To all Local Authorities in Scotland having jurisdiction in terms of the Nuisances Removal (Scotland) Act, 1856.

EXERCISING the powers conferred upon them by the Statute 19 and 20 Vict., c. 103, Part II., sections 24 and 26, put in operation in all parts of Scotland by the Order in Council of the 4th day of June 1866, The BOARD OF SUPERVISION issue the following additional Directions and Regulations:—

I. Cases of Asiatic Cholera having occurred in several places in Scotland, all the Local Authorities exercising jurisdiction under the "Nuisances Removal (Scotland) Act of 1856," amended by the Act 25 and 26 Vict., c. 101, Part VII., are hereby required to hold meetings on as early a day as may be, for the purpose of making such arrangements as may be necessary to carry into effect, without delay, these Directions and Regulations.

II. Every Local Authority shall forthwith nominate a qualified medical practitioner to perform the duties assigned in these Directions and Regulations to "the Medical Officer," and shall name fit and qualified persons to be "officers," to see to the execution of the orders and instructions of the Local Authority, and shall organise a system of house-to-house visitation within the limits of its jurisdiction, either by its members or by persons thereunto authorized by it, and so conducted that every house within those limits shall be visited, more especially the dwellings of the poor and of the less affluent classes; and in order the more speedily and effectually to accomplish that object, the Local Authority may divide the space under its jurisdiction into districts, and appoint separate visitors for each district.

III. The duties to be performed by the visitors conducting the house-to-house visitation shall be --

 To ascertain by personal inspection and investigation the sanitary condition of each house, more especially as regards cleanliness, ventilation, sewage, and the prompt removal of all filth and offensive matter, to such a distance, or in such a manner, that it shall no longer deteriorate the air breathed by the inhabitants.

2. To investigate the source and quality of the water which the inmates drink, and especially to ascertain whether it is not tainted by impurities that find their way to it by infiltration or otherwise.

3. To report forthwith to the Local Authority any such defects in the sanitary condition of any house as may be deemed prejudicial to health, or calculated to promote the introduction or the spread of Cholera or Diarrhœa, in order that effectual measures may at once be taken to remove them.

4. To point out to the inhabitants such means as are easily available to themselves for the removal of sanitary defects connected with their dwellings, to call upon them to employ those means with a view to their own security and that of their neighbours, and to report to the Local Authority all cases of refusal or failure to attend to the instructions so given, in order that compulsory measures may, if necessary, be resorted to; and it shall be the duty of the "officers" required by Regulation II. to be named, to ascertain whether such directions and instructions have been attended to and to report accordingly.

5. To supply householders, in any case in which it may be deemed necessary or advisable, with the means of disinfecting and deodorizing, to be furnished by the Local Authority, and to instruce the persons to whom they are supplied in the manner of employing those means effectually, without needless waste.

6. To ascertain the number of inmates occupying the several apartments of the dwellings visited, and forthwith to report to the Local Authority any case of overcrowding that may come to their knowledge, in order that measures may be taken to remedy the evil.

7. To investigate and ascertain the state of health of the inmates of each house, and especially whether any of them in affected

with Diarrheea or looseness of the bowels, and, if medical assistance be not immediately at hand, to administer to persons so affected such medicines as the Medical Officer of the parish or district may have entrusted to them for that purpose, and in such manner as he shall have directed in writing, intimating to him, as soon as may be, the name and place of abode of every person so affected, and the medicine, if any, administered to each.

- 8. To intimate to the Inspector of the Poor any case in his parish in which they may have reason to believe that predisposition to disease is produced, or disease aggravated, by privation, consequent on the inadequacy of the means of subsistence.
- 9. To guard the inhabitants, as much as possible, by counsel and example, from panic or demoralizing fears; and to afford them generally such advice and instruction as may tend to prevent the occurrence of Cholera, and to ensure the prompt adoption of the proper course of proceeding on the occurrence of that disease, or of symptoms that may be indications of its approach, and more particularly to urge the extreme importance of the utmost promptitude in applying for advice and remedies on the first appearance of any such symptoms.

IV. The Local Authority shall, as far as it may be found practicable, require a Medical Officer or assistant to accompany the visitors conducting the house-to-house visitation, to carry with him medicines to be administered to persons affected with Diarrhea, or looseness of the bowels, or other premonitory symptoms; and when visitors are not so accompanied, the Local Authority shall require the Medical Officer to provide them with such suitable medicines as he may consider it proper to entrust to them, and with written directions as to administering those medicines.

