesaid, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be removed from place to place within the said jurisdiction, in terms and within the meaning of the fourth clause of the Order in Council dated the 16th day of December last, (as amended by the third clause of the Order in Council dated 20th January last,) and of the second clause of the Order in Council dated the said 20th January last, under the provisions contained in these clauses, and under the farther provision that, notwithstanding this declaration, it shall be lawful for any person to remove such sheep, lambs, or goats, or any of them, and the offal, and the raw or untanned hide and skin, and horns and

hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat, and any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, from place to place on the same farm, and across or along any public road, so far as intersecting such farm, provided that no animals on such farm, or in any premises connected therewith, are or have been affected by said disorder, and that no stock formerly on such farm has been so affected while thereon; or to remove such sheep, lambs, and goats, or any of them, from the farm or premises where they have been for twenty-one days at least prior to such removal, for the exclusive purpose of being slaughtered, and that within forty-eight hours thereafter, or for the purpose of being conveyed forthwith by railway out of the jurisdiction, or to remove such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, from place to place within twenty-four hours previous thereto, from a Justice of the Peace for the county, upon a declaration emitted in his presence by the owner of such animals, hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, offal, dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, that such animals are not and have not been affected by said disorder, and that no animals on his farm or in his premises are or have been so affected, and that no stock formerly on said farm has been so affected while thereon, and that such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal are not the hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of animals which have been affected by said disorder, and have not been in premises in which there has been the said disorder, and that the said dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, has not been on any farm or in any premises where there has been the said disorder.

And notice is hereby further given that every person offending against the said orders, and the foregoing resolution and notice, shall, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

Harbour Light at St Cataldo.

THE Minister of Marine at Florence has given notice, that on and after the 16th day of November 1865, a light would be established at St Cataldo, near Lecce, on the coast of Italy.

The light is a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 56 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 6 or 7 miles.

The harbour light is a *fixed red* light, placed on the wall at the point of the mole of port Innocent XII. It is 23 feet above the level of the sea, and visible 3 miles.

Civita Vecchia.

Also, that the light on the eastern extremity of the mole, at the entrance to Civita Vecchia, will be seen in clear weather from a distance of 22 miles.

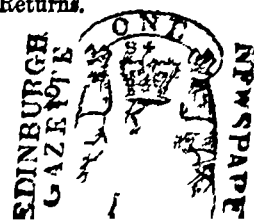
