(No. 62.)—NORTH SEA.—COAST OF JUTLAND.

Beacon on Fanø Island.

The Ministry of Marine at Copenhagen has given notice that both the beacons on the north end of Fanø Island have been taken down, and that a new wooden beacon, 50 feet high, has been erected on the northernmost sand hill of Fanø Island.

The beacon is painted red, its top is 60 feet above the sea, and at a distance appears somewhat like a windmill. It stands in lat. 55° 27' 45" N., long. 8° 22' 2" East of Greenwich.

The beacon in one with Jerne church leads to the buoy on Peacock's plan marked *Graadyb*, placed outside the channel, and in the deepest water over the bar to Graa Deep, and on to a large black conical buoy with a staff and ball, on the west tongue of Søren Jessens sand.

The white buoys and marks point out the north side, and the black buoys and marks the south

side of the channel, from the Peacock buoy to Fanø roadstead.

Fixed and Flashing Light on Castle Niebla Point,
Port Valdivia.

The Minister of Marine of the Republic of Chile has given notice that, on and after the 20th day of August 1866, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Castle Niebla Point, on the east side, within the entrance of Port Valdivia.

The light is a *fixed* and *flashing* white light, at an elevation of 121 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen at a distance of 8 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses.

The tower is 24 feet high, square, and painted white. It stands in lat. $39^{\circ} 52' S.$, long. $73^{\circ} 24' 30''$ West of Greenwich.

Sharp Island Light Maryland.

The United States Lighthouse Board has given notice that the light formerly shewn from the bluff of Sharp Island, Chesapeake Bay, Maryland, has been discontinued; and that, on and after the 20th day of October 1866, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on screw piles in $7\frac{1}{2}$ feet water, mean level of the sea, and bearing N. W., $\frac{1}{2}$ W. distant one-third of a mile from the old tower.

The new light is a *fixed* white light, 35 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen at a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fifth order.

The Iron-work of the foundation is painted red, and the superstructure white.

Mariners bound up Chesapeake Bay will now see the light shortly after passing Cove Point light, whereas in its former position it could not be seen

until abreast of it, owing to the woods on the island.

The South Brake buoy has been moved 6 cables to the N.N.E. of its former position, and now lies in 6 fathoms at low water springs, with the Coast Guard flagstaff at Broadstairs in line with the chimneys of the western cottage at the North Foreland lighthouse bearing N. by E $\frac{3}{4}$ E; Upper Deal Mill in line with the time ball, W.S.W.; Deal Bank Buoy, S.W. by W., distant $1\frac{1}{10}$ miles; South Sand Head light vessel, S. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., 5 miles; Bunt Head buoy (new position), S. by E $\frac{3}{4}$ E., $1\frac{3}{10}$ miles; Gull light vessel, N.E. by E., $1\frac{3}{10}$ miles; and Middle Brake buoy, N.N.E., $2\frac{1}{10}$ miles.

The Bunt Head buoy has been moved $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables to the S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and now lies in $4\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms, with Upper Deal Mill, its breadth open north of a new chapel at Deal, bearing W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S.; St. Lawrence Mill open west of Ramsgate Mill, north; South Sand Head light vessel, S.S.W., distant 4 miles; Deal Bank buoy, W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., $1\frac{3}{10}$ miles; South Brake buoy (new position), N. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., $1\frac{2}{10}$ miles; Gull light vessel, N. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., 2 miles; and N.W. Bunt buoy, N.N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., $1\frac{1}{10}$ miles.

The South Middle Brake Buoy has been discontinued.

Also, that in March 1867 the following changes will be made in the colour and character of the undermentioned buoys:—

The South Brake Buoy will be coloured *red*, instead of black, as at present.

The Elbow Buoy will be coloured *red* and *white*, instead of black and white chequered, as at present.

Both these buoys will retain their staffs and balls.

The Longnose buoy will be a conical, instead of a can buoy, as at present.
