THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from Her Majesty's Minister at Madrid the Royal Decree, of which the following is a translation :—

(TRANSLATION.)

Ministry of the Interior.

ROYAL ORDER.

ON this date the following Royal Order is addressed to the Governors of the Maritime Provinces :—

“ The state of the public health in Europe, and of some parts of America, has considerably ameliorated ; and as on that account it is not indispensable that rigorous health regulations should be continued, the Queen (whom God preserve) has thought fit to order :—

1. “ That ships proceeding from the Papal States be considered clean, provided that the Captains of ships proceeding from the same shall present clean bills of health viséd by our Consular Agents, and shall show that no accident has occurred on board during the voyage.

2. “ That ships proceeding from France, England, Italy, Denmark, the United States of America, Hamburg, Holland, Sweden, and Norway, shall only undergo three days of observation in the ports of Carthagená, Cadiz, and Santander, which are the ports constituted for that purpose ; the Board of Maritime Health taking especial care to examine the bills of health and the roll in order to discover if the ships proceeding from those Nations have touched at infected parts or not, whether they have had accidents on board during the voyage, or are wanting in any of the requisites established in our sanitary legislation.

3. “ That ships proceeding from Austria shall be subjected to the same treatment, those formalities which are exacted by the good service of this important branch being observed in all cases.

4. “ That in all doubts which may arise concerning the understanding of this sovereign disposition the General Direction of Health of this Ministry shall be consulted by telegraph.

By Royal Order I communicate this to you, enjoining you, in the name of Her Majesty, to use the utmost zeal in the exact fulfilment of this service.”

REGIMENTAL DEBTS ACT, 1863.

NOTICE is Hereby Given, that Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department holds in his hands for distribution amongst the next of kin of each of the deceased Soldiers named in the List hereunder written, the sum of money set opposite to each name.

Applications from persons supposing themselves entitled as next of kin should be addressed by letter to the "Under Secretary of State, War Office, London, S.W.," and marked outside "Soldier's Effects."

No application can be attended to which does not state the dates and places of the Soldier's birth, enlistment, and death, and the name of his Regiment; his regimental number should also be stated if known.

Should not these particulars, furnished by the applicant, agree with the facts recorded on the War Office documents relating to the deceased Soldier, the applicant will be so informed; but should they agree therewith, then, within three calendar months, the Secretary of State will furnish the applicant with the usual requirements needed for the proof of the alleged relationship.

The application must be authenticated by the signature of the applicant, and his name should be affixed in the presence of the Clergyman, or one of the Churchwardens of the parish, or a Justice of the Peace. The applicant's address, with the name of the post town, must also be clearly stated. No personal application can receive attention.

Further Lists will from time to time be published, and therefore it will facilitate the applicant's inquiries to give the number and date of the Notice in which the deceased Soldier's name appeared.

ENGLAND.—SOUTH AND WEST COASTS.

Temporary Lights at Spithead.

Alterations having taken place in the temporary lights exhibited on the forts building and other places at and in the vicinity of Spithead, this is to give notice that the following lights are now exhibited:—

- 1st.—On a fort building at the entrance of Brading Haven, near St Helens point, a *fixed green* light, 38 feet above the level of the sea.
- 2d.—On a fort building on No-mans-land Shoal, a *fixed red* light, 38 feet above the level of the sea.
