RULES for the DIETARIES of THE PRISONS IN SCOTLAND, authorized by one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in terms of Sect. 9 of 'The Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act, 1860.'

The term 'Juveniles' is to apply to persons not above fourteen years of age.

THE following are the Tables of Dietaries for the several classes of Prisoners:—

I.

Persons under sentence to Imprisonment not above three days:—

Breakfast . . 1 pint of Oatmeal Gruel.

Dinner . . . 1 lb. of Bread.

Supper . . . 1 pint of Oatmeal Gruel.

Persons under sentence to Imprisonment above three days, and not above fourteen days.

Females and Juveniles under sentence to Imprisonment above fourteen days, and not above two months, not with Hard Labour.

Females and Juveniles under sentence to Imprisonment with Hard Labour not above ten days.

The following Directions relate to the foregoing Dietaries, viz.:—

1. Two pints of barley-broth must contain—first, 4 oz. of barley, or 3 oz. of barley and 1 oz. of pease; second, 2 oz. of marrow-bones or ox-head, or 1 oz. of hough or neck, or 1 oz. of some other meat, or ½ oz. of dripping or suet; and, third, a proper quantity of onions, leeks, carrots, turnips, cabbages, or other vegetables. The oatmeal gruel, when made in quantities exceeding 50 pints, to contain ½ oz. of oatmeal per pint, and 2 oz. per pint when made in less quantities. The gruel on alternate days to be sweetened with ¾ oz. of molasses or sugar, and seasoned with salt.

Half a pint of tea must contain \$\frac{1}{3}\$ oz. of tea,
 \$\frac{1}{2}\$ oz. of sugar, and \$1\$ oz. of milk.

3. An equal quantity of potato-soup, or pease-soup, or barley-milk, may (with the limitations hereafter specified) be substituted for the barley-broth. Two pints of potato-soup must contain 1 lb. of potatoes (instead of 4 oz. of barley), with the same ingredients in other respects as two pints of barley-broth. Two pints of pease-soup must contain 4½ oz. of pease, the other ingredients being the same as in the barley-broth and potato-soup, except that the quantity of vegetables may be smaller by about one-half. Two pints of barley-milk must contain 4 oz. of barley (boiled in water till it is soft, and the water partly boiled away), with ½ pint of good skimmed sweet milk and a little salt; the rest of the quantity being made up with water.

 Fish and barley-broth may be substituted the one for the other, at the rate of 6 oz. of fish

for 1 pint of broth.

- 5. Barley-bannocks, or bread made of wheat and oatmeal mixed, may be substituted for wheaten-bread on one day of each week, and oat-cake on another day; the oat-cake to be of the same weight as the wheaten bread, but the barley-bannock must contain a weight of meal equal to the weight of wheaten-bread, making the bannock itself somewhat heavier. The wheaten-bread may be made of second flour or over-heads.
- 6. Potatoes, whether in their ordinary form or made into soup, must not be given for dinner more than twice each week; but they may be given for supper as often as may be convenient, provided that they be not given on the days on which the prisoners have potatoes or potato-soup for dinner.
- Either fresh skimmed-milk, or butter-milk, may be used.

8. Salt must be given with each meal.

9. Especial care must be taken to preserve the potatoes, so that they shall not vegetate or

be injured in any way. No potatoes must | be used unless they are quite sound; and it is recommended that, as a general rule, potatoes be not used from the end of April

until the ensuing autumn.

10. If, from any unforeseen emergency, milk should not be obtainable, there may be substituted for it a like quantity of treacle water, at the rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. treacle to a pint of water; but when this substitute is used, there must be added to the dietary, in the proper table, 6 oz. of ox-heads in the broth or soup, or 4 oz. of cheese.

11. A change of food being beneficial to health, it is directed that the dinner, on at least two days in the week, shall be different from the dinner on the other days.

12. In weighing or measuring the food, the imperial weights and measures must always

be used.

13. Potatoes and other vegetables must be weighed after they are washed, but before they are cooked. Meat must also be weighed before being cooked.

14. The hours of meal throughout the year shall be as follows:—Breakfast at 1 past 7 in the morning, dinner at 1 in the afternoon, and

supper at 7 in the evening.

- 15. In the evening, work should cease a quarter of an hour before supper time; and no prisoner should be required to work after supper unless he has neglected to perform his stated quantity in the ordinary working
- 16. The eating and drinking vessels in which the food is distributed should not be collected till half an hour after the prisoners have received them, at breakfast and supper, and till 40 minutes after, at dinner.

X.

The Resident Medical Officer of any Prison shall Powers and have power to make any variations, in particular Duty of Surcases, from the foregoing dietaries, which he may geon as to deem necessary, always, however, recording the same in writing.

