PRISON AT LOCHGILPHEAD.

The Right Honorable Spencer Horatio Walpole, One of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, and Principal Secretary of State, &c., &c., &c.

IN virtue of the powers contained in the Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act, 1860, I do hereby Order and Intimate that the PRISON of LOCHGILPHEAD, in the County of Argyll, shall, on and after the 5th day of December next, CEASE to be a LEGAL PRISON for the purposes set forth in a 'Declaration and Order by the General Board of Directors of Prisons in Scotland,' bearing date the 22d day of February, in the year 1850.

I do hereby further Order and Intimate, in virtue of the powers contained in the said Act, and in the 'Summary Procedure (Scotland) Act, 1864,' that the Building constituting the said Prison shall, on and after the said 5th day of December next, be a LEGAL PLACE of IMPRISONMENT as POLICE CELLS, for any period not exceeding three days; and that every Prisoner under a Sentence which may exceed three days shall, before the expiry of three days from the date thereof, be removed to the Prison of Inveraray, in the said County of Argyll.