V. The Local Authority shall at once make arrangements by which suitable medicines may be dispensed at all hours, whether by night or by day, to all persons applying for them, and at so many different places so distributed within the jurisdiction of that Authority as will afford to the inhabitants the greatest facility for speedily obtaining appropriate remedies if Cholera or Diarrhœa should occur amongst them. As soon as such arrangements have been made, the Local Authority shall make known to all the inhabitants the several places at which such medicines can be obtained by any applicant giving the name and place of abode of the person for whom they are required.

Where there are apothecaries' shops and dispensaries in sufficient number and suitably situated, the requisite arrangements may generally be best made with these; but in many places such establishments are not to be found, or not in sufficient number, and so distributed as to meet the requirements of the occasion. In such cases the Local Authority shall make arrangements for the same purpose, with all the qualified medical practitioners residing within its jurisdiction, and their assistants, and if the number of these or the distribution of their residences will not enable them to meet the requirements of the occasion, then the Local Authority, in concert with the

Medical Officer, must place in the keeping of a sufficient number of other intelligent persons, in suitable situations, who may be willing to under-take that benevolent duty, or of such other fit persons as may be induced on specified terms to undertake it, such medicines and remedies as the Medical Officer may consider it proper to entrust to them, with written directions for their use; and every person dispensing medicines supplied by the Local Authority shall, if acting gratuitously, be requested, and if paid be required, to enter day by day in a book, to be supplied by the Local Anthority for that purpose, a correct note of the names and places of abode of the persons for whose use such medicines have been supplied, and of the medicines dispensed to each, and to communicate the same as soon as may be to the nearest Medical Officer or assistant, in order that medical attendance may be promptly provided for the patient.

VI. In any place in which Cholera or Choleraic Diarrhea prevails, and in which the medical assistance available in the locality is insufficient to afford adequate medical attendance to all who require it, the Local Authority shall procure additional medical assistance, and for that purpose advanced Students of Medicine, certified by a Medical Professor in any University in which they have studied Medicine, to be competent to perform the duties of assistants under the direction of qualified Medical Practitioners, may be employed in that capacity; and the Local Authority shall provide competent nurses to aid the Medical Practitioners in their attendance upon patients suffering from choleraic disease, either in their homes or in hospital.

VII. In any place in which choleraic disease is present, or in which its appearance may reasonably be feared, the Local Authority shall provide suitable accommodation for the persons so affected, whom it may be advisable to remove thither for treatment, and also accommodation for the healthy, in cases in which the patient cannot safely be removed from his home, and the healthy inmates cannot safely be allowed to remain; and as arrangements for those purposes cannot generally be made on very short notice, Local Authorities are hereby required timeously to prepare suitable accommodation, with the requisite furniture, appliances, and means of medical treatment, as well as suitable sick-bed attendance, for the reception of persons who may suffer from choleraic disease, and whom the Medical Officer or attendant may consider it advisable to have removed thither. The Local Authority is also required to make such arrangements as will enable it promptly to provide suitable accommodation for the healthy persons whom it may be considered advisable to remove from their homes; and no persons so removed shall be permitted to carry with them, to the accommodation so provided for them, any article that has not been thoroughly disinfected, and thereby rendered innocuous to themselves and to the other persons with whom they may be associated or come into contact. no case shall any person be removed in terms of this Regulation to a Poorhouse, unless to a detached Hospital of a Poorhouse, in which Hospital there are no other inmates.

VIII. The Local Authority shall take all possible precautions to ensure the immediate disinfection of all discharges from the sick, and shall promptly

supply the proper disinfectants, in sufficient have the body interred with the least possible quantity for that purpose, to every house in which delay; and if the death shall have occurred in a any person is affected with choleraic disease; and shall also take effectual measures for disinfecting all bedding, clothes, towels, napkins, and other articles which may have been infected, as well as the utensils and privies of all such houses; and all articles which cannot be readily or thoroughly disinfected shall immediately be burnt or otherwise destroyed, the Local Authority paying the fair and full value of articles so destroyed.

IX. In every case of death from choleraic disease, the Local Authority shall take measures to

The following dispositions will take effect simultaneously with the present tariff, all others, to the contrary, being abrogated:—

Exemption from duty on anchors, chains, sheets of zinc, copper, and brass, is granted in favour of ship-builders.

For every wooden ship built in an Italian yard there shall be awarded to the builders two francs per ton of measurement, ascertained in the manner prescribed by the Royal Decree of May 19, 1862, No. 627, without the deduction of 40 per cent. mentioned in Art. 3 of that decree, for ships provided with engines.

Repayment shall be made of the amount of duty received on the iron used in the construction of ships built wholly of iron, or of iron and wood combined, subject to such rules and precautions as may be determined upon.

No special exemption of import duty is granted to machine makers.
