The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Madrid, reporting that the authorities at Malaga have imposed a three days' quarantine on all arrivals from Gibraltar, to be performed at one of the duly qualified Lazarets of Cadiz or Carthagena.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Lisbon, announcing the following Regulations of the Lisbon Board of Health:

By Decree of the 23d ultimo Southampton, Liverpool, and Llanelly, were declared to be ports infected with cholera since the 14th of July; and the English ports in the English and Irish Channels to be only suspected ports from that date;

By Decree of the 27th of July last all the ports in England and Ireland were declared to be suspected ports, with the exception of the three above mentioned; viz,—Liverpool, Southampton, and Llanelly, which still continued to be infected;

By Decree dated the 3d of August the Board of Health declare that the ports in Scotland are not included in the number of those declared to be suspected of cholera, by the above-mentioned Decree of the 27th of July; and

By Decree of the 6th of August no quarantines, whether they be classed as rigorous or precautionary, imposed upon vessels arriving from any ports either infected with or suspected of cholera, shall be accepted as such, unless they are undergone at the port of Lisbon.

mittee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the following translation of a Decree issued by the Italian Government, and rectifying certain errors in the tables of new import and export duties in the Italian Tariff which appeared in the London Gazette of the 17th instant:

WE, Eugene of Savoy-Carignan, Lieutenant-General, &c., by virtue of the authority delegated to us, &c., &c., seeing that in the tables annexed to the Decree of July 14, 1866, there are some incomplete or inaccurate indications which require to be explained or rectified. On the proposal of the Minister of Finance, have ordained as follows:

ART. 1. Coffee, pepper, and pimento are charged with the duty indicated in Table A. of the Decree

of July 14, by the gross weight, as at present.

The words "as above," with follow the words "Tissues of cotton, bleached, of the weight," refers likewise to the number of threads indicated above.

ART. 2. In Table B., for the quintal (100 kilo-

grammes), the ton (1,000 kilogrammes), is to be substituted as the unity of weight for the articles mentioned below, the denomination of which, and the duty chargeable on them, shall be stated in the following rectified manner:

Fcs. Centimes. 20 the ton 0 Iron ore ... 90 Copper ore

Lead ore (" arcifoglio," galena, carbonates and sulphates of lead), con-

taining 50 per cent.,
or more, of pure lead , 5 00
We ordain that the present Decree, scaled with the Seal of the State, be inserted, &c., &c.


