THE Queen, taking into Her royal consideration that upon the decease of John Francis Miller, late Earl of Mar and Earl of Kellie, of that part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, without issue, on the 19th day of June last, the title and dignity of Earl of Kellie devolved upon his cousin and heir-male Walter Coningsby, now Earl of Kellie, as eldest surviving son and heir of Henry David Erskine, Esq., commonly called the Honourable Henry David Erskine, the third, but eventually second, surviving son of John Francis, Earl of Mar, and next brother to John Thomas, Earl of Mar, the father of the said John Francis Miller, late Earl of Mar and Earl of Kellie, and that, according to the ordinary rules of honour, the brother and sister of the said Walter Coningsby, now Earl of Kellie, cannot enjoy that place and precedence which would have been due to them in case their said father had survived his nephew, the said John Francis Miller, late Earl of Mar and Earl of Kellie, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Earl of Kellie, Her Majesty hath been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that James Augustus Erskine, Esq., and Anne Caroline, the wife of Joseph Haskoll, Clerk, Master of Arts, Rector of East Barkwith, in the city of Lincoln, the only surviving brother and of the said Walter Coningsby, now Earl of Kellie, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as if their said father had survived his nephew, the said John Francis Miller, late Earl of Mar and Earl of Kellie, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Earl of Kellie :

EXPLANATIONS.

I.—NAVIGATION DUES LEVIED AT SULINA IN 1 65

These dues are levied by the European Commission, by virtue of Article 16 of the Treaty of Paris of the 30th March 1856, to cover the expenditure devoted to the improvement of the Mouths of the Danube. The collection is effected on the basis of the Tariff join d to the Public Act signed at Galatz on the 2d November 1865. It includes as w ll the dues imposed on the navigation for the local pil tage, and for the keeping up of th li ht-h ses which m k the Danube Mouths.

In 1865, the gross produce of the dues levied at ulna amounted to the sum of 941,245 francs 83 centimes. It is composed of the following items —

The net produce is then reduced to Fra. 839,445 76½ or 70,541 ducats 30 piastres 11 paras.

II.—DEBT OF THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION

The loan of 800,000 bank marks, contracted at Hamburgh in 1862, having been entire y re-imbursed (the last instalment was paid on the 30th June 1866), the debt of the European Commission does not, beyond the credit of the Ottoman Government not yet due, comprise more than a capital of £10,000 sterling, borrowed in London in the month of December 1865, and the amount of the 10 per cent. bonds issued in 1866.

The London loan will be repaid the 15th December next, so that the bearers of the 10 per cent. bonds will be, after that date, the only Creditors enjoying a privilege upon the produce of the dues levied at Sulina. These bonds, of which the issue cannot exceed 45,000 ducats, are redeemable in two years.

The Commission must, however, in order to complete the improvement of the Mouth and Branch of Sulina, contract a new loan of about three millions of francs, to the extinction of which the net produce of the dues that it levies by virtue of the Treaty of Paris will be also pledged. 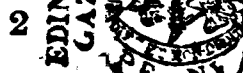
