WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the "first day of September one thousand eight "hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then " session of Parliament, the spreading of conta-" gious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, "and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twentyeighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twentyninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh "and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, "chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the "spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals;"