Whereas it has been reported to Us that the number of Recruits required to be annually raised for Our Army is now greatly larger than the number formerly required to be annually raised, and that it is, consequently, desirable to revise the existing arrangements for the recruiting of Our Army, and to inquire how far that recruiting and the general organization of Our Army has been affected, beneficially or otherwise, by the Act 10 and 11 Victoria, cap. 37, intituled "An Act for limiting the time of service in the Army.

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your zeal, discretion, and ability, have authorized and appointed, and by these presents do authorize and appoint you, the said Fox Earl of Dalhousie, William Lygon Earl of Longford, Charles Viscount Eversley, William Paulet commonly called Lord William Paulet, Sir Samuel Morton Peto, Sir Duncan Alexander Cameron, George Balfour, Frederick Edward Chapman, John Wilson Patten, Samuel Whitbread, Myles William O'Reilly, and Robert Parker Radcliffe, to be Our Commissioners to enquire into the operation of the Laws at present in force for raising Men to serve in Our Army, and into the existing system of recruiting Our Army; and, after full and careful consideration of these important subjects, to report to Us any changes in the existing Laws and Regulations affecting the raising of Men for Our Army, which would, in your judgment, tend Edward Chapman, Esquire, Companion of Our to facilitate Recruiting, and to retain in Our

Army a due number of Men who have completed their first period of service.

And for the better discovery of the truth in the premises, We do, by these presents, give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power and authority to make such inquiry as aforesaid, either in London or at the Recruiting Depots, or other places of the United Kingdom, as to your judgments may seem best, and in the manner which you may deem most expedient, and to call before you, or any three or more of you, such persons as you shall judge necessary, by whom you may be the better informed of the truth of the premises, and to inquire of the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

And We do further, by these presents, give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power and authority where the same shall appear to be requisite, to administer an oath or oaths to any person or persons whomsoever, to be examined before you, or any three or more of you, touching

or concerning the premises.

And We do further, by these presents, give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power and authority to cause all persons to bring and produce before you, or any three or more of you, all and singular records, books, papers, and other writings, touching the premises, which shall be in the custody of any of them.

And We further will and command, and by these presents ordain, that this, Our Commission, shall continue in full force and virtue, and that Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, shall and may, from time to time, proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein mentioned, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment.

And We do hereby command all and singular

And We do hereby command all and singular the Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, Officers, Ministers, and all other Our loving subjects whomsoever, as well within liberties as without, to be assistant to you, and each of you, in the execution of these presents.

And for your assistance in the due execution of this Our Commission, We have made choice of Our trusty and well-beloved—John Milton, Esquire, to be Secretary to this Our Commission, and to attend you; whose services and assistance, as well as the services and assistance of such Clerks and other persons as may appear to you to be necessary, We require you to use from time to time, as occasion shall require.

Given at Our Court at Saint James', this ninth day of May one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the twentyninth year of Our reign.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, and in respect of letters, newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of

such letters and papers by the post.

And whereas by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmisson of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office," it is enacted that, in order to prevent packets of an unwieldy bulk or an inconvenient size being transmitted by the post, it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, at any time or times thereafter, by Warrant under their hands, to fix the maximum weight of letters to be sent by the | Messina, east coast of Sicily :-

post, and from time to time to repeal or revoke such maximum weight, wholly or in part, and declare any other maximum weight in lieu thereof, and that all letters shall be forwarded, conveyed, and delivered by the post in conformity with any such Warrant, and also in conformity with and under and subject to all such orders, conditions, limitations, regulations, and restrictions, as to the form, size, or dimensions thereof, whether in proportion to the weight or otherwise, as the Post-master-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have, by two certain Warrants under their hands, bearing date respectively the 17th day of March 1865 and the 27th day of December 1865, fixed and limited the dimensions of letters and packets transmissible by the post, and it is expedient to make such other regulation with regard to certain of such letters and packets as is hereinafter mentioned and contained.

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said before mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant under our hands, order and direct as follows :-

- 1. That notwithstanding anything in the said recited or referred to Warrants, or in any other Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury now in force, respectively contained to the contrary, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General for the time being, from time to time, and at any time hereafter, to authorise and allow to be forwarded and transmitted by the post any letters or packets of any description whatever, exceeding two feet in length or one foot in breadth or depth, which he in his discretion shall think fit, provided that the several other regulations, conditions, and restrictions for the time being in force and applicable to such letters and packets shall be in all respects observed and fulfilled.
- 2. That the term "by the post" used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as the like term used in the said recited Acts.

3. That this Warrant shall come into operation on the fourteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

4. That it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter to alter or repeal any of the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other regulations in lieu
