By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT.

Lord President, Mr Secretary Walpole. Mr Corry.

THEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent, until "the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spread-"ing of contagious or infectious disorders "among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-interest of the session of the twenty-eighth and twentyminth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary, for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal, to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, tattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, akins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in Scotland:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the or other officer thereto authorized, to transcript

cattle plague, under which Orders it is competent for the Local Authorities constituted thereby to make Orders or Regulations binding within their respective districts, and it is expedient that provision should be made for the publication of the Orders or Regulations of such Local Authorities.

Now therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows :-

- The Orders and Regulations made after the date of this Order by any Local Authority, under any Order of Council, shall be published in some newspaper circulating within the district for which such Local Authority acts, and also in some newspaper circulating within the district or districts bordering on or contained within the district for which such Local Authority acts.
- 2. In the construction of this Order, the terms "District" and "Local Authority" shall have the meanings assigned to them in the Order of 11th April 1866.

HEREAS, in exercise of the authority vested in us by the Nuisances Removal (Scotland) Act, 1856, and the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 4th day of June 1866, We, The BOARD of SUPERVISION for the RELIEF of the POOR in SCOTLAND, saved on the 7th day of June 1866 certain Directions and Regulations; and whereas it is expedient to make further Directions and Regulations:

Therefore, in exercise of the Authority vested in us aforesaid, we do issue the following Additional Directions and Regulations, to extend to all Places in Scotland, and to all Parts and Arms of the Sea lying within the jurisdiction of the Admiralty, and adjacent to such places:—

I. The Local Authority shall cause their Herk

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 36.)-SCOTLAND.-WEST COAST.

Measured Mile in Frith of Clyde.

Notice is hereby given that beacons to indicate the length of a nautical mile (6080 feet), for testing the speed of steam vessels, have been erected on the eastern shore of the Frith of Clyde,

Each beacon consists of a single pole 45 feet high, with two arms 10 feet along, forming a broad angle 15 feet from the base, the whole being painted white.

The two northern beacons, are erected near Skelmorlie Pier; the outer one being close to the high water shore on the south side, and from it the inner one (in a recess of the cliff) is 83 yards distant, bearing S.E. by E. 2 E.

The two southern beacons stand on level ground near Skelmorlie Castle, the inner one being 100 yards from the outer one, in a S.E. by E & E. direction.

The courses parallel with the measured mileat right angles to the line of transit of the beacons—are N.N.W. 1 W. and S.S.E. 1 E; the shore may be approached to the distance of a third of a mile.

Dungeness Light.

The Corporation of the Trinity House, London, has given notice that on or about the 1st day of September 1866, in order to mark the anchoring ground on either side of Dungeness, a portion of the light will be coloured red, which will be seen when on—or the shore side of—the bearings of S.W. by W. 1 W., and east respectively.

NORTH SEA.

Red Light on Hook of Holland.

The Minister of Marine in Holland has given notice that on and after the 1st day of May 1866 a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at the Hook of Holland, on the north side of entrance to the River Mass or Meuse, passage of Brielle.

The light is a fixed red light, at an elevation of 19 feet feet above the level of the mole, at the extremity of which it is placed, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 6 miles.

Temporary Light on Gatcombe Head, Port Curtis.

The Government of Queensland has given notice that a temporary light, 50 feet above the sea, has recently been established on that part of Gatcombe Head north-west of the Oyster Rock, entrance to Port Curtis.

Vessels entering Port Curtis at night by the North channel should bring the light to bear about S.W. by W. 1 W., being careful to keep it well open of Settlement Point, in order to avoid the rocks extending from that point.

Light Vessel at Upper Flats, Fitzroy River.

A light vessel has also been moored head and stern, in the position of the large black buoy, at the crossing place at the Upper Flats, in Fitzroy River. The vessel shows a red light at the masthead, and by day and night the following tidal signals are exhibited:—
