REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S COURTS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The number of Ladies and Gentlemen attending each Court will be limited to two hundred and fifty, including those who will be presented to Her Majesty.

It is expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Her Majesty's Courts only when in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

Those Gentlemen who have not been presented to The Queen will, under such circumstances, be eligible for presentation to Her Majesty at these Courts.

The presentation of Ladies and Gentlemen will be limited to one hundred at each Court.

Ladies and Gentlemen wishing to attend Her Majesty's Courts must send their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St James's Palace, S.W., on or after Thursday the 1st of March, and these names will be submitted for Her Majesty's approval in the order of their receipt at the Office.

All applications must be made in writing, and no names will be received previous to the 1st of March.

Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to be presented to Her Majesty must, in like manner, send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office within the days above-mentioned. A letter from the Lady or Gentleman by whom each presentation is to be made must in all cases be forwarded.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regu-

lation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lord Chamberlain will forward to all persons who can be received under the above regulations, cards for their admission to Buckingham Palace at the Court which Her Majesty shall be pleased to appoint for their reception.

In sending in their names Ladies and Gentlemen are requested to mention the Court which they would prefer to attend.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who receive cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court an hour previous to each Court.

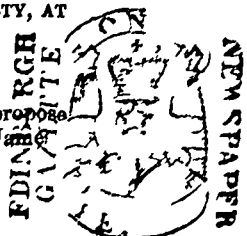

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST JAMES'S PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St James's



Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the 1st day of September 1850, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary, for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal, to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of

meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations, and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which disorder is generally designated as the "Cattle Plague:"

And whereas, with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder, an Order dated the 23d day of November 1865, has been made under the authority of the said Acts by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, consolidating and amending certain Orders previously made for that purpose, and the same has since been altered and amended by subsequent Orders bearing date the 16th day of December 1865, the 20th day of January 1866, and the 6th day of February 1866, which Orders cease on the 1st of March next:

And whereas it is expedient to continue the said Orders, so far as the same are consistent with an Act passed in this present session of Parliament, intituled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," by which provisions have been made for the slaughtering of cattle affected with the cattle plague, and for other purposes:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:—

I. The Orders of the Lords of the Council, dated the 23d of November 1865, the 16th of December 1865, the 20th of January 1866, and the 6th of February 1866, are hereby continued; and where any local authority under any powers given by any of the said Orders of the Lords of the Council, has published Notices, or made Orders within its district, all such Notices or Orders which may be in force when this Order comes into operation, are hereby continued until the same shall be altered or revoked by any further Order, or by any local authority, subject nevertheless to the provisions contained in "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or in any Act which may be hereafter passed.

II. The powers given by the said Orders, and by this present Order, to the local authority, shall be exercised, from and after the time when this Order comes into operation, by the local authority constituted under and for the purposes of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act 1866," and not otherwise; save that, in any place in which there shall not be any local authority duly constituted under and for the purposes of the said last-mentioned Act, until after the time when this Order comes into operation, the local authority, for the purpose of exercising the powers aforesaid, shall in the meantime, and until the constitution of a local authority under the said Act, continue to be such as is defined by the said Orders of the 16th

day of December 1865, and the 6th day of February 1866, respectively.

III. So much of the said Orders of the 16th day of December 1865, and the 6th day of February 1866, as is inconsistent with this present Order, is hereby revoked.

IV. This Order shall come into operation immediately on the publication thereof in the London Gazette, and shall continue in force until revoked by any further Order.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Lord President of the Council, a copy of an Ordinance passed by the Royal Court of Guernsey on the 17th instant, prohibiting the importation into that Island of cattle, sheep, and pigs, shipped at British ports.

The above Ordinance, which came into operation on the 21st instant, also prohibits the said animals being brought to the Island of Guernsey with the intention of importing them.

The Master of any vessel infringing the provisions of the said Ordinance will be subjected to the penalties therein specified.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders:—

NOTICE AS TO SHEEP.

I, JOHN BLACKIE, Junior, Lord Provost of the city of Glasgow, do hereby, in virtue of the powers conferred on me by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, give notice that sheep may be brought into Glasgow, to any part thereof, and may pass through the city; provided always that sheep which have been in the cattle market shall not pass out of the city for any purpose, nor be removed from the market to any place except one of the slaughter-houses provided by the Market Commissioners.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Perthshire.*

SUPPLEMENTARY NOTICE.

WHEREAS the Justices of the Peace for the county of Perth, in Sessions assembled, on 2d February current declared, with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle disease, that no hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, or calves, or dung, hay, or straw, should be removed from place to place, generally, within the county of Perth, or from the city of

Perth (being a separate jurisdiction), except under certain exceptions therein specified, and which declaration has been published; and whereas it has become expedient that the said prohibition should in some respects be modified.

Therefore the said Justices in Sessions assembled, on 16th February current, do hereby modify the foresaid prohibition to the effect hereafter specified, as a farther exception to the foresaid declaration, and declare as follows, viz. :—

That from and after the last-mentioned date, hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal, of the foresaid animals, and dung, may be removed from place to place within the county of Perth, or from the city of Perth (being a separate jurisdiction), but only under authority of a licence by a Justice of the Peace, and after a declaration made before said Justice by the person wishing the licence, that no animal affected with the cattle disease has been on the lands or premises from which the said articles are to be removed, and specially in regard to the said hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal, that the same are not parts of diseased animals, and are to be removed or taken forthwith to a tanner's yard, or other proper place for manufacture, or other usual purpose.

And notice is hereby given, that it shall continue to be unlawful for any person to remove the foresaid articles from place to place within the county of Perth, or from the city of Perth, except under the conditions above specified; and any person found contravening the said declaration and resolution shall, for every offence, be liable in a penalty of twenty pounds.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Dumbarton.*

NOTICE is hereby given that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Dumbarton, in Sessions assembled at Dumbarton, on the 19th day of February 1866, resolved to modify their resolutions of 26th January last, and accordingly declared, and do hereby declare, that it shall now be lawful for any person to remove from place to place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or any raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns, hoofs, or offal of such animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, provided a Justice of the Peace for Dumbartonshire, resident in the locality, shall, upon a declaration of two farmers residing in the neighbourhood, certify that the disease called "Cattle Plague" or "Rinderpest," does not exist, and has not existed for the period of one month prior to the date of the certificate, within one mile of the place from whence the removal is desired, and does not exist, and has not existed for that period within one mile of the route along which the removal is to proceed; and further, that notwithstanding the above resolution and modification, it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any such animal, or other article as aforesaid, from the parishes of East and West Kilpatrick, Kirkintilloch, and Cumbernauld, into any of the remaining parishes of the county.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Haddington.*

NOTICE is hereby given that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Haddington, in Special Sessions assembled at Haddington, of the date hereof, in terms of the powers conferred upon them by the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of date 20th January 1866, and the previous Orders therein referred to, declared, and hereby declare, in terms of said Orders, that, with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle plague, it is expedient that from this date till the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hides or skins, and no horns or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America,) and no offal of any such animals as aforesaid, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought or sent from any place in Great Britain, beyond the jurisdiction of the Justices of the county of Haddington, into any place within the jurisdiction of said Justices. And they hereby declare that the bringing or sending any of the aforesaid articles from any other part of Great Britain into the jurisdiction of the said Justices is prohibited from this date to the 1st day of March next.

Every person offending against the above notice is liable to be prosecuted for a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for each offence.
